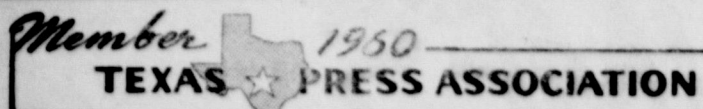

sonalities and friendships, but vote only for the good of the schools.

This week is, among other things, National Wildlife Week. A folder we received points out that the key to wildlife conservation is water conservation. We heartily support this theory and its purpose.

Wildlife has meant much to this particular area in the past and, according to the booming interest in big game hunting, will mean much more to this area if proper conservation methods are practiced rigidly. This practice is, of course, primarily and secondarily up to the ranchmen — without whom there would be no hunting of any kind whatsoever. Most people in these parts are familiar with the methods and reasons for wildlife conservation and will go along with the ranchmen all the way in doing what they can to help in such practice.

There seems to have been a violent outbreak of automobile accidents in this immediate vicinity in recent weeks and it behooves us all to be very careful when driving a car. We could not

say that any of the wrecks might have been prevented with closer supervision by law enforcement officers, but we could say for certain that probably all the accidents could have been prevented if the drivers had been more careful.

Strict law enforcement and stiff fines for all violators is a very effective deterrent usually for other subsequent violations and even causes other drivers to think a little bit before taking a chance while driving. Certainly we favor deterrent or preventive action as well as punishment for violators after an accident has occurred.

What we favor more is careful and polite consideration on the part of all drivers to help prevent accidents.

The lack of this is what causes more strict enforcement of the laws and punishment thereof.

We thought it interesting and note that recently an article appearing in a San Antonio paper stated that car dealers there were concerned because buyers of that metropolis were going to smaller outlying towns to buy cars because dealers there could sell at a cheaper price due to the lack of overhead. Car dealers, at the same time, in smaller towns are complaining because buyers are going into the cities to make their car purchases since dealers there

can sell cheaper because of their volume business.
