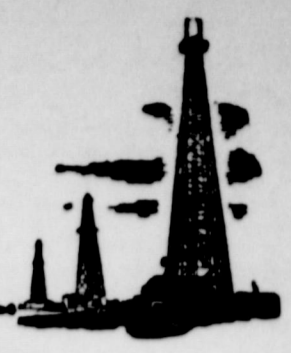

The Terrell County Chamber of Commerce met Monday night in the court house and named a nominating committee to select a slate of director candidates for consideration of the membership.

of Precinct 1, was authorized by the Court to purchase the garbage truck now being used for that purpose, since the capacity is much greater than the county's trucks which were formerly used.

This price, which is about half that charged by private individuals, is a more equitable means of paying for this service than any devised thus far and, according to Commissioner Weigand, will assure the collection of the garbage from every residence.

According to available information, the individuals who had been in the trash collection business, had ceased to offer that service to residents and trash was beginning to cause certain unsanitary conditions here.

Commissioner Weigand stated that he appreciated the cooperation of the other members of the Court and of the Water Board in helping him to maintain an orderly and clean town and to offer this service to the residents here.

Collection of garbage and trash had been done by the county previously at no cost to the residents, but costs of the service had made it prohibitive and it was done on a private enterprise basis for three months at a cost of \$2 for residences and \$5 for business per month with no plan for completely servicing the entire community, thus failing to fulfill the needs of the town from a health standpoint.

The next water bill received will have "Sanitation" and either \$1 or \$2, depending on whether business or residence water bill. The money collected for "sanitation" will be turned over to the county to pay for the trash hauling.

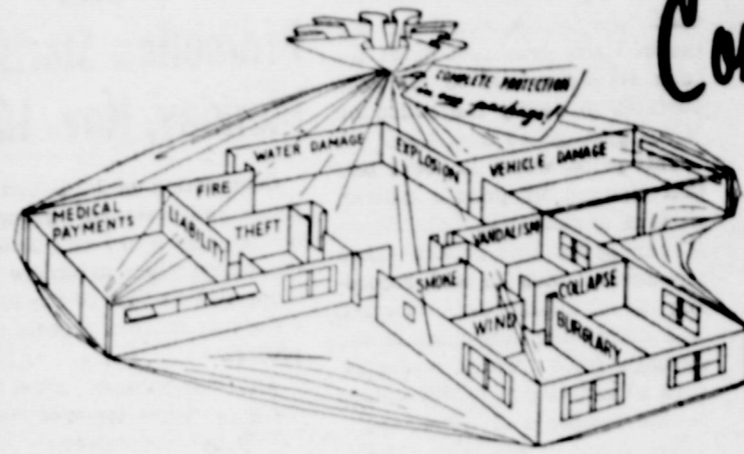

Scout, Soldier and Hero of San Jacinto

In 1821 people did not usually come to the untamed Texas Territory for their health. But one man did just that — Erastus Smith, from New York by way of Natchez.
