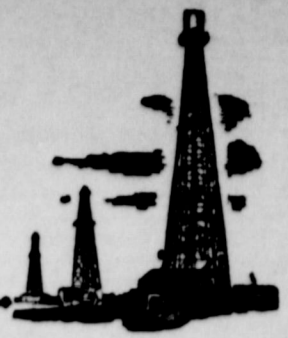

Bi-District Game Here Saturday For Eagle Ball Team

The Sanderson Eagles will play a bi-district baseball game on the local diamond Saturday afternoon at 3:30 against a team from Petersburg, which is about 30 miles north of Lubbock.

Petersburg was the foe last year in bi-district competition and Sanderson won 9-2 behind the 2-hit pitching of Celestino Fuentes. Fuentes is also slated for pitching chores here Saturday.

Admission will be 75c for adult admission and 25c for all students. Coach Gerald Petersen asked for the support of all local fans at the game.

Local Business Changes Made

Some changes have been made to some local businesses during the past several days. Dudley's Texaco Station this week received a porcelain finish to the exterior which improved the appearance of the station considerably.

Sections of porcelainized metal were affixed to the exterior in the green and white color scheme. The Adams Hobby Shop has received a new exterior coat of paint and some changes noted in the outside cactus garden and flower garden area. The new appearance is an added attraction to the appearance of the business district.

Work is virtually complete on the enlarging of Mac's Package Store. Interior painting was finished the first of the week and the stock will be re-arranged in the next few days.

The Lawrence James Co. has moved a large portion of merchandise to their new location in the Brown Building next door to the store. The interior was painted a light green, new light fixtures installed, and a new tile floor added.

Mr. James stated that he hoped to complete the move within the next few days. Peg boards will be added to sections on the wall for the display of small items of his merchandise.

El Paso Natural Gas Co. To Build 16 Homes at CO₂ Plant Site in Co.

Work will begin immediately on the construction of 16 new houses at the site of the carbon dioxide extraction plant in the Brown-Basett gas field in eastern Terrell County.

Survey work was completed on Tuesday of this week laying out lots, streets and boundaries for the community which, besides the houses, will have an office building and a recreation hall or community house for the residents. The streets will be curbed, guttered, and paved and there will be a snake-proof fence surrounding the entire residential area.

Thirteen of the houses will have two bedrooms and three will have three bedrooms. The houses will be of permanent design and construction and

will be used by the maintenance and operation employees of the carbon dioxide extraction plant. There are two water wells in the immediate area that were drilled recently to furnish water needed for the operation of the plant and the domestic needs of the employees.

Summer Classes For Non-English Talkers To Be Available

The 56th Legislature has authorized a pre-school instructional program for non-English speaking children. The act provides for the financing of instructional units in public school districts from which school officials have applied for and received approval from the Texas Education Agency. The purpose of the special program is to prepare non-English speaking children for entry into the first grade with a command of essential English words which will afford them a better opportunity to complete successfully the work assigned to them.

The Terrell County Independent School District has set up a summer program for non-English speaking children for this summer. The program as set up and approved by the Texas Education Agency will begin June 6, 1960, and operate through August 15, 1960, and will have a net of 50 days of instruction. Students who attend this summer school will be required to be present from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon daily from Mondays through Fridays. The teacher must be on duty from 8:00 a.m. on. There will be no classes in the afternoons. The class will be held in the Junior High Building since the Lamar Building will be undergoing repairs during the summer months. Any child who reaches the age of six on or before September 1 of the ensuing year who will be eligible for initial enrollment in the first grade may be enrolled in the program. Birth certificates to verify their birthdays will be required of all children. Only children who do not understand and speak the common English language words which are necessary for normal progress in the first grade will be admitted. This is a voluntary program and students are not required to attend. No bus will operate. However, all non-English speaking students who will be at least six years of age on September 1 and who have never attended school are urged to take advantage of the program so that they can make normal progress in the first grade next fall. Every effort is being made by the school officials to enroll all non-English speaking first graders in the summer program. The V.F.W. will also help in getting every eligible child to take advantage of the summer school.

We doubt that there is any chance to change anyone's mind about voting Saturday in the Lyndon Johnson Primary, so we won't waste time doing that. The various candidates over the county and state have been stumping in efforts to accomplish that and the results will be known Saturday night.

What we would like to accomplish is getting the citizens out to the polls to cast their ballots. We have lots of preferences in the voting, but our greatest preference is that the vote cast is representative of the people — all of them.

What should be of great interest to the people of Texas is their selection of a governor. There are many things that could come from the selection of either of the major candidates.

Also of primary interest to the people of Terrell County is the selection of a sheriff to hold that office for the next four years. This is an important job and important work always looms before a candidate who might be elected to that office. Sanderson is in a position to need and demand some top-notch law enforcement during the next few years, which will serve as a basis for the type of law enforcement the citizens will demand during many years to come.

People have the tendency to get into a habit of a type of law enforcement and forgetting what should be done in those matters. Of time, because they forget or don't know what can be done. There is little basis for choosing the right candidate for this job other than basing an opinion on the acts of the incumbent with the potentialities of the opponents.

That is the issue, not personalities, but potentialities. We have always favored and will always favor strict law enforcement. We think there is no better way to make and keep a town "clean" than by having effective law enforcement.

That job, done effectively, seldom makes friends among the law violators, but should cause law-abiding citizens to offer willingly their support both in a political race, and in the support of the officer in his job of upholding the law.

A sheriff's job in a small county such as this one, is almost entirely the apprehension of violators, investigation of crimes, and through respect for the man and his ability, a great amount of prevention.

Of course, we are supporting one candidate in this race, but we pledge our support to the winner in his every act of law enforcement and would oppose by loyalty, partiality, or indifference on his part, whoever he might be.

Go on and vote! Drilling activity is resuming in Terrell County at a faster pace. The beginning of the construction of the carbon dioxide extraction plant is expected daily. The construction of the pipeline is slated to begin very soon.

Lots of activity in Sanderson and Terrell County is looming in the immediate future. This should cause a stir of activity of some kind locally, even if no more than of tongues.

Much has been said recently in the importance of party politics. We will not add to or take from anything that has been said in this light.

The important thing is — if party politics are important to you — if you give a darn what kind of delegation goes to the state convention — if you care how the late goes in party politics — attend the precinct and county conventions.

AUSTIN — Saturday is "speak now or forever hold your peace" day in Texas.

Or, to say the least, the voter who does not express an opinion at the polls and precinct conventions this week should hold his peace about what happens in Texas during the next two years.

A number of important decisions as to office holders will be made Saturday. Once made, they are final — for two years or even four years.

At this point in the campaigns, almost all candidates and their supporters believe that if there is a big enough turnout Saturday their side will win handily. And those who aren't pleased with the way things turn out likely will blame it on those who do not bother to show up.

Equally as important as the primaries are the precinct conventions to be held the same day. This is the only means by which the individual voter can participate in the selection of the presidential nominee.

New Highway Signs Due
New highway signs, bigger and more colorful than any used before, will begin appearing soon on the interstate highways in Texas.

Highway Commission has ordered the posting of route markers and guide signs on 707 miles of interstate highway now completed or under construction in the state.

Conspicuously absent in this marking system will be stop signs. Completion of the 41,000-mile system of controlled access roads will make possible coast-to-coast and border-to-border driving without a stop sign or traffic light.

Motorists soon will become familiar with the interstate marker — a red, white, and blue shield. Texas Highway Department designed the shield which

later was adopted for the entire national system.

All markers and guide signs will be larger than usual. Advance exit signs will be placed about two miles ahead of interchanges to give motorists plenty of time to plan their next move.

Guide signs will have white letters and symbols on a green background, and signs for rest and service areas will have green letters on a reflectorized white background. Warning and yield signs will remain in the familiar yellow and black but will grow in dimensions.

Texas leads the nation in the number of miles of interstate highway: completed and under way. Texas' allotment is 3,033 miles of which 697 are finished and 259 are in some stage of progress.

Schools' Share Down
Texas is spending a smaller proportion of its tax revenue on education now than it did 10 years ago.

This statement was issued by the Texas State Teachers Association in support of its drive for enactment of the Hale-Aikin program for school improvement.

In 1958-59, says the report, Texas spent 29.67 cents of each tax dollar for public school education. In the last completed school year the percentage was 27.38 cents of each dollar.

During that period public school spending more than doubled — from \$156,000,000 to \$322,000,000 — to keep pace with a 57

per cent increase in students and 49 per cent increase in teachers. But spending for other purposes increased faster.

Gov. Price Daniel has said he would like to call a special session after the elections to erase the deficit and raise teachers' pay. But he also said it would depend on getting agreement from legislators.

Costly Error
Texas Supreme Court has returned to district court for retrial a case involving a \$100,000 mistake in arithmetic.

An employee of an Arlington contractor made the error in submitting a bid of \$534,175 instead of \$634,226 to the local school board for a school building job. After the bid was accepted by the board, the contractor discovered the error and refused to carry out the contract.

Board then awarded the bid to the second low bidder and sued the first contractor for the \$66,278 difference between the second low bid and the bid they had first accepted.

Supreme Court members disagreed on the case, wrote three different opinions but all agreed it should be re-tried.

Who Owns the Oil?
Another question under consideration by the attorney general's department is "who owns rights to the minerals under county roads."

Request for an opinion was submitted by Jack Cook, county attorney for Kleberg County.

Ultimately to be decided is whether state and local government can claim the right to mineral development of the right of way of some 228,000 miles of streets and highways in Texas.

New Sign Directs OST Travel



Standing 28 feet tall, a Spanish Conquistador from the early days of the area stands on a sign, directing cross-country traffic along the Old Spanish Trail in Van Horn. The Conquistador is the trade-mark for the Old Spanish Trail Association, chosen from the time of Coronado, who rode west through this area seeking the Aztec cities of silver and gold.

The Van Horn sign is erected four blocks from the confluence of Highway 90 and one from the north, and the Conquistador, topped by a big red arrow pointing the way, directs the tourists to keep on the Old Spanish Trail. "The sign is fully lighted," J. L. Dodson Jr. of Del Rio, vice president of the national OST and state president of the Texas organization, said last week. "It works 24 hours a day to keep tourists along the Old Spanish Trail the name being used for Highway 90 from coast to coast," Dodson explained.

"The sign cost \$1,200, is 32 feet wide with the Conquistador standing 28 feet tall from his toe to his hand. His boots are six

feet tall, and he can be seen for a long way. The Old Spanish Trail Association paid \$600 on the sign and the other \$600 was contributed by interested supporters of the OST from Van Horn to Del Rio.

The Conquistador at Van Horn matches one at Lordsburg, N.M., directing traffic on the Old Spanish Trail to Tucson. "Westbound traffic over the OST has increased 20 per cent since the sign was erected," Dodson said.

The annual meeting of the national Old Spanish Trail Association will be held in El Paso May 20 and 21 for the election of

officers. The El Paso Chamber of Commerce will be hosts for the meeting with a party planned for the night of May 20 and the business session the following day.

"Anyone interested in promoting travel along the Old Spanish Trail, Highway 90 east and west is welcome to attend the meeting in El Paso and I hope a good representation will make the trip," Dodson said.

Efforts are being made to organize a local chapter of the OST Assn. to work with the national and state organizations in promoting travel over the cross-country route.

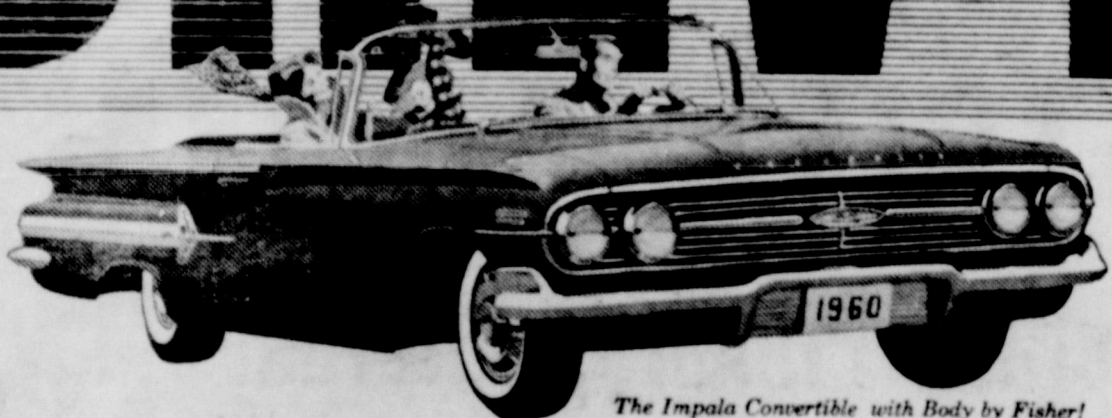

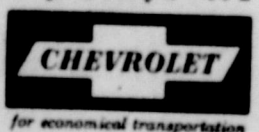

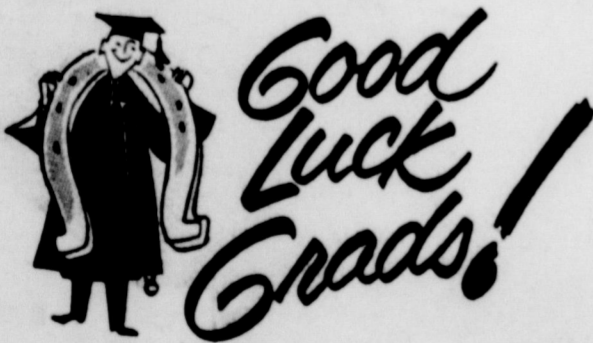
