While there they visited with Mrs. Happle's sister, Mrs. S. C. Guyer, and returned home Monday.

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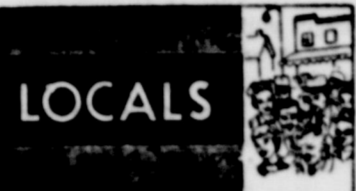

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Twenty men to lick an invading force of three warships! But Captain Isaac W. Burton's men were Texas Rangers. It was 1835. His little company had a good long stretch of beach to patrol, the Texas Gulf coast. Orders were to look out for Mexicans and get 'em. On June 3 they saw a ship in the bay of Copano. Said Captain like, "We can't swim, so we'll make 'em come after us!" History doesn't detail the encounter used, perhaps a Mexican flag or a petticoat, but a boat promptly came ashore. Just as promptly captured, the rowers were forced to take Captain Burton and a dozen Rangers out to the ship. Very soon, with Captain like in command, the ship was headed for Velasco, at the mouth of the Brazos. But contrary winds delayed her. Not ill winds, for while she was holed up, two other Mexican ships showed up. The Ranger Captain, with the unwilling assistance of the Mexican skipper, decoyed their officers aboard his prize ship. When the winds eased a bit the entire prize flotilla eased up to Velasco landing to deliver about \$25,000 worth of arms and supplies to the Texas Army. Thereafter, much to their embarrassment and chagrin, Captain Isaac W. Burton and his sea-going Rangers were known frontier-wide as the "horse marines."

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SCS Technicians Of Area Meet Here

Soil Conservation Service technicians of the Trans-Pecos area of Texas held a range conference at Sanderson on April 27 and 28.

The meeting was conducted by Soil Conservation Service range specialists to keep all technicians abreast of the latest developments in the field of range conservation.

The group made a forage inventory of the Joe N. Brown ranch, west of Sanderson. This inventory was analyzed to determine the safe starting stocking rate for the ranch and the best periods for use or rest for each pasture to get range improvements.

Management of vegetation is the key to conservation of soil and water resources on rangeland, according to the technicians. Any other practice or group of practices can only be temporary for conservation ranching on a long-time basis, they stated.

The Soil Conservation Service can assist district cooperators in making and evaluating forage inventories on their rangeland.
