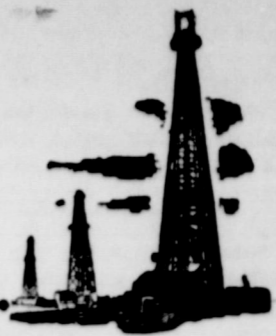

## Deer Hides Asked For State Hospitals

Deer hides are asked to please throw away deer hides. The hides are being made by volunteers at state-operated hospitals who will sponsor the collection of hides and have them tanned for use by patients in occupational therapy.

Deer hides are used to fashion types of small articles from leather which provide gifts for the families of the patients. The hides, provide spending money for the patients. Deer hides should be salted, drained and sent to the Taxidermist Studio, 2708 Bricksburg Road, Austin. The owner donates storage, and preparation of the hides for the tannery. Motor lines in Texas haul the hides without charge if the shipping tag is marked "charity".

## Heavy Gas Flow In 1 State-Banner At Strawn Level

A Strawn gas discovery was indicated with the flowing of an estimated 23,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily from 11,200 feet in the Socony Mobil 1 State-Banner in section 332, Block 2.

The gas was said to be sweet gas and operator predicted doubling the capacity after acidizing. The well blew in Sunday night about 10:00 o'clock, according to reports, and safety devices were employed to prevent accident or a blow-out. A huge flare burned the escaping gas until mudding stopped the flow. The well is being drilled to the Ellenburger and drilling continued Tuesday.

Earlier operator announced a potential of 6,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily from the Wolfcamp level at approximately 6,000 feet. The well is the easternmost hole being drilled in the Brown-Basset gas field and is the first discovery in the Strawn, according to information available.

## Chesler L. Surratt, Retired Conductor, Dies In Alpine

Chester L. Surratt, a retired T&NO passenger conductor, died in an Alpine hospital early Thursday morning. He had been receiving medical treatment there for several days and suffered a heart attack Wednesday morning.

Tentative plans are for funeral services here Sunday afternoon in the Church of Christ. Survivors include his widow Mrs. Ada Surratt, a son, Harold L. Surratt, of Alpine, three grandchildren, and a sister, Mrs. J. H. Hayre.

## Spike Bucks Are Legal In Trans-Pecos

Spiked deer can be taken legally only in 105 of the counties where the Game and Fish Commission has the authority to regulate hunting and fishing. This means that all counties not under regulatory authority are controlled by the general law which defines legal bucks as those with one pronged horn, according to W. J. Cutbirth Jr., assistant executive secretary of the Commission.

This is the first year that spiked bucks have been made legal game in all regulatory areas. The law for these areas defines a buck deer as a deer with hardened antlers protruding through the skin.

Anyone killing a spiked buck in counties under the general law will be prosecuted, according to the information received. According to Game Warden Cliff Wilson, Terrell, Pecos, and Brewster, and all other counties west of the Pecos River, are in the regulatory area and spiked bucks are legal game in that area.

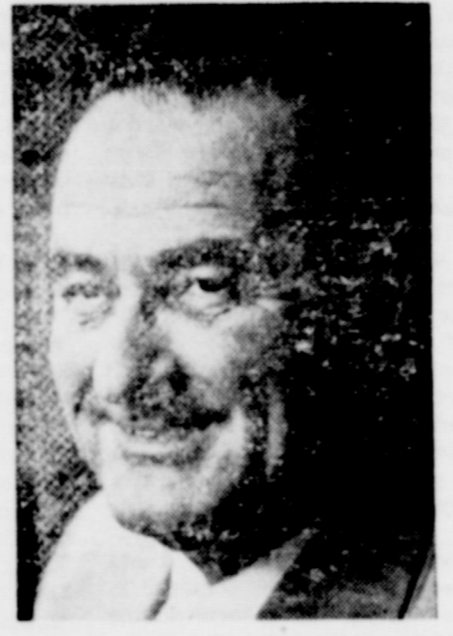
Mr. and Mrs. Hanson went by train Saturday to Houston and from there by plane to Baton Rouge.

## Poppy Day Set For November 11

Friday, Nov. 11, has been set as Poppy Day in Sanderson. The American Legion Auxiliary will distribute poppies on the streets on that date, thus paying tribute to the American war dead and also aiding the war's living victims by the poppy sale.

Once a year the Auxiliary distributes poppies made by the disabled veterans — now from three wars. These men from their hospital beds and wheel chairs spend their winters making the little red flowers, which gives them a sense of creation and usefulness. Each flower will carry its banner stating that it is the memorial flower of the American Legion Auxiliary and that a wounded or disabled veteran of our wars made it.

Friday morning at 9:00 o'clock a committee from the Auxiliary headed by Mrs. Johnny Whistler, will begin serving coffee, cake, and doughnuts and selling poppies at the former location of the Peavy Insurance Agency at 116 N. Persimmon.

## Disability Exemption No Longer Available For Texas Voters

For many years persons who are partially or permanently disabled, persons who are blind, those having lost a foot or a hand or veterans with 40 per cent or more disability have been exempted from paying a poll tax for the right to vote, but instead have been granted exemption certificates.

Under a recent ruling of the Attorney General and the Court of Civil Appeals, such exemption is no longer permitted and local tax collectors have been instructed to discontinue issuing exemption certificates to such persons and instead to require a payment of the constitutionally required \$1 for a poll tax receipt. The poll tax charge for all others is \$1.75, but in the case of the disabled persons, the state is permitted to rebate an extra charge of 50c levied by statute and the county rebates its 25c collection charge.

But the constitutional provision makes mandatory the collection of the \$1 fee, the Attorney General and the courts have ruled. Poll tax exemptions are granted persons who reach the age of 21 within the calendar year in which they wish to vote, provided their birthday precedes the election date, and over-age persons, those who are 60 years of age before January 1st.

## U.S. 90 Work For 15.4 Miles Is Approved

One project in Terrell County has been approved by the State Highway Commission as a part of a two-year program. The program covers the actual construction work and the purchase of any needed right-of-way. Federal funds have been made available and this project will be placed under contract as the plans are completed and necessary right of way has been acquired.

Archie J. Sherrod, district engineer of the Texas Highway Department in Odessa stated that the following highway in Terrell County is scheduled for work under this program: Reconstruction of U.S. 90 from the Val Verde County line west 15.4 miles at a cost of approximately \$702,300.

Senior Resident Engineer J. R. Walker will be in charge of the work in this area.

## Student Tests Results Noted

In the spring of this year ninth and tenth grade students, on a voluntary basis, were given the opportunity of participating in a statewide program for assessing their educational development by taking a battery of tests called the National Educational Development Tests.

These tests served four purposes: 1. To help students better understand their own academic strength and weakness; 2. To help teachers and counselors better understand the instructional and guidance needs of individual students; 3. To help the high school administrations better understand the school system's curriculum strength and weakness; and 4. To help school personnel identify academically talented students who should be encouraged to attend college.

Sanderson High School had four freshmen and four sophomores who scored in the top quarter of all who took these tests in the state of Texas. For this academic achievement, the following students were presented a Certificate of Educational Development in assembly this week. They are: Ruthie Allen, Buddie Joe Hahn, Terry Jean Hodgkins, Kenneth Moses, Barbara Cates, Danny Durham, Margaret Massie, and Francie Wilson.

The certificates, made up in a gold border and seal and lettered in impressive black, read: "In recognition of outstanding performance on the spring, 1960, National Educational Development Tests. This award reflects credit both to the student and the school."

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Austin — Like a debutante daughter in bouffant gown, Texas' many charms have been wrapped in a lavish, full-color booklet and presented for the attraction of free-spending visitors.

First of its kind ever published in Texas, the 32-page brochure was compiled by the State Highway Department and is being distributed free. First printing of 400,000 copies is being sent to travel agencies, clubs, newspapers, anywhere that it may be used to draw tourists to Texas.

It is one of the first big steps in a program to reverse Texas' decline in tourist revenue.

Texas is "20 years behind the times" in advertising tourist attractions, says Tom H. Taylor, director of the Travel and Information Division of the Highway Department. Next goal is to get the Legislature to appropriate \$300,000 to be used for media advertising over the country, as other states do.

Requests for copies of the brochure should be sent to the Travel and Information Division of the Highway Department in Austin. Taylor said the Department expects heavy demand and will not be able to furnish the booklet in quantities.

More Water Aid is Goal Governor Price Daniel said he will ask the next Legislature to take action aimed at speeding up local water conservation projects.

Speaking to the Texas Water Conservation Association, the governor said he would urge more money for water projects and a more flexible financing program.

Marvin Nichols of Fort Worth, chairman of the Texas Water Development Board, urged that the present cell of \$5,000,000 on any one water loan be raised to \$15,000,000. Under the present water development program the state sells bonds to raise money to lend local governments to help pay for water conservation construction. Lending is limited to one-third the total cost and \$5,000,000 on any one project.

Nichols said the Water Development Board was "admittedly disappointed" in the small number of loans (eight for a total of \$14,470,000) completed since the program was passed in 1957. An abundant rainfall has caused many local governments to lose a sense of urgency about water conservation, said Nichols.

Several speakers warned of the certainty of another drought. "Biggest problem in many cities by 1980 may be getting a good drink of water," said one.

Insurance Rate Hike Rejected State Board of Insurance turned down by a unanimous vote a proposed 30 per cent increase in auto insurance rates.

Board will re-study the problem in June, 1961. Until then the

present rates will continue.

Board also turned down by a 2-to-1 vote a proposal by Chairman Penn J. Jackson to allow companies to make the merit rating system optional. It is asking for an attorney general's opinion on whether optional merit rating might be legal.

Board member Robert V. Strain said he felt an across-the-board raise in auto insurance rates would be unfair to law-abiding accident-free drivers.

DPS Memorial Presented A 6-by-8-foot plaque commemorating Department of Public Safety men killed in line of duty is to be mounted in the lobby of the DPS headquarters in Austin.

Private citizens paid for the plaque which was presented to Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, at an honor banquet.

Names of 21 men are inscribed on the plaque. Sixteen of these were killed in traffic accidents while on duty; two were killed by the ill-famed Clyde Barrow; three were shot to death by other outlaws.

Can't Take Car for Taxes A local taxing district cannot seize a person's personal car because he has failed to pay property taxes on it, the Attorney General's Department ruled.

However, the tax assessor still has plenty of ways to "get at" the car owner who tries to evade taxes.

An automobile — one only — is part of a person's homestead, said the opinion, and cannot be taken for forced sale to satisfy a tax claim. However, it said, the tax collector can get a judgment that will allow attachment and sale of a second car, or any other property not included in the homestead exemption.

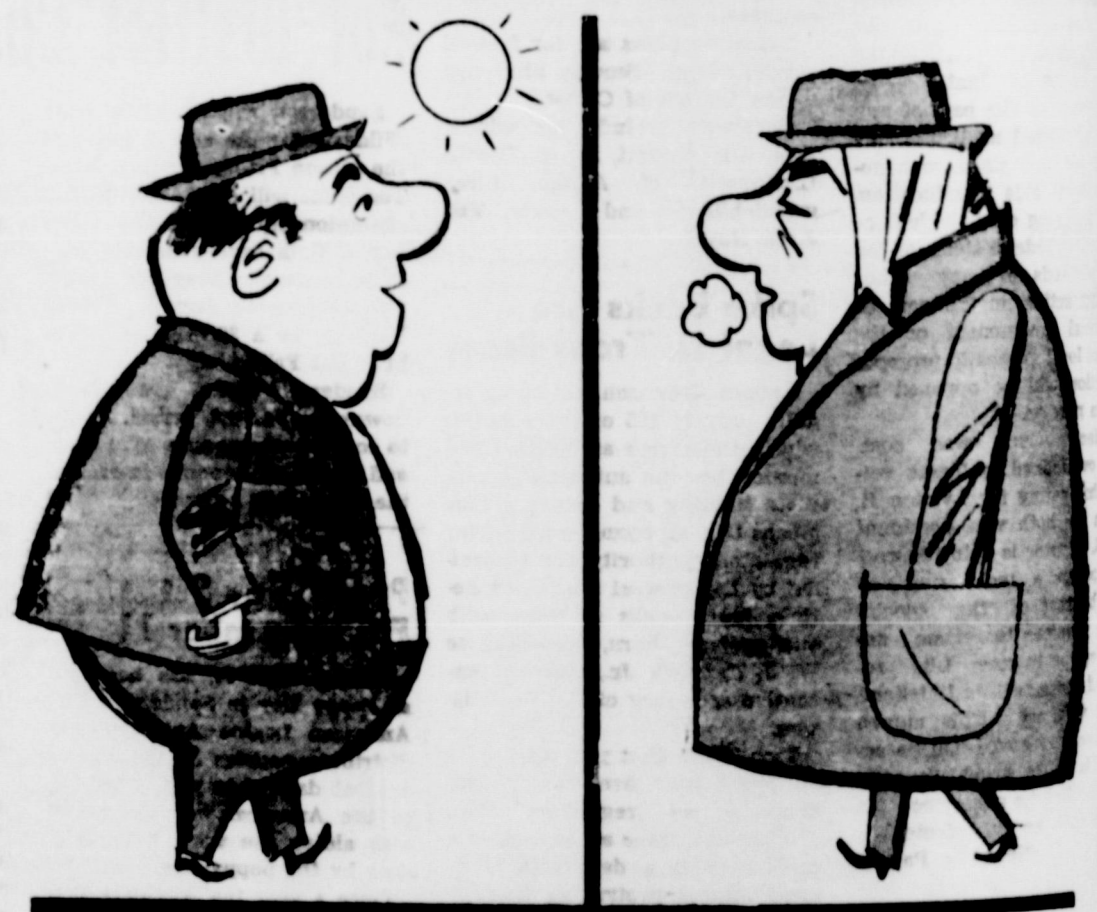

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TEXAS LAWMIEN MAJOR JOHN B. JONES, RANGER "Better stay right here in Texas." When the carpetbaggers moved into Texas after the Civil War, John B. Jones, ex-officer of Terry's Texas Rangers, took a trip to Mexico and Brazil to spot a favorable location for an emigrant Southern colony. "Stay in Texas," he advised. When Governor Richard Coke reactivated the Texas Rangers on May 2, 1874, he commissioned Jones Major, Frontier Battalion. The Major organized and directed six companies of Rangers on the Western border, from the Red River to the Rio Grande, while, with a small escort, he patrolled from company to company. During the next seven years the Frontier Battalion was fully occupied, clearing the border of hostile Indians and the interior of outlaws. Major Jones was peacekeeper for the feuding Horrells and Higgines at Lampasas in '77. He was at Round Rock when Sam Bass bit the dust. In El Paso he quelled the bitter, bloody Salt War and later represented Texas on the international commission which settled that long-drawn-out dispute over important salt beds in the West. In January, 1879, Major Jones was appointed Adjutant General of Texas, but continued to direct his then famous Frontier Battalion until his death in '81. Though his name is too seldom mentioned in Ranger legends, it was he more than any other one man who brought the corps to the height of its service and efficiency. Today Texas owes much to the lawmen who brought peace to the frontier — and much also to industry and commerce, bringers of prosperity and pleasure. 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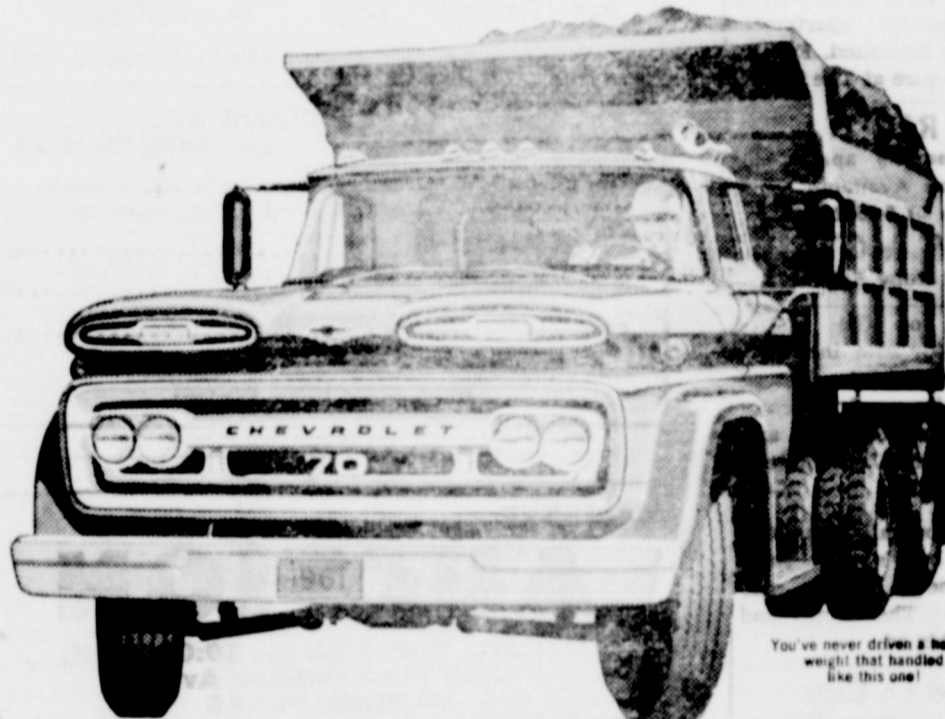
