This designation is to be stamped on the poll tax reecipt by the election official at the place of voting.

It will apply to all types of poll tax including the regular \$1 75 receipt, the exemption receipt for persons reaching their 21st birthday and the exemption receipt for those over age.

"The new law will make it necessary for the voter to have his poll tax reecipt with him at the time of voting." Mrs. Murrah explained, "and voters are reminded that they should be sure they can locate their receipt whenever needed."

Occupancy of the first of these buildings to be completed has just been made by the Texas Employment Commission. Its six hundred employees now are housed in the \$2,400,000 structure. A total of 11,000 pieces of office equipment were moved out of eleven downtown Austin locations into the new six-story edifice.
