## LISTEN TO LUKE

This week we received a full page reprint from the Marshall News Messenger of Marshall, Texas, together with mats for reproduction of the hand-drawn artwork, and were instructed that we were to use any or all of the page in our newspaper as we see fit. The entire page was propaganda from the railroads concerning their charges of featherbedding by the various brotherhoods operating the rails.

We have been in newspaper work long enough to know that that kind of propaganda and reproduction cost as well as postage in mailing this stuff to all the newspapers was not borne by the publisher. We have no room for that kind of free advertising for the railroads while they try to brain-wash the public before contract negotiations with the brotherhoods.

The charges listed in this piece of scandal are well thought out and evasive of the whole truth of life among and are neighbors to men who make their living on the railroad. They belong to these brotherhoods. They have an agreement with the company and they live up to their part of the agreement. The company and the newspapers as the News Messenger would have you believe that these men are breaking all the rules in the book.

Space will not permit us to list all the accusations listed in this scandal sheet, but we will say we have no idea what the T&N or other railroads are paying for this propaganda, but we do know that the T&N nor the entire Southern Pacific system could not dig up enough money to buy this little half-starved newspaper to print and distribute such lies as appear in the page we got. It was editorial material and not advertising.

We doubt that that information is useful or beneficial to anyone except us — in getting a hot off our chest — but there it is.

## School Plans Okayed By Board

The Sanderson Independent School District trustees have called for bids on the first phase of their \$360,000 expansion program.

Supt. Matt Bader said that the trustees last Wednesday night approved the final plans of Wilson and Patterson of Fort Worth, architects, and have ordered the bids.

Bids advertised will include a new 12-classroom elementary school. The school will have a multi-purpose classroom, administration offices, teachers' lounge and work rooms.

Also included in the bids will be a new industrial arts building on the northeast corner of the present high school campus, and renovation work on the first grade building.

Still to be ordered will be purchasing of building sites, renovations of the junior high school and rewiring of the high school.

The \$360,000 bond issue for the expansion program was passed in July by Terrell County voters and trustees are hoping to get actual construction under way by early November.

## Local SD Group Names W. G. Downie As 5-Year Supervisor

Walter G. Downie has been elected supervisor of sub-district No. 1 of the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District.

The Rio Grande-Pecos River S.C.D. is a political subdivision of the state of Texas. The objective of the district is the use of each acre of agriculture land within its capabilities and the treatment of each acre of agriculture land in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement.

Mr. Downie was elected for a five year term. One supervisor is elected each year from one of the five subdivisions of the district.

Prices of the cakes will be \$2.25 for the 2-lb. cakes; \$3.35 for 3-lb. cakes and \$5.30 for 5-lb. cakes.

One of the cakes will be on display at the Alamo Lumber Co. and Lions Club members present at the meeting Thursday were given a sample slice of the cake so that they might be able to recommend it.

## Altizer Wins New York Rodeo

Jim Bob Altizer won first place in the calf roping average at the Madison Square Garden rodeo in New York last week. He won 1st in three go-rounds and 2nd in two. There were five go-rounds.

He also set the record for the fastest calf ever roped there — 10.9 seconds for which he will receive a belt buckle.

Altizer's winnings at New York will be around \$4,000, it was said. Buddy Groff and Ray Wharton finished second and third.

## Lee Billings Resigns As County Sheriff Effective Nov. 1

At the regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court Monday, October 12, Terrell County Sheriff Lee Billings turned in his resignation from that post effective November 1, 1959.

The resignation was accepted by a vote of that body.

The resignation asked for a complete audit of all records of the office.

The Commissioners stated that a sheriff would be named to fill the unexpired term of office at the time the office becomes vacant.

## Geologists' Trip Planned Here For November 6, 7

The West Texas Geological Society will conduct its 1959 Fall Field Trip, Val Verde Basin, November 6, 7 and 8.

The trip is designed to give a comprehensive look at the Val Verde Basin, which, according to top-ranking geologists, shows promising signs of becoming the latest "booming" oil and gas province of the Permian Basin.

The trip will cover some 700 miles in Pecos, Terrell and Val Verde Counties and is planned to stimulate rewarding geological discussions of both surface and sub-surface data.

Saturday, November 7, the group will go to Sheffield, Prairie Canyon and the Brown-Bassett field.

The group will go through Sanderson Friday, Nov. 6, en route to Fort Stockton from Lemons Gap.

It has been pointed out that such a field trip is both enlightening to the geologists making the trip and beneficial to the areas to which the trips are made in that it gives the geologists a preview of the area so that they may re-visit certain areas which seem most interesting to him. It also affords geologists making the trip a most detailed data book which generally include more concise and complete information that is available in the more general publications for that group of scientists.

Those sponsoring the tour are planning to accommodate up to 300 geologists.

## Construction On New Motel Begins

Work was begun last week on the construction of a new tourist court on Highway 285 north of town. The courts will be owned and operated by Ervin Grigsby.

The present unit under construction will consist of an office and 11 rooms. Construction will be of hollow tile and stucco. O. J. Cresswell is the contractor.

Further expansion is possible on other lots north of and adjoining the present location.

The Ozona Lions, coached by Pete Hickman, former Eagle coach, were in Sanderson last Friday night for a football game. The Lions humiliated their hosts by a 41-0 score. It was the second loss of the season for the Eagles, both of which were in non-conference games.

Ozona received the first kickoff and made two first downs and lost the ball on downs on Sanderson's 14. Sanderson, after one down, quick-kicked to the Ozona 13. Ozona opened their scoring spree on this series of downs when Meinecke passed to Williams for 60 yards to the Sanderson 25. A penalty put the ball back to the 40 from which point Meinecke passed to Freeman for 40 yards and the first TD. The

conversion attempt of an extra point with a kick failed.

In the same period Tony Parker ran 62 yards for the second Lion score. The conversion of extra points by a run failed.

In the second period a TD was set up by a pass which was fumbled just short of the goal line by Williams, the receiver, who was in the open and running with the ball when the fumble occurred. The ball was recovered within inches of the goal line and Meinecke plunged over from there for the third tally. The extra point try failed.

In the third quarter it was Parker from the 1 with the extra point kick by Jones being good.

In the fourth period it was Jones from the 3 with the extra point run over by Good. Meinecke also passed from the 15 to Jones for another score with Jones going over for the extra two points.

The Eagles were not able to penetrate the line of the Lions nor were they able to go over or around them offensively. The strong Lion line set up an impenetrable wall for the Eagles to work against.

Coach Carlton Smith made liberal use of substitutions during the entire second half, working the reserve Eagles against the stronger Lions who gave all their experience to first line gridirers.

Friday night of this week the Eagles will host the Rocksprings football team in another non-conference tilt. The Rocksprings aggregation is a class B unit but is expected to give a good account of themselves here.

Game time is 8 o'clock and all football fans are urged to come out to the game.

## Cruz Gets 5 Years For Cattle Theft
