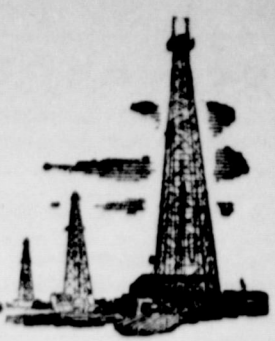

Pedro Castillo Drowns In Del Rio, Burial Thursday

Pedro Castillo, 80-year-old resident of Sanderson, was found dead in less than six inches of water in a drainage ditch north of the Del Rio Wool and Mohair Co. warehouse in that city Monday morning. Justice of Peace O. J. Vineyard conducted an inquest and ruled the death due to accidental drowning. Del Rio officers ruled out the possibility of foul play after their investigation. Supposition is that Castillo fell or tripped and was rendered unconscious as a result of or before the fall, else he could have moved his head slightly and lifted his face out of the water. Officials estimated the time of death at about midnight Sunday. The body was found about 7:30 a.m. Monday. Castillo had gone to Del Rio for medical attention and was to have returned Sunday night, according to relatives here. His body was returned to Sanderson in the Lawrence Jones Funeral Home coach. Funeral services will be at 7 p.m. Thursday (today) at the St. James Catholic Church and burial will be in Santa Rita Cemetery.

\$286,676.00 Contract Let For New Elementary School

A contract for the new elementary school in the amount of \$286,676.00 was awarded here last week to the Newton Construction Co. of Odessa, the low bidder. The bids were opened and read last Thursday afternoon by the trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District. Last summer a bond issue of \$360,000 was approved by popular vote and the larger part of this money will be used to construct a new elementary grade school building, furnish it, build a new shop building, and for improvements at the Lamar Ward building as well as some work at the elementary building and the high school building. There were 10 bidders for the buildings and approximately \$39,000 separated the high and low bidder. Construction is due to start next week and completion is scheduled by Aug. 15, 1960. The new elementary school will be located on lots east of the Clyde Higgins and G. K. Mitchell homes, and will consist of 12 classrooms, an all-purpose room, office, teacher workroom, teacher lounge and storage space. The shop building will be used for industrial arts, and will be located on the high school campus at the site of the house formerly occupied by Mrs. Mary Lou Keller. The school board voted to buy the property and Mrs. Keller moved last week to 102 E. Pine. Work on the Lamar School will include adding rest rooms. Rewiring of the high school building and renovations at the elementary school are also in the plans. Wilson, Patterson and Associates of Fort Worth are architects of the building proposals.

About .40-Inch Of Moisture Falls In Several Showers

About .40-inch of rain has fallen locally in showers over the past several days. Seldom was there sufficient moisture to cause water to run in gutters. Two of the showers last weekend were during the night, there was one early morning shower and one late afternoon shower. Varied reports have come from ranchmen of the county in regards to rain or moisture, ranging from heavy fogs and heavy dew to showers similar to those received locally. Temperatures have ranged from the high forties — last Saturday night — to warm and even air-conditioner weather Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. Heavy winds blew here Wednesday morning early, but were diminishing late Wednesday afternoon to light breezes.

Tree Planting Promotion Project Gains Momentum

The project to promote tree planting in Sanderson and Terrell County is gaining momentum and the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce is expecting to get excellent cooperation and results from their project. The aid of local clubs and organizations is being solicited by the Chamber to aid in the house-to-house canvass of the town to try to sell the trees. Organizations assisting are: Lions Club, Rotary Club, V.F.W., Ranch Club and the Terrell County ASC office who will contact ranchmen about the project. All readers of The Times are asked to keep the order blanks which have been printed for the past three weeks and fill them out so that they may be picked up with the check or cash for the order by those who make the canvass; or the checks and orders may be mailed to Clyde Griffith. The prices shown on the order blank are for each tree size listed and 30c per tree should be added for freight. The species of pecan should be listed or noted on each order blank.

The Sanderson junior football teams will wind up their season this week (Thursday) in a game with Alpine Centennial. That game will be on the local gridiron. The A team won over Marfa by a close 12-6 score on October 15, according to Coach Joe Dean who said it was one of the best games of his team. On October 22 they lost to Blackwell 38-0 and they lost to Van Horn 14-6 on October 29. The B team did not participate in games against Marfa or Blackwell and lost 38-0 against the Van Horn B team juniors. The A team has a four win, 2 loss record, according to Coach Dean, and the B team has a season record of three losses and one tie.

Quail Season Open Until December 31

Hunters in West Texas were given an extra month to hunt quail according to a decision of the Texas Game and Fish Commission received here Wednesday. The new hunting allowable covers all counties in Texas west of the Pecos River. The hunting time extends until December 31, 1959 in the Trans-Pecos area and allows 12 birds per day and 24 in possession. It is the consensus of most ranchmen and interested sportsmen that the additional 30 days on the front of the bird season will help much in taking off some of the surplus of the blue quail which are or have been so numerous in this section. Late reports are that the birds have been disappearing and are not seen in such quantities along the roads and highways as was the case in recent weeks. 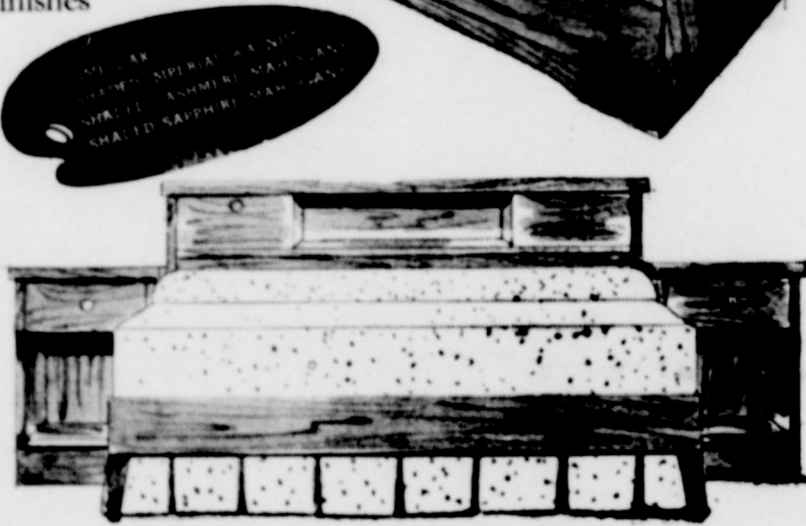
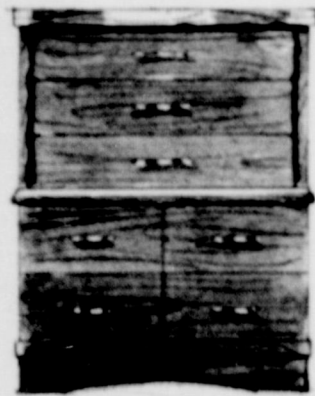

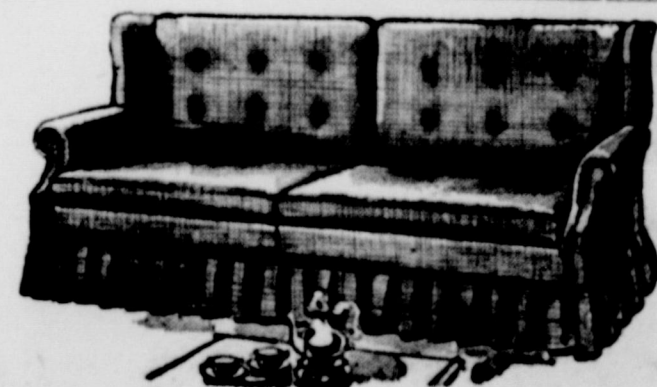
