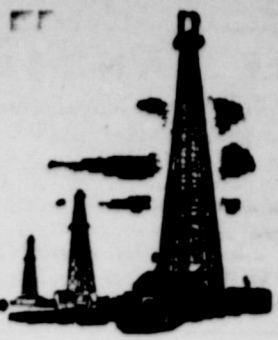

## Seven More Miles Allocated to RM2400 For Construction

The Texas Highway Commission has taken the first step to inaugurate a new two-year Farm-to-Market Program for Texas, Herbert C. Petry, Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission stated last week end. Money for this program is derived from federal funds with matching state funds.

A. J. Sherrod, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department at Odessa, has stated that the following Farm-to-Market road in this area is scheduled for work under this program:

In Terrell County, an extension of RM2400 Northeast approximately 7.0 miles.

It was announced that work will begin on this project just as soon as final planning is completed and right-of-way secured. Senior Resident Engineer J. R. Walker will be in charge of the work in this area.

It is understood that this addition to the road scheduled to be let for bids October 18, will put the hard-topping to about the line between precinct three and precinct four.

Carruthers is one of three directors who have opponents for the post. Sid Harkins is also a nominee for the post of director from this district.

Other contests could develop from nominations being made from the floor during the annual meeting.

## Mrs. Tiburcia Rios, Oldest Citizen, Dies Here Sunday

Mrs. Tiburcia Fierro de Rios died here Sunday night at the home of her son, Santos Rios, Born in El Mulato, Chihuahua, Mexico, on April 14, 1857, her death marked the passing of Sanderson's oldest citizen.

Funeral services were held in St. James Catholic Church Tuesday morning with Rev. N. Femenia officiating. Burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery with James Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Rios was married to Gerbacio Nunez in 1889 and two children were born to that union. After Mr. Nunez' death, in 1900 she married Gaspar Rios who died here on December 3, 1959. Mr. and Mrs. Rios celebrated their golden wedding anniversary here in 1950.

Survivors include five children: Juan Nunez, Eulali Rios and Santos Rios of Sanderson; Magnaleno Rios and Cenada Castro of Fort Stockton. Another daughter, Petra Nunez, preceded her mother in death.

There are also 26 grand children and 55 great-grandchildren.

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## Travel To Big Bend Shows Increase

Travel to Big Bend National Park has increased 6.6 per cent for the year to date, according to figures released this week by Supt. Stanley C. Joseph.

Total number of visitors this year through September 30 has been 62,570. This compares with a total of 58,674 people for the same period last year.

Visitors to Big Bend have been staying longer in 1960 than last year. For example, the number of overnight stays in campgrounds has increased from 12,092 in the first nine months of 1959, to 18,083 during the same period in 1960. This represents an increase of 49.6 per cent in the number of overnight stays by campers including those using trailers. There has also been an increase in the number of overnight stays in the accommodations provided by National Park Concessions, Inc. in the Chisos Mountains Basin. Likewise there has been an increase in saddle horse use at the Chisos Remuda.

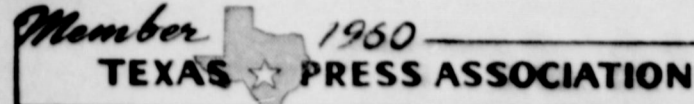

Old Pedestrians Are Numerous Traffic Victims

The tragedy of traffic accidents — and particularly pedestrian deaths — is that those who suffer most are the ones we are most anxious to protect, according to J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association.

"We are all familiar with the need of looking out for the very young children playing in or near the streets; now we must devote more attention to our senior citizens who have an even more startling high incidence of death and injuries," he said.

Musick points out that 38 per cent of all pedestrian fatalities occur to people over 65 years of age while that particular age group makes up only 9 per cent of our population.

Public concern and education is the answer to the problem, Musick believes.

"There is no doubt but that deaths can be materially reduced by organized community effort," Musick states. Strict enforcement of sound ordinances can serve as a stop-gap measure but the real answer comes by special education of particular groups needing attention.

Musick urged safety programs be organized at the local level and presented before clubs whose members are composed of citizens at the later age levels. Help in organizing such programs may be obtained through the Texas Safety Association headquarters in Austin.

A measure that has been taken in Sanderson in the installation of walking lanes across Oak St. at several intersections and signs warning motorists of the pedestrian crossings. It is hoped that all pedestrians will be encouraged to use the cross-walk lanes and that all motorists will stop and permit pedestrians to cross in the lanes without the danger of being struck by a moving vehicle.

Demos For Nixon Open Headquarters In Austin for Texans

Texas Democrats for Nixon and Lodge opened state headquarters in Austin this week with former Governor Allan Shivers as chairman.

Emphasizing the vast differences between the National Democratic platform and the state platform, Shivers said he does not believe that the Los Angeles document is in Texas' best interest.

"As I said in 1952," Shivers remarked, "when it comes to deciding between a party label and what's good for our people, I will vote for Texas."

The former governor reported that response to his Dallas television broadcast last week has been very good and enthusiastic, and he has received thousands of letters, telephone calls and telegrams from citizens endorsing his views.

Texas Democrats for Nixon and Lodge will conduct a vigorous campaign, Shivers said, promising that he will make many speeches and personal appearances throughout the state and in some other states.

Calling for the help of all who are interested, Shivers repeated from his television speech the thought that "the name under which you work and vote is not important. We will gladly work with Volunteers for Nixon, Texans for Nixon, Citizens for Nixon. We are all of these, and more."

"We are Americans, exercising our right to stand for and vote for the leaders of our choice. Remember — in spite of specious arguments, in spite of jibes and threat and synthetic appeals to 'party loyalty' — you have the right."

"You have that responsibility. You have that high and solemn duty."

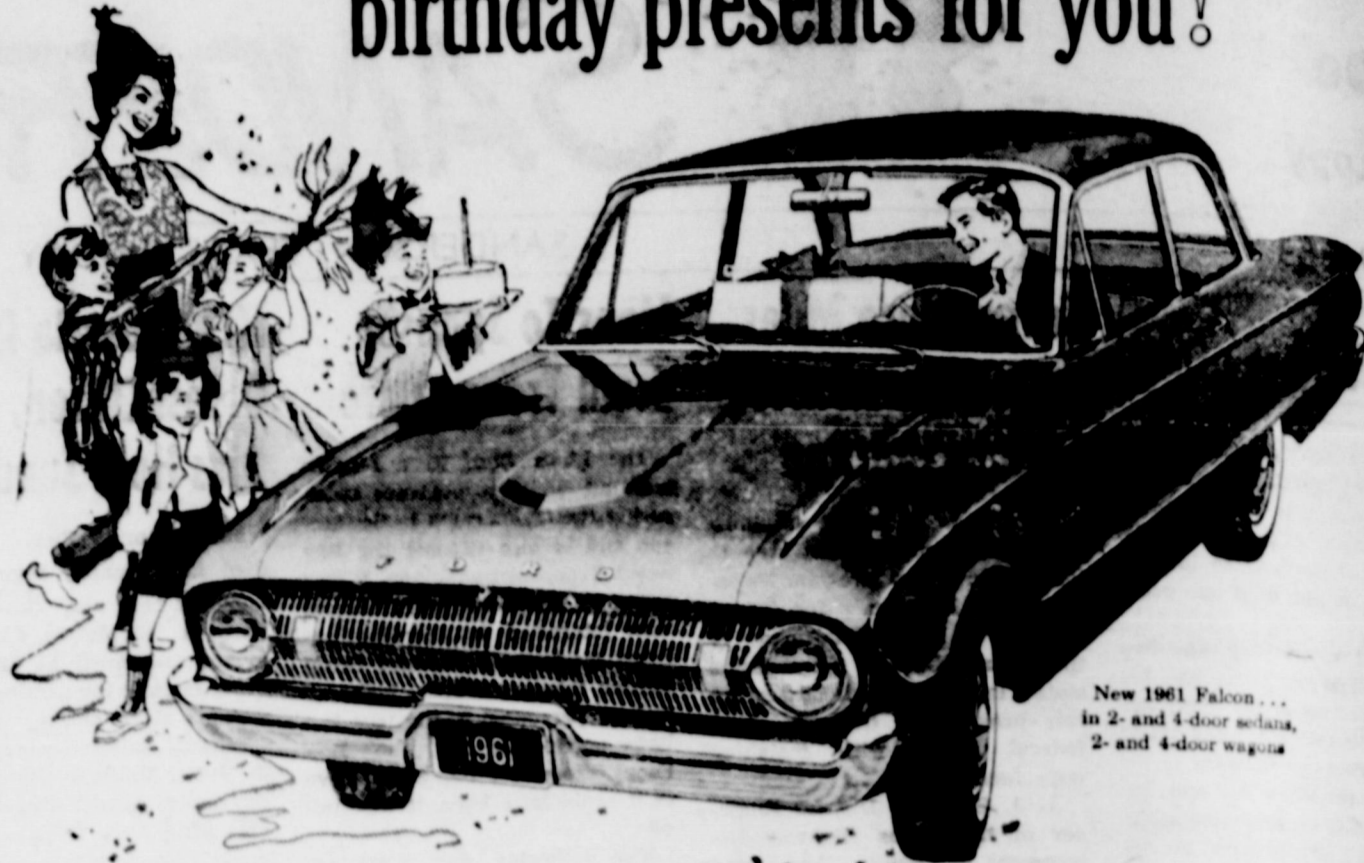

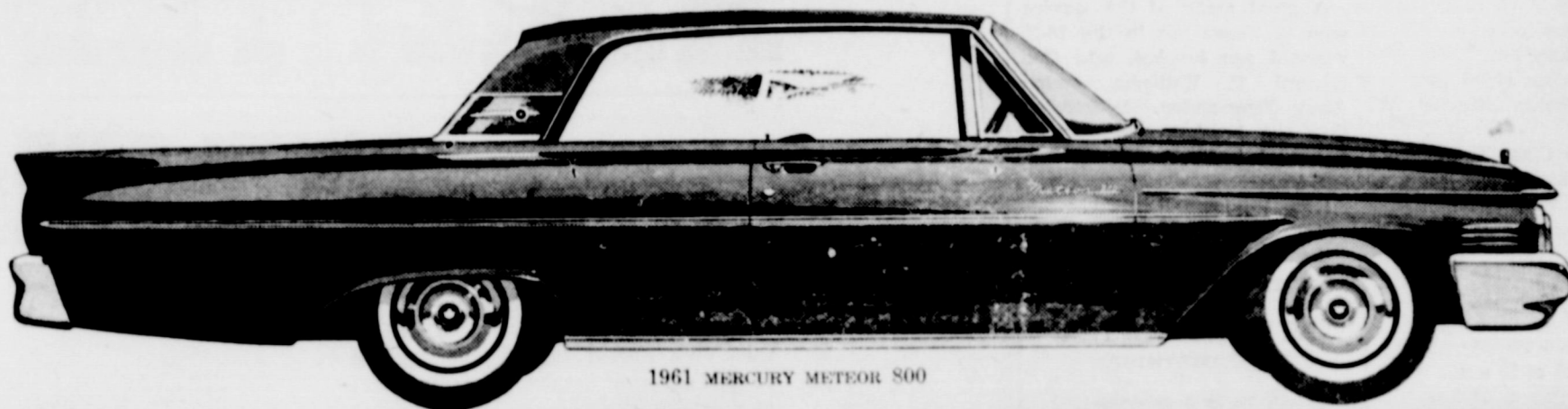

Austin — Neither Texas civilians nor the armed forces can afford the losses incurred through traffic accidents involving military personnel in the state.

On this note, the Texas Military - Civilian Traffic Safety Council was formed in Austin with a goal of reducing the accidents.

About 200 persons, civilian and military, attended the Council's first meeting, called at the behest of Gov. Price Daniel.

Servicemen have more auto accidents than any other population group in Texas, said Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety. Last year servicemen drivers were involved in 103 fatal accidents in which 130 persons were killed.

A great many of the servicemen in Texas are in the 18-25-year-old age bracket, said Gen. Edward T. Williams, Fourth Army Commander. People in this age bracket generally are the most inclined to have auto accidents.

Gen. Williams urged vigorous enforcement of traffic regulations so that the driver knows

he will be caught and punished if he breaks the law.

Brad Smith, director of the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, outlined the five-point program recommended by the governor to improve highway safety.

1. Driver education for all high school students.
2. A law to permit chemical tests to determine if a driver is intoxicated.
3. At least 200 additional highway patrolmen.
4. Revision of the drivers license law.
5. A system of traffic courts.

**Water Program Studied**

Texas' 7-man water development board is considering whether to ask the next Legislature to expand and liberalize its program of lending financial aid to local water projects.

Decision is to be made at the Board's Oct. 28 meeting.

Board presently has authority to issue \$100,000,000 in bonds and use the money to make loans to local governments for water conservation projects. Loans are limited to one-third the cost of the project and cannot be more than \$5,000,000 for any one project.

Under study is whether to ask the Legislature to step up the program by authorizing the Board to lend as much as \$15,000,000 per project and to issue another \$100,000,000 in bonds to purchase water storage in federal reservoirs.

When the Board was created,

the law provided that another \$100,000,000 in bonds could be authorized by a two-thirds vote of the Legislature.

Daniel Honored

Governor Daniel is the newly-elected chairman of the 16-state Southern Governor's Conference.

He is the second Texan in a decade to head the group. Former Gov. Allan Shivers was chairman in 1951-52.

Conferences are devoted to the study of problems which the member states have in common. This year the protection of home

industries against ruinous competition from imports has been a prime issue.

Governor Daniel said he felt much could be accomplished by the conferring governors "if we stand together."

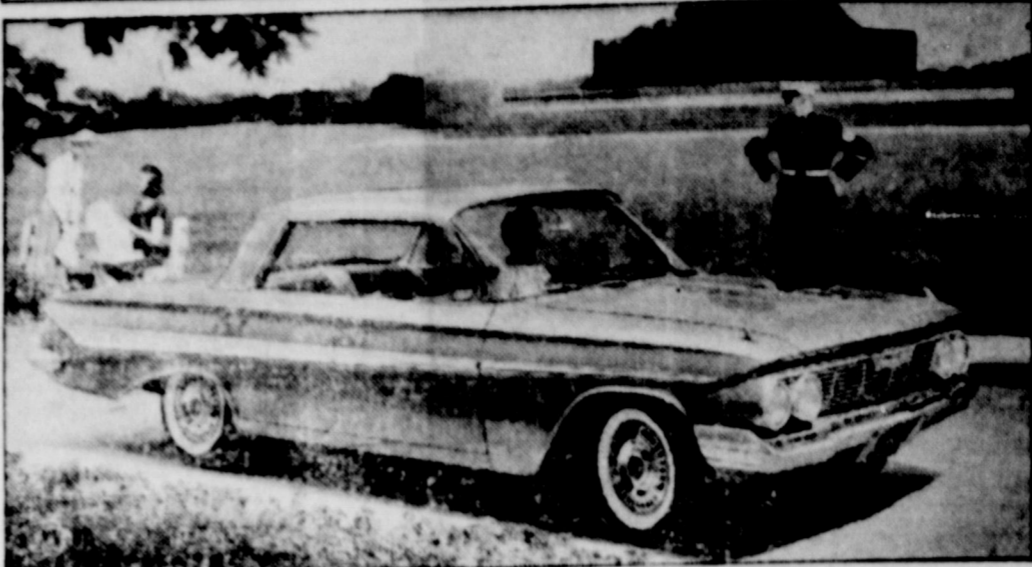
Hurry Up Hospitals

With a long, long waiting list of mentally retarded patients, the State Hospital Board is studying short cuts toward providing housing for them.

A contractor-member of the Board presented drawing of one possible approach — semi-perma-

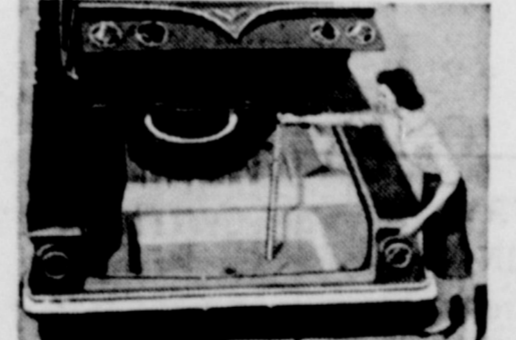

### Exempt Hunters Must Have Tags For Deer Killed

If you hunt deer you must have deer tags, even though you are entitled to exemption. This is the warning of the fiscal director of the Game and Fish Commission, whose job it is to provide hunting and fishing licenses. For persons entitled to an exemption, the license is required only if you hunt deer or turkey. The exempt license is not required for other types of game.

The following are exempt from buying a hunting license: If you hunt entirely within your own county (except for deer and turkey); if you are over 65 or under 17 years of age. If you qualify for hunting without a license under these conditions you do not need a permit. Tags are necessary because it is illegal to possess a deer that does not have a tag. These tags must be securely attached to the deer immediately after it is killed. Just having the tag in your pocket is insufficient. As soon as you reach your deer, the tag, properly filled in, should be at-

tached to the antlers, if a buck, or a leg if a doe, where does are legal. It can be securely wrapped with string, or fastened with adhesive tape. And the tag should be put on so it will not become loose with handling the carcass in either the icehouse or the automobile while in transit. The deer tags are non-transferable and must bear the name of the shooter.
