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Famed 'Horseshoe Curve' On SP Doomed To Oblivion

The famed "horseshoe curve" on the Southern Pacific eight miles west of Sierra Blanca, is doomed to oblivion.

The railroad has authorized expenditure of more than \$2 million for construction of 9.29 miles of new track and sidings between Etholen and Small that will eliminate the famed track curvature built in 1881, and for the installation of 75 miles of centralized control equipment between Belen and Sierra Blanca.

Construction work started on April 21 with the first of the new rail being installed on August 3. Plans call for completion of the new line in November, and for installation of the centralized traffic control equipment in December. Track in the horseshoe curve area will be taken up early next year, rail officers said.

The new line change has necessitated construction of six concrete and steel bridges and is being built on a new alignment north of the present horseshoe curve. It will retire 11.53 miles of present main track, reduce rail distance between Etholen and Small by 2.24 miles, and eliminate 30 sharp curves to be replaced with straight alignment and high-speed curves.

The CTS system will permit train dispatchers to control operation of the power switches and modern searchlight type signals from a central dispatching office. The installation will include eight 2,000-foot sidings equipped with power switches at either end and

109 of the latest type signals. Utilization of the new line and CTC equipment will permit S. P. to increase train speeds in the horseshoe curve area from the present 30 miles per hour to 75 miles per hour for passenger trains and 65 miles per hour for freight trains.

Modern railroad equipment and construction techniques that permit track forces to move mountains with considerable ease were unheard of when pioneers built the first track through this rugged hill country three-quarters of a century ago.

Construction crews had real problems when they reached McNary where the road left the Rio Grande valley to reach the upper plateau through the only pass that was available between the Quitman and Finlay mountains. In the 30 miles from McNary to the summit at Etholen, the elevation rises from 3,568 to 4,653 feet. Between Small and Torcer, railroad civil engineers had the one choice of building the horseshoe to gain the necessary elevation and still maintain grades over which the trains could economically operate.

The area where the new line change is being built and CTC equipment installed is a part of the railroad's San Antonio Division. Construction and installation work is being done under the direction of L. A. Loggins, chief engineer for Southern Pacific Lines in Texas and Louisiana with headquarters at Houston.

G. K. Mitchell Builds Dam G. K. Mitchell has built a dirt diversion on his ranch to spread water. The area below the diversion was rootplowed to kill the brush and prepare the land for re-seeding with blue grama and buffalo grass.

The diversion is fourteen hundred feet long. It will carry runoff water from a creek to the spreading site.

He received assistance from the Soil Conservation Service in the design and layout for the system.
