LISTEN TO LUKE

Monday we had the privilege of taking advantage of an invitation to join other newspaper representatives of the nation at the welcoming of President Eisenhower to Laughlin Air Force Base for his visit with President Matesos of Mexico in Ciudad Acuna.

It's a privilege that comes seldom in one's life, so we decided to take advantage of it. We are glad we did. Here's our impression of what took place:

We arrived at the press center and were given a gift by the Del Rio Chamber of Commerce and a packet of schedules and information about the official visit. We met and chatted with representatives of other periodicals until shortly before time for the arrival of the presidential plane.

Out on the flight line the press group was designated a place to one side of the ramp which the President would descend from the plane. There were about 50 representatives of the press in this large area.

The 21-man honor guard was in position at the end of the ramp, with the colors, the color guard, and the band directly in front of the ramp, in that order.

Christian Herter, secretary of State, Cong. O. C. Fisher of San Angelo, Mexican Ambassador Robert Hill and Del Rio Mayor A. C. Kennedy were at the foot of the ramp to greet the President.

When the plane taxied into position the doors were opened and two armed officers emerged from the plane followed by the President. He looked out and, seeing the colors, came to a quick attention and proffered a snappy salute. The honor guard braced to attention and saluted and the band began playing "Hail to the Chief" softly.

Mr. Eisenhower left his hat off to be descended the ramp, nodded acknowledgement to the press group, waved to the crowd, and upon reaching the bottom of the ramp, shook hands with Mr. Herter and addressed him as such. He then shook hands with the other dignitaries, and then had a very brief private conversation with Mr. Herter. He then proceeded to his car which was parked near the color guard, put on his rain coat and got into the open car for the trip to Ciudad Acuna. Mr. Herter rode with him and other dignitaries rode in three other cars furnished for him.

Mr. Eisenhower was liberal in his acknowledgments to the people around him and appeared to be very healthy and in good spirits.

We had this brief look-see in about seven or eight minutes. The crowds at the airport gave the President a very warm, respectful and genuine welcome. There was no loud shouting, no fan-fare, but genuine warmth and sincerity of respect to the greeting.

The same type of acknowledgments were proffered by the President.

There seemed to be a presence of awareness when Mr. Eisenhower appeared from the plane as his car drove out of sight. There was quiet applause which showed an intention of the indication of respect with an air of reverence and most sincere appreciation.

One man was heard, in a not loud voice, to say, "Hello, Mr. President, we still like Ike." Mr. Eisenhower turned to the man and with a real big grin said: "Well, thank you".

Had there been a big circus-like greeting, with a lot of give-a-hell shouts, we would have considered it all degrading to the President.

The whole thing could not have been in a better atmosphere, in my opinion.

Poulter Well Tests Ellenburger

Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Alma H. Poulter, in section 21 of Block 1 in the TCRR Survey indicated Wolfcamp discovery was preparing to acidize with an unreported amount, and test in Ellenburger perforations between 14,030-576 feet.

Earlier, operator's representatives said samples and drillstem tests did not indicate Ellenburger production, however logs indicated possible gas production.

Unofficial but reliable sources indicated gas production in the Ellenburger would probably run exceedingly large.

Wolfcamp sand gas production was indicated with the flowing of gas at the maximum daily rate of 5,100,000 cubic feet when the project was being drilled at 6-254 feet.

At least two other projects in the Brown-Bassett field indicated production in the Wolfcamp sand with the flowing of gas while drilling, however, none have made production tests from that zone.

TELEPHONE TALK

FIRST PHONE CALL VIA SATELLITE!
The day isn't too far off when you and your family, relaxing in your home right here in Sanderson, may watch a royal wedding in Europe or a tennis match in Australia by live television. Or you may place a call to Singapore or Calcutta — by way of man-made satellites thousands of miles in the sky.

These things were only dreams a few years ago. Now they are much closer to reality, all because of "Project Echo". It was the first successful attempt to "bounce" a voice off a satellite.

Perhaps you've seen the silvery "Echo" satellite orbiting the earth. To think of "bouncing" a phone call off it staggers the imagination. But that's what happened when a Bell Telephone Laboratories engineer in New Jersey talked by way of outer space with an engineer in California. They said they could hear each other as clearly as if they were talking across town.

Project Echo relied heavily on telephone science and technology. Bell Laboratories scientists not only participated in the first test of voice communications via satellite, but Bell Labs provided the guidance system that directed the satellite into its selected orbit.

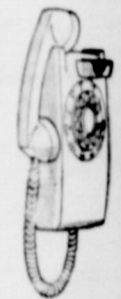
