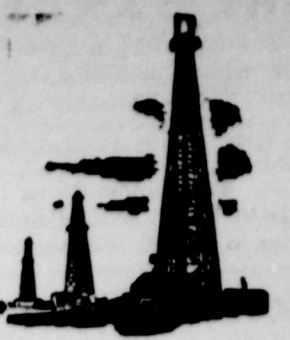

Large Crowd Here For Big Fourth Celebration

A large crowd was in Sanderson for activities planned by the Clarence Hallie Mulkey Post of the American Legion and Auxiliary for the Fourth on Monday of this week.

The activities began with a parade at 9:00 a. m. Monday, followed by a beauty contest at the high school auditorium, a barbecue at noon, roping events in the afternoon and a dance that night. Legionnaires estimated a

crowd of about 800 on hand for the barbecue dinner at the Legion Hall. There was an ample supply of barbecued goat and salad, but a shortage of cakes and a near-shortage of beans. The Legionnaires offered their apologies for these shortages but said they were just unable to anticipate the crowd.

The roping club stated that the crowd of spectators and participants at the roping events was the largest since the 50th anniversary celebration of the county several years ago.

The concrete slab beside the Legion Hall was the site for the dance Saturday night and it is said that a large crowd was on hand for that occasion to enjoy the coolness of the outdoors for the evening's entertainment.

Pipeline Work Is Progressing

Work is progressing on the installation of the pipeline to carry processed gas from the Brown-Bassett gas field in Terrell County to near Puckett field in Pecos County. Work is expected to last about 18 more working days on the welding of the pipe, according to information received.

Crews will then install the pipe in the ditch and cover the ditch prior to completion of the project.

Three caterpillars equipped with a crane and generators are on the scene and four welders work from each caterpillar in welding the pipe.

Rainfall Covers Area

Good rains were reported over most of the county Tuesday, with moisture up to 2 inches left in some gauges in the north-central part of the county.

Some rain, 1.7-inches, was reported south of Sanderson and the rains in that direction appeared to be general in that vicinity.

Rains were reported west of Sanderson to Marathon and Al

pine, north to Fort Stockton and Odessa and in the Dryden area.

The rains began falling in the early hours of the morning on Tuesday and intermittent showers and rains fell locally all day Tuesday and Tuesday night. The weather was still threatening and heavy overcasts were prevailing Wednesday.

Downie Draw, Sanderson Canyon, and Big Canyon were all reported to be running Tuesday.

Approximately 1 inch of rain fell locally Monday night and Tuesday and about 60-inch of rain fell Tuesday night locally. Dryden reported 1.30-inch rainfall Tuesday night.

Rainfall Tuesday night over the county was reported general with Big Canyon and Downie Draws still running Wednesday morning.

Heavy clouds remained Wednesday and light mists fell during the morning in Sanderson.

Some thunder and lightning accompanied the rains Tuesday night.

Up to six inches of rain had been reported in some portions of the county up to Wednesday noon, including area is the center portions of the county, according to word received here.

State Capital NEWS

When the various states go to battle to capture new industries, other states go in with cannon-sized budgets. But not Texas.

Texas is, by comparison, fighting with a rubber band and spit balls. At least that's the view of the man who heads Texas' effort, Walter E. Dickerson.

Dickerson, as executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, directs himself. He has no staff and no secretary. Legislature allotted him \$23,750 a year to do a job for which the neighboring "poor" state of Arkansas spends more than a half-million a year.

Dickerson uses his slim funds for a brochure on Texas and, since out-of-state travel is impossible, long-distance telephoning. He's also seeking additional funds from Texas firms to carry on the work.

Next winter he'll be before the Legislature to ask for more money to give Texas an even break in the intensely competitive industry-seeking field.

Dickerson's pleas come against a background of warnings that Texas manufacturing has not been growing fast enough to offset the decline of oil and agriculture. Some areas, such as the Gulf Coast, are becoming highly industrialized, but Texas needs more industry all over, say the economists, if it is to avoid a stall.

More manufacture of products for the Texas consumer market is especially recommended. Dickerson has data showing that Texans send \$2,500,000,000 of their money out of state to buy manufactured products.

Dickerson also supports his urging for a beefed-up Industrial Commission with figures showing that new industry is literally "money in the bank" for a town and state.

For each industry with 100 employees — not a particularly big one — bank deposits jump \$270,000 and retail sales \$360,000 per year.

Business Totals Tumble
Texas' most recent business activity reports are not entirely rosy, either.

Retail trade for May was down 2 per cent from April and 4 per cent from a year ago, according to the University Bureau of Business Research.

Building construction was also in a downward decline, 3 per cent from April and 11 per cent from last year. Building decline between April and May was due to a sharp drop in home build-

ing. Non residential construction was up 3 per cent.

Slow down in retail buying was unexpected, inasmuch as employment, income and savings are at an all-time high. An increase in home building is hoped for as a result of eased FHA down payment requirements. More home buying would, in turn, stimulate more retail buying, particularly furniture, appliances and hardware.

Gas Tax Loses Round

Texas' new natural gas severance beneficiary tax flunked its first court test when an Austin district judge ruled it unconstitutional.

Judge Jack Roberts held the tax violated the U. S. Constitution's prohibition against levying a tax on interstate commerce. Severance beneficiary tax is aimed at the natural gas pipeline companies, who, the tax's supporters contend, benefit from taking the gas from Texas soil and should pay a tax for these benefits. Most pipelines operate on a national scale. Producers, the people who actually take the gas from the ground, already pay a tax.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson, representing the state, said he would appeal Robert's decision, probably to the Third Court of Civil Appeals. Since the case involves a constitutional question, it could be appealed directly to the State Supreme Court.

Either way, it will not finally be decided until it gets to the U. S. Supreme Court, probably not in time for the next Legislature to know whether the state can count on any revenue from that source. Estimated yield is about \$7,500,000 a year.

Gov. Price Daniel said he was "keenly disappointed" in the district court decision, especially in

that it saw no difference between the severance beneficiary tax and the old gas gathering tax which lost out in the courts.

Daniel said he was confident this tax eventually would be upheld.

Stray Livestock Law in Force

Farmers are warned to pen up their livestock and keep them penned, or be subject to a \$200 fine and impoundment of the animals.

Each day the animals roam at large will be considered a separate offense.

The new law relates to horses, mules, donkeys, cows, bulls, hogs, steers, sheep, and goats loose on state and federal highways. Farm and ranch roads are not included. Heretofore the motorist was liable.

School Problem Erupts

At the instigation of Texas Commissioner of Education J. W.

Edgar, Brownboro school officials, both board and superintendent, are resigning en masse.

Decision was reached after an involved and rather heated hearing in Austin to review school conflicts that had resulted in a killing at a Brownboro school board meeting.

Homier Bass was appealing his dismissal by the Brownboro school board when his contract as superintendent still had two years to go. Board members charged Bass with instructing new teachers how to vote in the school board elections, handling school funds carelessly and failing to meet state accreditation standards.

Several board members said they felt mass resignation was a good solution that would enable the community to start afresh on a peaceable basis.

Bigger Budget Asked
Three state agencies presented their requests for funds for the Sept. 1, 1961 - Aug. 31, 1963 period. All want more than they are now spending.

Legislative and governor's office budget staffs are reviewing the requests of State Health Department, State Board of Insurance and Texas Employment Commission.

Health wants an 18 per cent increase to a total of \$17,000,000 for the coming biennium. State Board of Insurance is asking \$5,173,664 for the same period, approximately a 20 per cent increase. The TEC estimates its needs at \$28,384,905.

You and the 'BTU'

NO! NO! a "Btu" isn't a Raspberry. It does have an emotional connotation, though it is a British Therman Unit, whether you know it or not, buy millions of them every

as a quart is a measure of buttermilk, so the "Btu" measure of heat. It's about amount of heat put out by a den match. (If you want the definition, dig out your old school physics book... lost mine.) Anyway, it's a size measurement.

When you buy air conditioning, buy "Btu's" of cooling... or amount of heat the air conditioner can take out of the air. You buy heating, you buy "Btu's" to put into the air. The amount of heating or cooling is figured on an hour's basis, so we get "Btu's per hour," what?

Well, the thing to look especially when buying air conditioning is the Btu rating of the air conditioner. Don't let the "snow" you when talk about tons of cooling or horsepower. It's that little old Btu counts. Tons and horsepower, too vague. I've seen some ton or two horsepower advertised; figured in the Btu way they would be able to do 1½ tons of cooling. "Tons of cooling" is based on what required to melt a ton in 24 hours, which equals Btu per hour.)

When comparing cooling equipment, check the specifications for efficiency. Check, too, for electricity consumption. It means dollars to you.

Of course, I'm telling you all this because our Lehnax equipment has the best performance around these parts. And other parts, too.

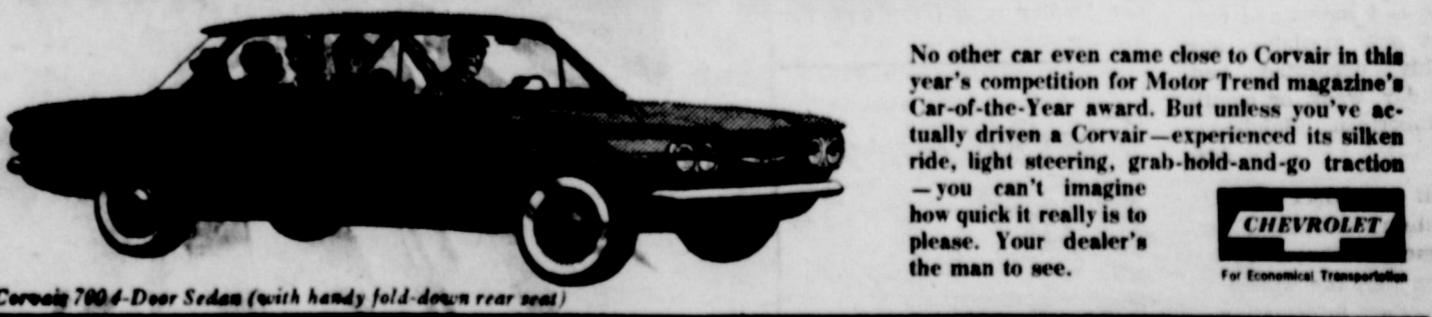

We are glad that the school board had the foresight and faith to work for the new building and get it ready for this year's use.

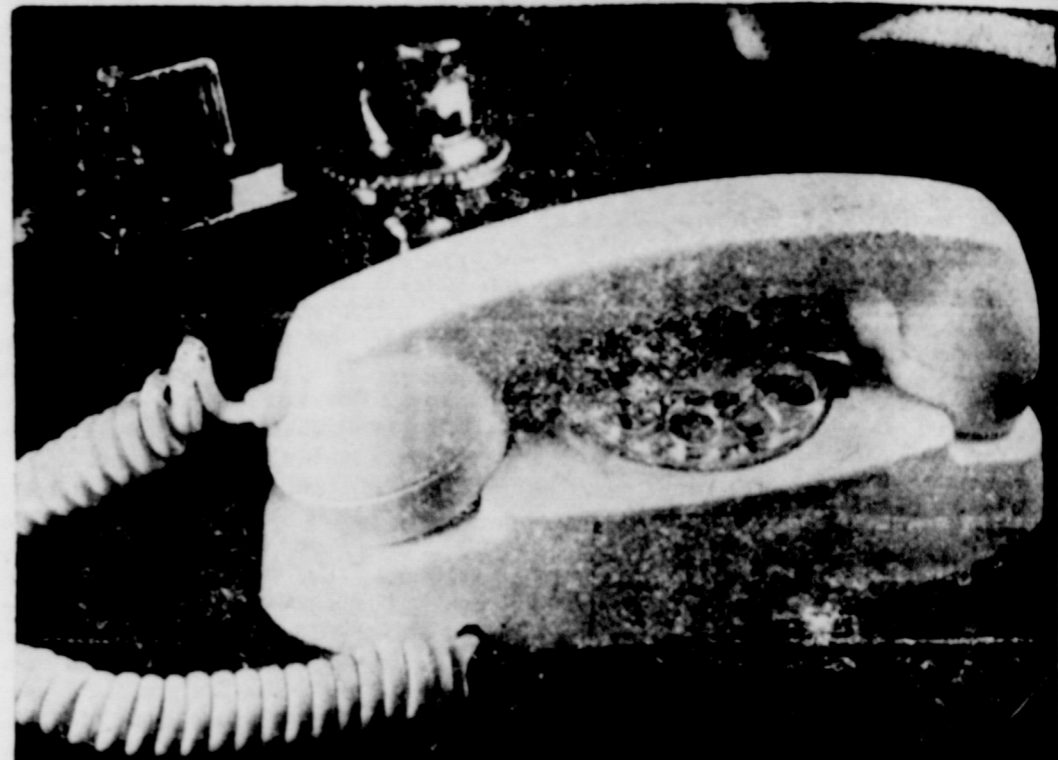
