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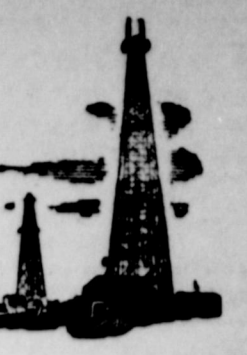

Demonstration On Soil Erosion Seen By 3rd Grade Class

Mrs. Lawrence Janes' third grade class saw a demonstration of soil erosion last Friday. The class is studying soil erosion and conservation. Pete Booker, SCE Work Unit Conservationist, gave the demonstration by sprinkling an equal amount of water in each of two boxes. One box contained a block of bare soil and the other box contained a block of soil covered with grass.

About one-half of the water ran off the box of bare soil, taking much of the soil with it. Only about one-tenth of the water ran off the box with the grass in it and the water was clear.

Wreck Victim's Body Sent To California

The body of Marjorie Jefferson, 42-year old woman who died of injuries suffered in a four-vehicle collision at Cedar Station last Tuesday morning, was sent last Thursday from Del Rio to San Francisco, Calif., for burial. Injured in the accident were Larry Jones, 14-year-old adopted son of the victim; Carlton Jones her brother; Hazel Carrier, a sister; Evelyn Carroway, a friend and driver of the 1956 Cadillac in which the group was riding. All have been under treatment in a Del Rio hospital and left by train Tuesday night for San Francisco, Calif.

Mrs. Jefferson died shortly after her arrival in Del Rio from the scene of the wreck and the report of the death of Jones was erroneous.

The accident occurred about 8:30 a.m. in very foggy weather. The Cadillac, travelling west, was in a collision with a truck loaded with hay and driven east by A. L. Taylor of Fabens, who suffered cuts.

A 1957 Ford, driven by R. G. Esqueda of Sanderson and another car going east driven by a Mrs. Randall of Pasadena, Calif., collided with the wrecked vehicle at Cedar Station. Esqueda suffered cuts and fractured ribs.

Market Favorable During '59 At Yards In San Antonio

A market report issued by the Union Stock Yards in San Antonio for 1959 shows that farmers and ranchers of South Texas had a very favorable market for their livestock during the past year as compared with the previous two years. These farmers and ranchers received \$44,686,687.00 for livestock in 1959 at the Union Stock Yards in San Antonio.

Stockmen sold only 20,669 more livestock in 1959 than two years before yet they received \$15,369,451.00 more in the past year than in 1957.

In 1958 the yards received 427,358 head of livestock which sold for a gross of \$38,824,459. In 1957 467,837 head sold for \$44,686,687.00 and in 1957, 447,165 head sold for \$29,832,226.00.

779 Voters Pay For Polling Rights

Poll tax receipts were issued to 779 voters in Terrell County, according to a report from Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax assessor-collector. The total number of exemptions issued was 28.

This year's voting strength in the county will probably be near the usual 1,000 with those not requiring exemption certificates — those over 60 years of age.

Coming elections are the Democratic Primary in May and the school board election in April.

B&PW Club Crusades For Legal Rights For Texas Women

The crusade for freedom of Texas women where their legal rights are concerned forms the core of activities for the Texas Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs. Mrs. Hermine Tobolowsky, state president of Dallas, reports. The spring state board meeting of the federation will be held in Fort Worth Saturday and Sunday.

Carrying out this crusade, club women and a growing body of lawmakers have pledged themselves to pursue this objective. They seek the early passage of the equal legal rights amendment to the Texas Constitution.

This amendment has been stated as follows: "provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or bridged because of sex and to provide a homestead exemption for single persons." This amendment is self-operative but the legislature shall make necessary adjustments in any laws which contravene its provisions.

The president and the legislative steering committee lists for your study these laws and their discriminations against women.

1. Art. 1, Sec. 3, Constitution of Texas provides equal legal rights for MEN only.

2. Art. XVI, Sec. 15, Constitution of Texas, defines the wife's separate property, but definition of community property is left to the legislature, and there is no definition of husband's separate property; conceivably his property could be enlarged at the expense of the community.

Art. XVI, Sec. 50 and 51, Constitution of Texas, provides for a homestead for a FAMILY, but makes no provision for unmarried adults, male or female, resulting in injustice to all unmarried adults.

Art. 1064, Revised Civil Statutes, classifies women, infants and lunatics together for purpose of redemption of property tax sale.

Probate Code Section 190(a) makes father natural guardian of minor child and entitled to be appointed guardian of minor's estate.

Probate Code Section 177 (a) gives husband right to administer wife's one-half community property on her death to the exclusion of her executor but denies such right to surviving wife.

Eleven miles of highway from Comstock to the Pecos River will be levelled and topped and bids on the work have been called for Feb. 17 letting, according to information from the Texas Highway Department.

Bids will be let by the Highway Commission on the only Val Verde County job scheduled.

SP Derailment Delays Train Traffic

A derailment of a westbound freight train about four miles east of Langtry Tuesday night piled up about 28 cars and several of the cars were burned.

No estimate of the damage loss was available at this writing, nor had the cause of the accident been determined.

There were no personal injuries reported to crewmen on the train.

Passenger Train No. 2, eastbound, was tied up in the Sanderson yards after 11:00 o'clock Tuesday night but was cleared to go ahead after emergency repairs to the track were completed early Wednesday afternoon.

Communication wires and signal wires at the wreck site were damaged and no communication was available from Langtry.

The Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene of the wreck and sent one unit and five men to the scene.

Dedication of Park's Tunnel Road Is Planned Soon

Governor Price Daniel will be asked to invite in behalf of the Big Bend Park Development Committee, a high government official to be principal speaker at the dedication of Texas' only surface highway tunnel that was recently completed, and also the Rio Grande Village, which is under construction in Big Bend National Park. Those named to the Governor's committee by Hugh White, newly elected chairman of the Big Bend National Park Development Committee are Maurice Bullock, Fort Stockton; Norman Davis, Marfa; John L. Dodson, Del Rio; Joe Pouns, Pecos; D. C. Thrift, Van Horn.

Dedication of new Big Bend National Park facilities of which the tunnel is an important part was the first business undertaking by the new directors and executive committee, elected at the general meeting Monday evening in Alpine and attended by over 50 representatives from towns in this West Texas area.

Those elected to serve on the executive committee, beside Chairman White, who was elected by acclamation, are: Harry L. Hubbard, Marfa, vice-chairman; Paul Forcheimer, Alpine, secretary; Dick Rogers, Alpine, treasurer. Newly elected directors include Bill Cope and Clayton Williams of Fort Stockton; Bob Bledsoe, Dutch Arthur, Marfa; Jack Milam and Ed McAnally, McCamey; Bob McGouirk and K. Schloemer, Balmorhea; Judge Felix McLaughlin, Alpine.

Following the general meeting the directors met and elected additional directors. These include: Presley Bryant, Fort Worth; Buck Lanier, El Paso and Peter Koch, Alpine, who will also serve as executive director.

Guest speaker at the meeting was Stanley Joseph, new superintendent, who outlined the projects of Mission 66 and made recommendations concerning the organization of dedication plans. Paul Forcheimer, who was chairman of the Big Bend National Park Committee when the park was dedicated, will act as chairman of the tunnel dedication committee; and Hank Schmidt of Big Bend National Park, will handle the arrangements in the park.

Appropriate ceremonies at the tunnel will also dedicate the facilities provided to make accessible the Rio Grande Village. This includes the construction of three bridges and approaches, six miles of road; five miles of camp ground roads; construction of 50 camp units and three campsites. Also the irrigation and water system and the planting of 90,000 trees and such other developments which will add to the comfort of Big Bend National Park visitors.

Everyone expressed enthusiasm for the program of the Big Bend National Park Development Committee and considered the dedication ceremonies an opportunity for this area to show real West Texas hospitality.

Paul Patterson Contestant In 'Outstanding Teacher' Race

The Crane Study Club has nominated Paul Patterson as the outstanding teacher of the year in a contest sponsored by Dist. 8, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

Valentine Cookies For A Sentimental Surprise
"Be My Valentine" is sweetly stated with this pretty hearts-and-flowers arrangement of crisp, golden Valentine cookies, colorfully decorated with icing or cinnamon candies.
