## LISTEN TO LUKE

Let's Abolish the Poll Tax? Read on. Don't go away saying this column is advocating such a move! Not on your life!

A petition movement, spearheaded by the Johnson, Rayburn, Yarborough clique of liberals, to abolish the poll tax requirement for voting in Texas, is under way according to information received. There is no doubt the politicians favoring such a move can see a possible bit of crookedness in such a thing were done. One wonders why this element does not employ its energies in a more constructive action such as a real reduction in taxes through governmental economy.

Their claim, of course, is that the poll tax requirement is discriminatory in that many citizens cannot pay the \$1.75 and are thus deprived of their franchise rights. Their object is to be able to vote every destitute incompetent who will listen to their instruction and thus pad the boxes with unintelligent votes.

We have seen ballots here in most recent years where one candidate, and one candidate only was marked to get a vote. This type of instruction is bad enough—as few or as many as there were—but to increase that potential type of voting by even one more is disgraceful and has almost always crooked intent.

Many people with children in school and otherwise citizens of this state pay no other taxes besides their poll tax. Surely any person would not gripe at the \$1.75 poll tax.

Think before you sign such a petition and look at the person passing the petition and investigate his intentions. Is he an honest champion of the destitute or is there an ulterior motive? Let the liberal faction of what is left of the Democratic Party abolish the poll tax?

Never. This could and would lead only to more corruption at the polls. What the George Parr kingdom did to elect Johnson would be small compared to what we might expect if they could round up and control practically every illiterate and ignorant vote in the state. We would only find ourselves paying more taxes to keep up such a mess.

Let's keep the poll tax and every other means we have of keeping all elections honest whenever we are electing a constitutional Senator.

Did you read where Sen. Yarborough has his teen-age son on our pay roll for some \$7,000 a year, and LBJ has his brother-in-law or cousin or something on \$15,000 a year salary? But how do you control dishonesty of this kind? If they couldn't hire their own relatives, they could make a snap-out hiring with their colleagues.



TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM GENERAL TOM GREEN Defender of Liberty Through Three Wars Whenever there was fighting to be done in Texas between 1835 and 1864, Thomas Green was usually in the thick of it. And of being there was plenty. 21-year-old Green, a lawyer and graduate of Princeton, arrived at Nacogdoches in December, 1835 — just in time to join the Voluntary Auxiliary Corps of the Texas Army. After San Jacinto, in the Republic of Texas, he represented Fayette County in the 4th Congress, became Clerk of the Supreme Court, took part in an expedition against the Indians on the upper Colorado River and, as Captain, raised and led a company of volunteers in the Mexican War of 1846-47. When the State of Texas became a part of the Confederate States of America, Tom Green was again ready to champion the right to live as he chose. In the New Mexico campaign and at the recapture of Galveston, Green — then a Colonel — proved his extraordinary military leadership. Transferred to Louisiana, he was an important factor in the crucial battle of Mansfield and Pleasant Hill. As history records him, it seems as if Tom Green knew he must crowd a lifetime of adventure, bravery and devotion to the cause of freedom into a few short years. He held the well-earned rank of Brigadier General when he was killed on the Red River, April 12, 1864. Today Texans still demand and get their right to choose the way they want to live.
