LISTEN TO LUKE

We have a news story this week about the amount of delinquent taxes in the county and school district and about the Commissioners' Court action in demanding payment of those taxes by one means or another. We commend the Commissioners on this action. We commend them wholeheartedly.

If we pay our taxes, why not everybody else pay theirs, too?

The fact that we have a local government and a local school is worth all the taxes that we are asked to pay and it should not be a strain on the rest of the property owners to carry their share of the load.

Property owners who enjoy many benefits derived from taxes that others pay, who send their children to tax-supported schools, etc., and do not pay their taxes are not living up to their duties as citizens.

The comparison is similar to the drawing a few weeks back concerning law enforcement — they are glad to have the opportunities offered by the payment of taxes by others, but they should have to pay taxes on their property! — Hog wash!

You might think we are getting little out of line — but if you will bet it's because you haven't paid your taxes, and the majority of the property owners — those who have paid their taxes — will agree with us, we'll bet.

And what hurts at times is that some people are not satisfied with the things now financed by the taxing property owners. They want additional burdens put on that group while they continue to not pay taxes.

We think it's high time the Commissioners got a little prodded and demanded the payment of those taxes. We wish it had been done a long time ago. It's nothing but right that each of us as property owners should share our responsibility in the business of footing the bill for our state and local government and for the education of the children of the county. We are what we have today in the schools and county because those citizens before us are not leeches to such benefit.

The money is needed by the organizations to continue in operation and the only fair way of financing the cost of operation is taxes, and the only fair way to collect them is for the tax collector to collect all the taxes.

With the World Series ended can now get down to the activities that are to occupy a big part of our time between now and November 8.

Personally this columnist has no interest in any political parties such, only as to which candidate will and can best serve us what seems to be a survival of democracy. That, more than the election of a party, is most important. Nor are we willing to support a candidate whose principles and advocates are contrary to what, in our opinion, is best for our country.

The Democratic Party advocates this year what we believe are socialistic trends, unhealthy opinions and attitudes and unbalanced reasoning. Thus, those who are pledged to work for the completion of that platform without that party label must carry the same banner. Thus we can support the candidates if we do not support the platform, and vice versa.

Secondly, we are not willing to support a president in order that the end of "electing a man" to that office might be achieved. It is not a matter of looking for the future glory of Texas having a native son in the White House, but looking forward to the glory of these United States by having a man in the

Commissioners Ask Collection Of All Delinquent Taxes

The Terrell County Commissioners' Court Monday morning in regular session instructed the deputy tax collector, Mrs. Tol Murrah, to institute steps necessary for the collection of all delinquent taxes on record in that office.

The Commissioners stated that suit against the tax lien on the property was to be filed if necessary for the collection of the delinquent taxes.

Delinquent tax notices were being mailed out this week to all property owners who are delinquent in their taxes and prompt payment of the taxes was urged to prevent further action by the tax collector.

The action was taken by the Commissioners after they had been told of the amount of taxes now due and payable to the county.

It was noted that the delinquent taxes amounted to \$8,651.98 which did not include penalties

and interest. Mrs. Murrah stated that penalties and interest would increase the figure by about 50 per cent, making near \$12,000.00 which was due the county in delinquent taxes. It was also pointed out that this delinquent tax money was that due the county, the state, and the school, with the school's portion being that amount of taxes unpaid up to 1958, when the independent district was formed.

Since the formation of the independent school district, the delinquent taxes due that body is \$3,378.58, according to A. H. Zuberbuehler, tax assessor and collector for the school district. He stated that this figure did not include penalty and interest, which, effective this month, is 12 1/2% of the delinquent taxes. The interest increases at the rate of six per cent per year, or 1/2% per month until paid.

No action has been taken by the school board demanding the payment of all delinquent school taxes, but delinquent tax notices are mailed each year.

It was pointed out that most of the delinquent taxes were on property in Sanderson.

Commissioners Call Meeting Monday With Bond Attys.

The Terrell County Commissioners' Court has called a meeting for Monday, October 17, with bonding attorneys interesting in handling bonds for a proposed swimming pool bond issue. The meeting is to be at the courthouse at 10:00 a.m.

The purpose of the meeting is to make a contract, if possible, with attorneys for the sale and price of bonds should the bond issue for the swimming pool carry. The attorneys will be responsible for all legal aspects of the issue if agreement is reached.

Following an agreement with the bonding companies, tenure of the proposed issue's retirement calling the election, and other details of balloting on the issue will be forthcoming, it was stated.

The bond issue is the result of a petition received a month ago by the Commissioners' Court asking for the proposed issuance of \$50,000.00 in bonds to finance a swimming pool and public park in Terrell County.

Poulter Well Cased To 14,873 Feet

Sinclair Oil and Gas Co. is running 7-inch casing to 4,873 feet, the total depth, at the No. 1 Alma H. Poulter, located on section 1, Block 21, TCRR Survey, according to information received.

Operator's representative said samples and drillstem tests did not indicate production in the Ellenburger; however, logs indicated possible gas production. Total depth is about 600 feet in the Ellenburger, according to information received.

Wolfcamp gas sand production was indicated with the flowing of gas at the maximum rate of 5-100,000 cubic feet daily when the project was at 6,254 feet.

At least two other projects in the Brown-Bassett field indicated production in the Wolfcamp sand with the flowing of gas while drilling, however none have made production tests from that horizon.

New Minister For Church of Christ, Joe Fitch, Arrives

Joe Fitch has arrived in Sanderson to assume ministerial duties at the Church of Christ. He and Mrs. Fitch and their two children moved to Sanderson Tuesday.

The church is planning a week of special services Monday, Oct. 17 through 23. Roy Stephens of Monahans will preach at the services which will be each day at 7:00 p.m.

Absentee voting for the general election November 8 will begin October 19 and continue to November 4, according to the state's election laws.

Those planning to be out of the county may cast absentee ballots in person beginning October 19 at the clerk's office in the court house. Others who are allowed to vote absentee are those who cannot go to the polls because of physical inability or illness. In these cases, the applicants must provide the county clerk with a medical certificate stating such illness or inability, according to information available.

Ballots will be mailed to non-resident voters by proper application with the county clerk.

Ballot copy was turned over to The Times Monday for printing and they are expected to be ready by the time absentee balloting is possible.

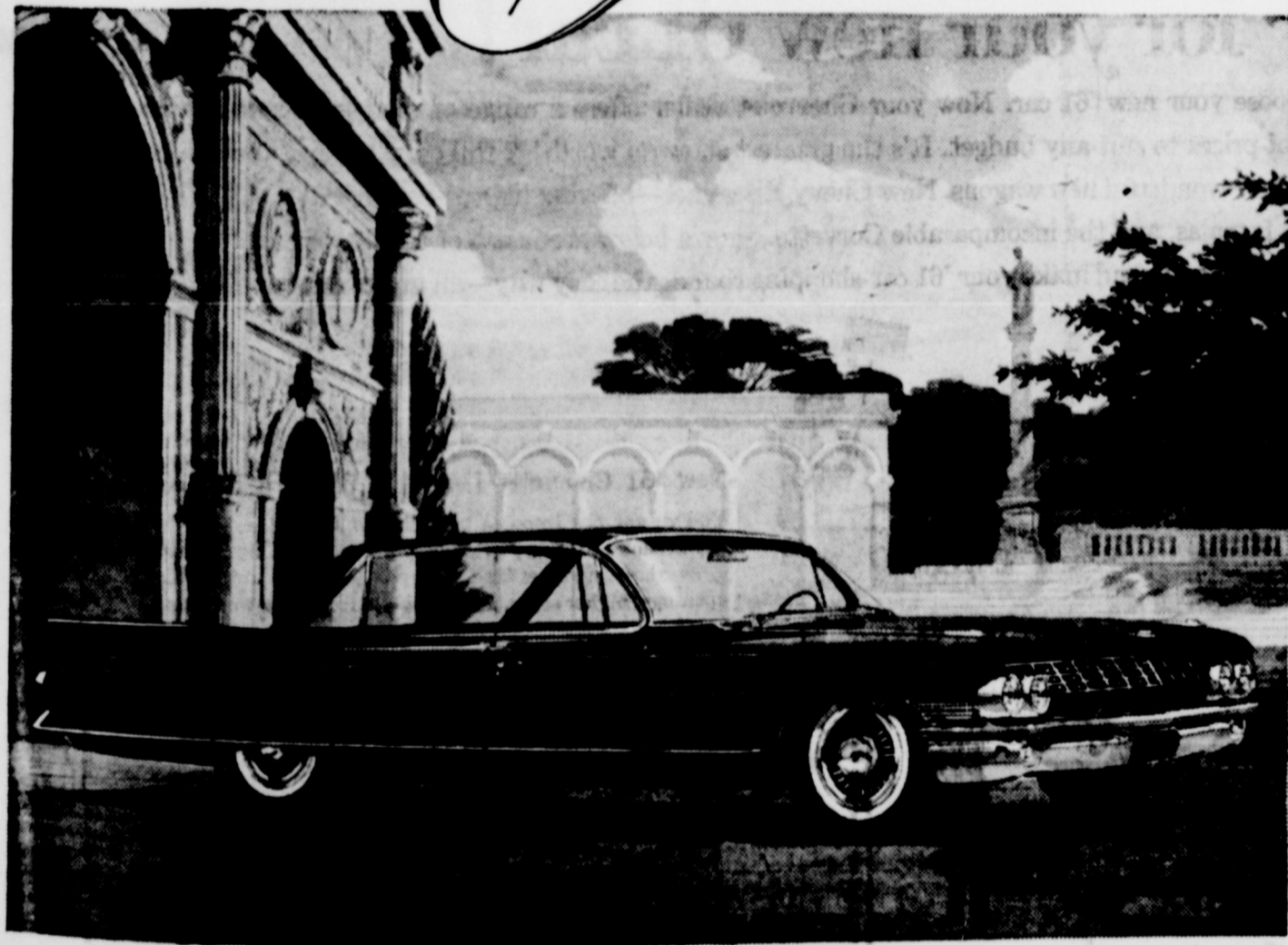

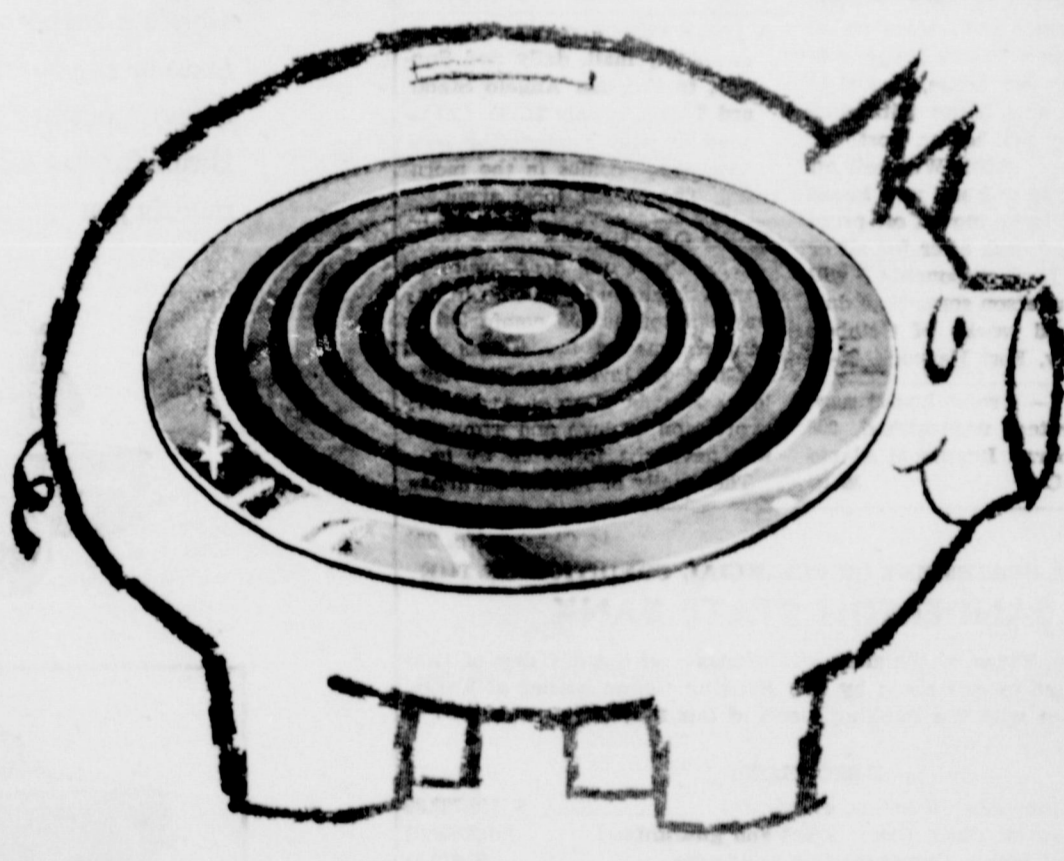
