Pecos County Well On Terrell Line Is Potential Gasser

A Pecos County wildcat in a section adjacent to the Terrell County line, has proven to be a gasser, according to information received recently. The hole is being drilled by Shell Oil Co. and Humble Oil Co. on section 19, Block A2 in the TCRR Survey. This section has as its south line, the north line of Terrell County and is on a section adjacent to the Shell and Humble 1 Smith in section 5, Block A2 of the TCRR Survey.

The newest gasser for that area is named Blacksone Slaughter and is the No. 1 well for the

Ellenburger pay was indicated with the flowing of gas and recovery of condensate on a twohour and 15-minute drillstem test between 10,029-075 feet.

Gas surfaced in nine minutes at the estimated rate of 600,000 cubic feet daily, decreasing in two hours to 350,000 cubic feet

Recovery was 90 feet of slightly gas-cut mud, 90 feet of heavily gas and condensate-cut mud. Gravity of the condensate was 53 degrees.

Flowing pressure was 520-370 pounds; initial 30-minute shut-in pressure was 4,680 pounds; and final 30-minute shut-in pressure was 2,180 pounds.

The project was bottomed at 10,125 feet in lime and dolomite. preparing to run logs at last re-

Connell sand production was indicated earlier with the flowing of gas at the rate of 7,000,000 cubic feet daily on a test between 9.993-10.020 feet.

Production was indicated still earlier in an unidentified formation with the flowing of gas at the maximum rate of 20,000,000 cubic feet and the recovery of 40 feet of condensate on a test between 8,270-98 feet.

by the Texas Safety Association. Excessive speed was the principal cause-factor in 53 per cent of every rural fatal traffic accident in Texas during 1959, according to the general manager of the Texas Safety Association.

He pointed out that excessive speed does not necessarily mean violating a speed law, but driving at any speed which is too fast for conditions such as heavy traffic. rain storms, dust storms, a

mechanically poor car, etc. The importance and stress is being placed on prudence and courtesy in driving and regulating speed to the conditions of all things and all persons involv-

ed, including one's self. "A bit of common sense goes a long way in traffic safety. Every driver on the road must accept his responsibility and remember to drive safely," the manager

Booster Pump Loss Causes Concern Of Local Water

The failure of a booster pump in the local water system caused some concern and discomfort to some local residents during the past several days.

Jimmy Caroline, manager of the local utility, has been doing

Jimmy Caroline asked Thursday morning that The Times publish a plea to all local residents to please not use water outside until the new pump comes in and is installed. This will enable him to keep water in the tank for inside necessities for all resi-

all in his power to keep a supply of water in the big storage tank so that all residents of the town would have some water to meet their necessities, but such efforts were almost in vain on Wednesday at this writing.

The booster pump lifts the water from other storage tanks up to the big storage tank on the hill on the west side of Sanderson. The heighth of this tank supplies needed pressure to put an ample supply of water into the the mains for furnishing al. local houses with their water needs.

There was not at any time a shortage of water, according to Caroline, except in the big storage tank

Since the installation of the booster pump, local water consupplion has been so great that the pump has been unable to get ahead of the consumption and put a supply of water in the big storage tank thus giving the town the pressure that is needed or

Some restricts on the high side of to or. Lave been without water for short periods and have been short on water pressure for the past several days because of the low level of water in the big tank.

Water was cut off in certain sections of town Tuesday afternoon in order to try to give the booster pump an opportunity to get ahead of consumption.

Caroline asked that in the future, if such situations exist after the loss of the use of certin equipment, that people refrain from the excessive use of water for watering, etc., until the full capacity of the system can

be restored. Caroline stated that all efforts are being made to keep the utility in first-class working order to maintain the supply to meet the increased summer demand for water, and that the cooperation of the residents would certainly be appreciated during an emergency.

A Wolfcamp gas discovery was indicated in Terrell County with the flowing of gas at the maximum daily rate of 5,100,000 cubic feet at the Sinclair Oil and Gas Co. No. 1 Alma H. Poulter, located in section 1 of Block 21 in the TCRR Survey and is 41/2 miles northwest of the Brown-Bassett (Ellenburger and Silurian) field.

This is the third swimming pool which has been added to local motel facilities for the attraction of travelers.


JP Court Cases

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Austin - Texas Democrats are starting a fresh page in their history. The era when the party could be split on the basis of who voted for Eisenhower in 1952 is

Only thing which could revive that long-cherished bone of contention would be for the Party to nominate a ticket so distasteful to Texans that the state would again go Republican.

At the state convention Democrats of widely varying views united behind the Lyndon Johnson banner to bury the extreme lovalists of the DOT in the most overwhelmingly lopsided vote in party history.

Even the seasoned political reporters were caught off balance by the 2,252 to 40 vote by which the DOT proposal was defeated. They used such unaccustomed adjectives as "astounding" to describe the victory.

State Executive Committee proposed a loyalty pledge binding on state party officials, delegates to Los Angeles and presi-

DOT insisted that in addition, a leadership can keep it. loyalty pledge should be circulated among the county delegations and that no one should be allowed to stay in the state convention the very conservative delegation hall unless he signed it.

DOT did everything possible to fan the issue. Blurred, hastily printed flyers headed "Who Says Party Loyalty Is A False Issue?" were scattered outside the convention hall. Flyers showed a picture of GGov. Price Daniel in-

Johnson made his triumphal entry to the accompaniment of marching placard-carriers, music and cheers. When the tumult ended and Johnson began to speak, the Harris County delegation, which had voted not to support Johnson, booed at the end of each statement. It was an awkward moment.

Senator Johnson, who was discussing his experiences in the U. S. Senate in working with men of such contrary views as Senator Byrd of Virginia and Senator Morse of Oregon, departed from the text of his speech.

Despite their differences, said Johnson, these senators "always behave in a courteous and gentlemanly manner.

Texas Republican leaders are saying, in effect, that they won't fight among themselves but will save their strength to fight Democrats in the general election next fall. 



Juvenile delinquency has been one of our more widely discussed topics, in reent years. Much has been said about the probable nuses of juvenile delinquency, possible cures or corrections, and the effects of delinquents on

the public. I have never worked with children in a public capacity, but as the mother of ten children, and having had experience with the children who seem to prefer the Jones-sized peanut butter jar and cracker box, I feel sure that I have a reasonably fair understanding of today's child.

Children are at a loss to understand the actions and behavior of adults at times. They do not understand, because they have not lived long enough to know that it takes all kinds of people to make a world. Not having the ability to understand, they are also less forgiving, especially when an adult commits a cowardly act, such as driving by a person's house at midnight, and shooting his dog in his own yard. I am not a child, and I fail to understand this, myself.

Until adults can conduct themselves in an honest, upright manner, they have no right to attempt to solve the problem of juvenile delinquency. The most that I find wrong with today's child is the deplorable fact that the poor unsuspecting thing may grow up to be an adult delinquent, the kind who goes around in the dark, shooting children's dogs, or committing other cowardly acts, they do not dare commit in the daylight. The Bible reads: "Everyone that doeth evil hateth the light, neither cometh to the light, lest his deeds should be reproved"

After, and only after, the adult has removed the beam from his own eye, will he see well enough to remove the juvenile mote.

If you've ever just missed a call after running in from outside to answer the phone, you know how disappointing it is. Most folks can get to their telephones within a minute, even when they aren't in the house. One minutes is about the time it takes for the phone to ring 10 times.

By waiting at least 10 rings before you hang up, you have a much better chance of getting your call through, especially when the person you're calling is not near the phone. In the long run, you'll save yourself the time and trouble of calling again, and your friends will certainly appreciate your courtesy and patience. So please remember to wait 10 rings - it takes just a minutes.
