LISTEN TO LUKE

Luke was fighting mad the other day.

Usually, in politics, one can expect digs of almost any kind, but it is preposterous and beyond the imagination for some of his critics to accuse him of deliberately concealing facts that they are entitled to know from the people. All of you know that there are some things that must be kept in secret because of the big mouths of some in this country who are always glad to tell our enemies. There are some Senators who are constantly accusing the present administration of something or other for their own political advantages but few would stoop to the level of accusing him of dishonesty or lying to the people.

Dwight Eisenhower may not be the most brilliant president in our history, but none has surpassed him in honesty, integrity, sincerity. He has not been a hog to power. He has not pretended to know it all, as have one or two of his predecessors. But he far exceeds all of his critics in integrity and a desire to do the right thing at the right time, regardless of partisan politics.

If he has made a mistake in carrying out a defense program for this country, it has been an honest mistake. It is "despicable" if he is charged, for critics to say otherwise.

Those critics are mostly Democrats who are willing to stoop to any level to get in the White House. We should keep our heads when we hear reckless charges so skeptical about personal vindictiveness.

Party affiliation does not make a person more or less qualified than any other person.

Eisenhower has showed more devotion to his country in more ways than most people like to think about, because of their actions during times of crisis.

We are curious! How many people who bought trees recently under the Chamber's planting project, have checked to see if they are still alive and thriving?

Just for the heck of it, we would like to have a card from our tree buyers to learn about how the trees are doing.

April 2 there will be an election of the school board majority number — four places are to be filled out of the seven-member board. Three of the incumbents have asked for re-election and we think they definitely should be re-elected.

If you want to know why and that difference it makes, and how come we are so interested — we will tell you.

At the time of this writing there are no other candidates and if there were, we doubtless would have this to say anyway.

These men are in the majority and an election of four new members could mean a complete change in plans and policies concerning the new elementary building. It would also mean a complete re-hashing of all the plans thus far to bring a new majority board up to date. It would mean a delay, a handicap, a bottleneck and a detriment to the action and duties of the board.

The salary is nothing, the praise is seldom, the condemnation is severe and frequent, the work is sufficient, the frequency of the meetings is as often as necessary.

If there is a change needed, we don't know about it and we will be glad to air any reason why any of the announced candidates should not be returned to office in their capacity as school board members if we knew any.

As it stands now, there is one vacancy for would-be candidates — four spots to be filled and three candidates — so all would-be candidates can jump in and let the county voters know who is running.

Highway Patrolman Virtually Assured For Sanderson Area

Capt. Ray Butler of the Midland district office of the Texas Highway Patrol, Department of Public Safety, and Sgt. R. W. Howie, of the Pecos sub-district office, were in Sanderson Tuesday morning to confer with Sheriff Buster Babb and other citizens here.

Captain Butler stated that it would be the effort of the Midland office to station a highway patrolman at Sanderson within the year if at all possible and added that this would be a two-man station as soon as patrolmen were available.

Sheriff Babb and other interested citizens have been working on securing a Highway Patrolman for Sanderson for several months.

Capt. Butler stated that he had had several conversations with Major Wilson E. Spier, who commands this district of the Highway Patrol, and they realized the urgency and the need of a station in Sanderson, but that the shortage of patrolmen over the state in other critical areas, made it difficult to secure a patrolman for Sanderson at this time.

Capt. Butler stated that he appreciated the attitude of the citizens here and the help and cooperation received by Sheriff Babb and others in the work of the Highway Patrolmen who come to Sanderson from time to time.

Legion Auxiliary Speaks Opposition On National Issue

Elimination of the oath of allegiance to the United States and of the non-communist affidavit as prerequisites for obtaining student loans under the terms of the National Defense Education Act will be opposed by the American Legion and its Auxiliary during the coming session of Congress.

Due to rejection of these student loans by several colleges because of objection to the oath of allegiance, it is expected that bills to eliminate the oath of allegiance will be introduced in Congress. Any American worthy of educational assistance from our government should be proud to stand up and pledge allegiance to the United States, the two organizations state. They also feel that refusal to sign an affidavit that one is not a communist would seem to indicate that the student is a communist or a "crackpot" upon whom educational assistance would be wasted.

During the past session of Congress the oath of allegiance and non-communist provisions of the loan were almost eliminated. At its national convention in Minneapolis last August, the American Legion passed a resolution opposing such elimination, and the women of the American Legion Auxiliary stand firmly with the Legion in opposition to eliminating this safeguard for educational aid funds.

More than 2,000 teachers from West Texas are expected at the meeting. The Sanderson schools will dismiss classes on Thursday and Friday for the local teacher to attend the meeting.

The convention will close Saturday, March 5, after the meeting of the District House of Delegates and election of officers.

Season's Coldest Hits This Area On Wednesday

The coldest weather of the winter season hit this area Wednesday morning early plunging the mercury down to about 15. A stiff wind accompanied the cold weather.

Blowing sleet and snow were visible Wednesday morning with little moisture noticed in the falling weather.

The fine sleet and snow blew like sand and piled in drifts next to fences, curbs, houses, etc., but not covering the ground where it hit, due to its dryness and the strong winds.

Visibility was somewhat restricted due to the precipitation.

Many water pipes were reported frozen which had not frozen during the earlier cold spell and the wind was forcing the cold deeper through coats and jackets worn by residents here.

Ranchmen Seek Relief from Imports Of Lamb, Mutton

San Angelo — Two representatives of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association are to go to Washington next month for the hearing on lamb and mutton imports before the U.S. Tariff Commission. The hearing is to be held March 22.

Jerry Puckett, Fort Stockton, a director of the TS&GRA, is to be one of the two, says L. M. Stephens of Lometa, TS&GRA president. The other remains to be selected.

Representatives of the National Wool Growers' Association and other western grower associations affiliated with the National are also to attend the hearings.

It is also expected that the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, and probably the American National Cattlemen's Association will have representatives at the hearings since cattlemen have expressed some concern over the possibility of more beef being imported into the United States.

Imports of both frozen and live lamb from Australia have been on the increase and many growers feel these imports are definitely affecting the price of domestic meats. They believe the domestic market will improve if imports are halted, or put on a quota basis.

TS&GRA directors have been urged through letters from the headquarters office here, to write their U.S. senators and representatives and explain the real situation and describe how these imports have affected the lamb and mutton trade in their particular areas.

Elton Carroll Second Alternate For T.F.T.A. Scholarship

Students from nearly every area of the state took honors in the Texas Future Teachers of America convention at North Texas State College last Saturday. More than 1100 high school delegates registered for the two-day program.

Elton Carroll was named second alternate for the boys for the \$1,000 college scholarship.

Roadrunners Cop Crown In District Tournament

The Sanderson Roadrunners won the district championship in girls' basketball for the third straight year. The title was won Monday night at Marfa in a double-elimination tournament of the three teams comprising the district: Sanderson, Marfa and Fabens.

The girls have been working under Coach Y. F. Bowley and Assistant Coach Zeima Strickland.

In the first game of the tournament, Sanderson vs Marfa, the local girls lost a 45-42 game.

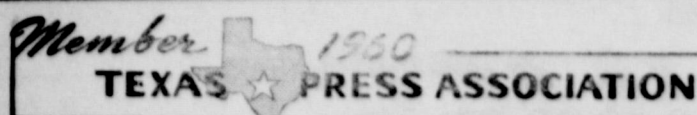
