Shell Oil Co. and Humble Oil and Refining Co. were preparing to run tubing to test through the upper Ellenburger perforations between 10,050-60 feet and 10,082-92 feet at the No. 1 Blackstone-Slaughter in section 19, Block A-2 of the TCRR Survey in Pecos County. The south line of section

Upper Ellenburger production was indicated while being drilled with the flowing of gas at the rate of 600,000 cubic feet daily on a test between 10,020-75 feet.

Connell sand production was indicated with the flowing of gas at the raily rate of 7,000,000 cubic feet daily on a test between 9,993-10,020 feet.

Production was indicated still earlier in an unidentified formation with the flowing of gas at the maximum daily rate of 20,-000,000 cubic feet on a test between 8,270-98 feet.

Possible Changes To Constitution To Be Published

Beginning the first week in August, The Times will publish four proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. The proposals will be submitted for approval of the voters in the general election on November 8. So that you may be fully informed, we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your

We print a brief digest of the four proposed constitutional amendments below:

Number One on the ballot — HJR 39 — Authorizes the Legislature to create hospital districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, and sets forth certain powers, duties and limitations.

Number Two on the ballot — SJR 6 — Increases the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board to three

and one-half per cent.

Number Three on the ballot —
HJR 3 — This bill is what is
known as the "Annual Salary
Bill" for legislators. It provides
for an annual salary of not to exceed \$4,900 for each legislator,
and a per diem allowance of not
to exceed \$12 a day for the first
120 days of each regular session
as maximum compensation for
members of the Legislature. Also
it limits the regular session to 140

Number Four on the ballot HJR 6 - Authorizes the Legislature to classify loans and lenders. license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per cent per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; provides that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; provides for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event of cancellation of or refusal to grant any permit.

County's Valuations Are Up \$285,530.00 For Taxes

The valuation of taxable property in the county was increased by approximately \$285,530.00, according to information received this week from Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax assessor-collector.

Most of the increase was due to the completion of two additional deep gas wells in the county, the addition of several new houses and buildings in Sanderson, and the addition of the assessed valuation of the pipe for the pipe line.

The total tax valuation for the county this year is \$6,718,770.00.

Plant To Use CO2 From Puckett Field

A contract for the construction of a \$500,000 plant to produce liquid carbon dioxide is to be awarded this month, according to information received this week. The plant will be built in the Puckett gas field in Pecos County about 35 miles northwest of Sanderson. West Texas CO2 Co. will operate the plant scheduled to go on the gas stream in October.

Initial capacity of the first plant will be 140 tons of carbon dioxide per day. Production is to increase steadily.

It was pointed out that as there were over 35 million cubic feet of gas available per day, the plant could feasibly produce over 2,000 tons of liquefied carbon dioxide daily.

daily.

The liquid carbon dioxide will be used in secondary oil recovery projects utilizing the process owned and patented by Gil Recovery Corp., and is basically the treatment of a crude oil reservoir with controlled amounts and concentrations of carbon dioxide cr solutions of carbon dioxide.

Carbon dioxide will be extracted from the natural gas in the Brown-Bassett gas field of Terrell County by the plant being erected by the Fluor Corp. for El Paso Natural Gas Co. There has been no indication as yet that the carbon dioxide extracted from the gas at the Terrell County plant will be utilitzed, but there is a possibility that some use will be found for the gas which was heretofore considered a waste product.



He also was chairman of the association's antitrust committee during 1960.
