Surely, God has blessed America in many ways. Surely Americans have no cause to hide their faces and cry out to the world that this great nation of ours is "second rate".

Anyone who would claim this country to be other than the greatest should not expect, and in my opinion, should not get the support of the people who make up the citizenry of this great nation. A man who was born to riches and never knew the real heart of American sacrifice and qualities of character that makes America what it is should not stoop to degrade the things for which America stands and should not expect the real Americans to help put him in the White House where he would be looked upon as Mr. America.

Nor, in my opinion, should the people elect men for other offices who would endorse such a man.

Be careful, you are voting for President of the United States. It is through we hear a voice from the past saying that America can be all things to all men; that America can, through its government, give equal social, economic and cultural equality to all the masses. ## Contracts Let For Construction Of 2 Road Projects

Contracts were let last week for two road construction projects in Terrell County.

A contract for 13.2 miles of construction on R.M. 2400 & U.S. 285 in Terrell and Pecos County has been awarded to a San Antonio firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission. Schwepke Inc. submitted the low bid of \$307,505 on the project.

Grading, structures, base, and surfacing R.M. 2400 from 12.9 miles east of U.S. 285 northeast 13.1 miles; U.S. 285, Dead Sheep Draw Bridge, is expected to take 125 working days, according to Archie J. Sherrod, District Highway Engineer at Odessa.

A contract for 8.8 miles of construction on U.S. 90 in Terrell County has been awarded to a San Angelo firm, Strain Brothers, Inc. submitted the low bid of \$307,505.

Grading, structures, flexible base, and asphalt concrete pavement from Pecos County line to 2 miles west of Sanderson and at Three Mile Draw and Sanderson Canyon Bridge is expected to take 175 working days, according to Sherrod.

James R. Walker, resident engineer at Fort Stockton, will be in active charge of the projects while they are under construction.

## Shell To Drill 1-A Turk Outpost

Shell Oil Co. of Midland will drill the No. 1-A Turk as a 2-mile northwest outpost to Ellenburger production in the Brown-Basset gas field of Terrell County.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 4,058 feet from the west lines of section 9, Block 161 in the GC&SF Survey.

Scheduled depth is 14,800 feet. The well is on the section just north of the Shell-Freeport 1 Turk, which was drilled on section 8 of Block R.

The derrick has been erected over the drilling site and operator was expected to spud in this week.

## Students To Aid Drive For Clothing For Nation's Needy

Beginning Monday, students in the Terrell County schools will collect bundles of used clothing to aid needy children and adults in the United States and overseas. The clothing drive, called World Clothing Week, will continue through next Friday and is a non-sectarian charitable campaign to assist orphans and other needy children and adults.

Supt. Matt F. Bader has this to say in announcing the drive: "We expect World Clothing Week to be one of the finest service projects ever conducted in our schools. The clothing collected will be distributed in poverty-stricken areas of America to the needy children. It goes to orphaned children, too, living in orphan homes in the United States and abroad, and to Indian children living on reservations. Free clothing and bedding is also given away by World Clothing Fund in disaster areas, when normally self-sufficient families lose all their possessions as a result of fire, flood, tornado, etc."

All types of used clothing are needed: clothing for babies, children, teen-agers, and adults, as well as shoes, caps, mittens, and bedding. Clothing contributed may be deposited at any of the Terrell County schools or given to any school student in your neighborhood.

The hail preceded a 13-inch rain here Friday night about 6:30.

Hail damage was heavy to the Sunset Siesta Motel, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Turner, to the Western Hills Motel, owned by Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Weigand; to the Sanderson Courts, owned by M. L. Robertson; and to the Chevron Truck Stop, owned by L. E. Muller and O. T. Sudduth; to the Orchid Cafe, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Herring; the homes of Mr. and Mrs. M. G. Northcut, and Mr. and Mrs. M. G. Northcut Jr. and lighter damage to several homes in that area in the eastern part of town. ## Poulter Well Has 6,282,000 Cubic Feet Of Ellenburger Gas

A spread was seen for a Terrell County gas producing area after tests in the Ellenburger at the Alma H. Poulter No. 1 by the Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. The well is in section 21 of Block 1 in the TCRR Survey and is 4 1/2 miles northwest of Ellenburger production in the Brown-Basset gas field.

Ellenburger gas production was assured with the flowing of 6,282,000 cubic feet of gas daily through perforations between 14,252-384 feet. Testing was continuing.

Wolfcamp sand gas production was indicated with the flowing of gas at the maximum daily rate of 5,100,000 cubic feet when the project was drilling at 6,254 feet.

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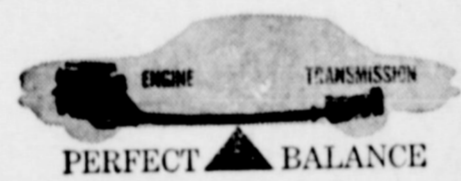
