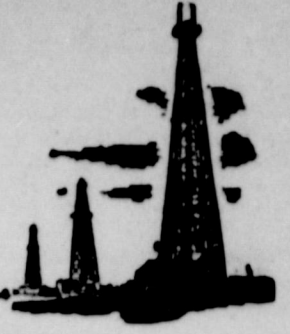

LISTEN TO LUKE

Christmas has come and gone and locally there were no serious accidents or tragedies to mar the happy season.

We have no way of knowing what part our words of caution may have had in that respect but we like to feel that at least we did all we could to bring about a safe and happy holiday for Terrell County.

Terrell County is fortunate in that there are very few citizens who are unable to have a happy Christmas. There is no large population of wealthy people in our county, but neither is there any stark poverty to a degree of helplessness.

Politics was a popular subject for the writers of the daily press of the nation last week end after Governor Rockefeller stated his position in the presidential nomination campaign.

Some writers and politicians were surprised, to say the least some disappointed, and some were truly thankful for the decision.

Our senior senator from Texas was the only potential candidate for nomination who could see an opportunity for self-aggrandizement in commenting on the governor's decision not to be a candidate. He took the bait immediately and began to capitalize on it. He thinks, in our opinion, that the voters of these United States are dumb enough to grasp anything he says about it and, without questioning his sincerity, will make a wild rush to vote for a man who is dedicated to place the would-be Republican candidate high on the list for political appointments. He thinks that kind of promise now will cause all liberal Republicans to switch to the "middle of the road" Democrats who are afraid to say if they are a liberal or a conservative.

There is no such thing as a Republican or Democrat strictly a such, anymore. There are liberals in both parties and also conservatives. There is little difference in a liberal Democrat and a liberal Republican. They stand for and practice identical political theory. Johnson says he is a middle of the road Democrat. As we see it the middle of the road is where most of the danger is. To stay in the middle of the road is a dangerous place to be and we steer clear of that part and all who stay there as much as possible. Most people who have kept up with the current trend in Texas politics can easily see that Mr. Johnson cannot very well stay in the middle of the road and be led by Sam Rayburn et al.

It has only been a few short years ago when he ran for his first term for congress under the avowed platform of the New Deal, after he had received a pat on the head by FDR. Later he decided that it would be more expedient for him to claim the middle aisle, but vote the liberal trend.

The trees will arrive here on Sunday, January 24, and will be sorted as to kind and size for easy distribution to the purchasers. They will be at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. for storage.

The project was a non-profit promotion by the Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of promoting the planting of trees locally and 221 pecan trees and about 30 trees of other varieties were sold in the promotion.

The taking of the 1960 school census for Terrell County began on January 1, according to Mrs. A. H. Zuberbue'ler who is taking the census this year. The census must be completed during the month.

All children who will be six years of age on or before September 1 and who will not be 18 until on or after that date are to be registered in the census whether they are in school or not.

Mrs. Zuberbue'ler has requested the parents of all children who are not in school and who should be included in the census to call her at the school tax assessor's office. "Those will not be as easy to locate as the school pupils," stated Mrs. Zuberbue'ler "and I am anxious to include all children in the county of school age on the census rolls."

Local Gunner in Alaska Combat Proficiency Tests

EIELSON AFB, ALASKA — Army Specialist Four Gustavo Z. Flores, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gustavo A. Flores of Sanderson, recently participated with the 9th Infantry in week-long combat proficiency tests conducted near Fairbanks, Alaska.

The tests, conducted on the rugged snow-covered Alaskan terrain, were designed to determine unit effectiveness under realistic combat conditions.

Specialist Flores, a gunner in the infantry's mortar battery at Eielson Air Force Base, entered the army in May, 1958, and completed basic combat training at Fort Carson, Colorado.

The 23-year-old soldier is a 56 graduate of Sanderson High School. Before entering the army he was employed by the Texas Highway Department at Monahans.

Center Stripe Renewed On US 90 Through Town

The center stripe on U.S. 90 through Sanderson is being repainted this week. The double stripe runs entirely through the town with breaks at intersections and corners through town.

It has been pointed out that the double stripe is used to indicate a barrier for wheels of vehicles driving on the highway and vehicles should not cross the double stripe.

The break at the intersections is to permit turns or crossings at those points, but passing is not allowed at an intersection, it was stated.

Local drivers are asked to observe the purpose of the double center stripe and keep their vehicles to the right of the stripe when driving and not pass at intersections.

Conservation Practices Listed For Ranches in '60

The 1959 Agricultural Conservation Program was a major factor in applying needed treatment measures to farms and ranches in Terrell County for soil and water conservation. The program was administered by the locally-elected Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee. In addition to sharing the costs of conservation with farmers and ranchers themselves, funds in the amount of \$467.30 were transferred to Soil Conservation Service to help provide technical services necessary to the success of the practices. The program, designed to meet local conservation problems, was developed jointly by the ASC Committee and Soil Conservation Service.

During the year past, to encourage the accomplishment of needed conservation measures, the government shared about 50 per cent of the cost of performing the practices. The cost - shares amounted to about \$57,600 on 51 ranches. This represents about 42 per cent of the agricultural units in Terrell County.

Conservation achievements include the eradication of competitive shrubs to conserve grazing land on 11,327 acres of 17 ranches; the improvement of grazing land by deferred grazing 79,757 acres of 17 ranches; tillage of rangeland to improve water penetration on 2,600 acres of 10 ranches; drilling of four wells on three ranches for improved distribution of livestock; construction of three concrete diversions on one ranch to prevent gullying; installation of 6,188 feet of pipeline on 12 ranches for better distribution of livestock water; construction of 4,592 rods of permanent fence on 6 ranches for protection of vegetative cover, and leveling of 18 acres of cropland to conserve irrigation water and prevent erosion.

Deer Cause Traffic Hazard To Drivers

Deer ranging in the bar ditches or near the highway at night are a definite hazard to motorists and a warning is being issued to all who travel in this area at night to drive slowly and be alert for deer which might run into the path of a car.

Several motorists have had near-serious accidents recently because of deer and there has also been considerable damage to cars which either ran into or were run into by deer but were not wrecked.

Two nights this week there were reports of motorists hitting deer.

It has been pointed out previously that if you hit a deer on the highway and kill it, it is a violation of game laws to bring the carcass into town. Motorists are asked to notify game officials or local officers that a deer has been killed and report the approximate location of the carcass to them so that it can be disposed of in a proper manner.

Motorists who hit a deer and kill it are also cautioned to be sure and remove the animal from the highway so as to prevent another hazard.

Early '60 Vote On January 12 For Water Board

There will be an election early in 1960 — on January 12, when the board of directors for the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1 will be named.

Greene Cooke, president, Edward Kerr, James Caroline, manager, M. W. Duncan, and D. E. Anderson are the present board members and all five have announced for re-election.

Three will be named for a two year term and two will be named for a one year term.

The election will be held at the courthouse with polls open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. and all qualified voters of the district will be eligible to vote.

The board stated that they were very satisfied with the operation of the district since assuming ownership and were pleased with the financial condition of the operation.

Mgr. Caroline stated that the district had, so far, had a minimum of expenditures for maintenance and repairs and that the major portion of the receipts to date had gone toward the black side of the ledger thus putting the district in excellent financial condition.

Each of the candidates stated that they would, if elected, continue to work toward the best interest of the district in all matters pertaining to the administration of their duties, to the absolute best of their ability.

They added that they would appreciate a vote of confidence by the people in the district at the coming election and asked all qualified voters to exercise their rights and privileges granted by the poll tax receipt.

Now Linda Can Wear Pretty Yuletide Shoes



Linda then . . . and Linda now

Six-year-old Linda Brees of Columbus, Ohio, has been crippled from birth. She suffered from a birth defect, a disorder which seriously affects one out of every 16 babies born in the United States.

When Linda was old enough to walk, she could get around only with the aid of steel braces on her legs. That meant wearing heavy, ankle-high shoes which were not very pretty for a little girl who was otherwise developing into a real beauty.

Children with significant birth defects, known medically as congenital malformations, often face a lifetime of crippling. But there was hope in Linda's case. In her hometown, at the Columbus Children's Hospital, a new center especially designed to treat birth defects was set up with the support of New March of Dimes funds. It is probably the world's first birth defects

treatment and study center. Linda began a series of surgical operations, treatments and exercises to strengthen the muscles she still had in her legs. Today she no longer needs the braces and can even ride a tricycle. Though she still uses crutches, the doctors at the Columbus center hope that she may soon be able to abandon them. Meanwhile, what delights Linda most is that, like other little girls, she can now wear pretty shoes.

The New March of Dimes campaign in January, 1960, is aimed at three major crippling diseases, including arthritis and polio in addition to birth defects. It is estimated that one out of every four American families is affected by these disorders. Linda's progress toward a healthy, normal life symbolizes the hope held out by the New March of Dimes for millions of sufferers from crippling diseases.
