Scholarships For Medical Field Training Available

Terrell County students seeking National Foundation health scholarships must file application by April 1, W. W. Sudduth, chairman of the organization's county chapter, announced today. More than 500 scholarships will be offered nationally for training in medicine, nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy and medical social work, Sudduth said.

Each scholarship amounts to \$500 a year for four years for a total of \$2,000.

Graduating high school students planning to enter college in September, 1961, may apply for scholarships in nursing, physical therapy, or occupational therapy.

Sophomores ready to enter the junior year in college who plan to continue the graduate study necessary to qualify as medical social workers are eligible for the medical social work scholarships. Undergraduate students who have been accepted for the first year in medical school beginning in 1961 may apply for the scholarships in medicine.

Application blanks may be obtained from the school principal; the Terrell County Chapter of the National Foundation at Sanderson or by writing the National Foundation Health Scholarships, 800 Second Ave., New York 17, N. Y., the chairman said.

Youths Admit Local Thefts

Rutherford Named Committee Head For National Parks

Washington, D.C. —Congressman J. T. Rutherford of West Texas' 16th Congressional District, has been named chairman of a permanent, standing National Parks Subcommittee in the U. S. House of Representatives.

In his new chairmanship post, Rutherford will preside over a 14-man subcommittee having legislative jurisdiction over the entire National Parks System. This includes all national parks, national historic sites, military parks and battlefields, national cemeteries, historic ruins, and objects of historical interest on the public domain.

The West Texas Congressman presents a Congressional District having Texas' only National Park, Big Bend. He also is author of a pending bill to make Old Fort Davis in Jeff Davis County a National Historic Site, to be acquired, restored, and maintained by the National Parks Service.

Rutherford now finds himself in the position of being able to preside as chairman over the legislative body where that measure will first be considered in Congress.

In addition to his new chairmanship, Rutherford's seniority moved him up three spots on the full Interior and Insular Affairs Committee. He is now seventh-ranking among the 31 members of the committee.

After the supper the group will hear Commander Pete E. Turner of the Department of Texas, in an address on the work of the Legion and its service to the veterans of Texas.

Insurance Checks For GIs Due Soon

Stepped-up payment of the quarter-billion dollar 1961 G.I. Insurance dividend to more than five million veterans should be substantially completed in about four weeks, John S. Gleason Jr., Administrator of Veterans Affairs reported this week.

He said that the Veterans Administration will complete the payment of 1,200,000 dividends valued at \$54,000,000 by the end of this week. It plans to authorize another 1,300,000 checks totaling \$60,000,000 by March 4, and finish processing the remaining 3,000,000 payments worth \$144,500,000 by March 19.

The payments, which normally would be spread throughout the entire year of 1961, are being accelerated by order of the President as a stimulus to the national economy.

Veterans Administrator Gleason said he had set March 19 as a deadline for the Veterans Administration to complete the last of its work on the dividends, and that he expected all payment vouchers to be in the hands of the Treasury disbursing offices by that date. The preparation and mailing of checks by Treasury should be completed within two to five days following receipt of the Veterans Administration data.

Fusselman Production Sure In Allison Completion

Fusselman discovery was sure in Terrell County with the flowing of 314 barrels of acid water in 14 hours, plus gas at the daily rate of 1,150,000 cubic feet at the Texas Crude Oil Co. and Superior Oil Co. No. 1-22 Allison 10 miles southeast of Sheffield.

Operator acidized with 3,000 gallons and fractured with 20,000 gallons through perforations between 11,320-348 feet and 11,378-400 feet and shut the project in for six hours. When it was opened on a 24-64-in. choke, it flowed the above gauge. Tubing pressure was 750 pounds. Earlier the operators tested the Ellenburger through perforations between 12,425-476 feet, which flowed gas at the maximum rate of 376,000 cubic feet daily.

Strawn production was indicated while the project was being drilled with the flowing of oil at four to seven barrels per hour, plus gas at the rally rate of 1.32 million cubic feet on a drillstem test between 10,235-267 feet.

It also showed gas on tests of the Devonian between 10,310-450 feet and 10,408-074 feet.

Shell Oil Co. and Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1-A Blackstone-Slaughter, in section 18, Block A2 of the TCRR Co. Survey, just over the line in Pecos County, six miles west of Sheffield, flowed 24 hours making 39 barrels of condensate and one barrel of water plus gas at the daily rate of 2.45 million cubic feet. Flow was through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,412-59 feet.

Austin — Legislature moved toward early showdowns as the House Revenue and Taxation Committee scheduled controversial bills in swift one-two-three order.

Coming up early on the committee calendar were three of the four measures in Gov. Price Daniel's special deficit-erasing program. Each renews controversies of last session. They are:

1. A new two-factor formula for figuring the franchise tax owed by interstate corporations based in Texas. At present the franchise tax is computed on the basis of receipts from sales in Texas.

"A firm which sells all of its output in Texas," the governor points out, "pays at a 100% rate. A Texas-based company selling all its products outside Texas pays none."

New formula would hit these interstate corporations. Governor Daniel calls it "closing a loophole." Industry spokesmen contend it would drive business from Texas.

2. A measure providing for enforcement of the escheat law. This is known as the abandoned property act, which was defeated in 1959 despite the governor's vigorous efforts.

Governor Daniel says he will call a special session if the bill isn't passed in regular session.

3. A temporary increase for one year of from 7 to 10 per cent on natural gas production. Gov. Daniel says this is to fill the revenue gap while the natural gas severance beneficiary tax is being thrashed out in court.

A new tax bill introduced in the House would levy a two per cent tax on all real estate transactions.

House members refused to take a beat-the-clock short cut toward getting a tax referendum on the ballot at the April 4 election.

Rep. Wesley Roberts of Lamesa, sponsor of the bill, asked the House to instruct the State Affairs Committee to consider the bill immediately and report to the House.

Proposal was defeated 81-65 with the vote dividing approximately on the same line as the one by which Speaker James Turman was elected.

Referendum would, in effect, have given the public an opportunity to say which of three possible broad-based taxes they would prefer — payroll, income or sales. Bill would have to be final passage before the end of February for the question to be printed on the ballot. Without hurry-up procedures the schedule will not be met.

Now the matter is left entirely to the legislators to determine. As most ran on platforms that called for no sales or income tax, these two taxing methods doubtless can be eliminated from further consideration.

Horse Racing Argued
 Legalizing horse racing is still a live issue after a committee hearing that ran into the small hours of the morning.

Rep. V. E. (Red) Berry of San Antonio is sponsor of the proposed constitutional amendment that would allow race tracks and parimutual betting on a local option basis.

Opponents, mostly ministers and lay church leaders, called gambling a parasite on the economy, and a producer of fewer jobs for the money spent than is possible in any other business.

Supporters called it a clean,

popular sport to which Texas climate is ideally suited. And, they declared, a painless revenue raiser.

Re-Cutting the Pie
 Two congressional re-districting bills have been introduced, one of which could cause anguished howls from the neighborhood of the Potomac.

Rep. Ben Lewis of Dallas has introduced a proposal to give Dallas County the extra congressman due Texas and leave the other districts as they are.

Rep. Malcolm McGregor has introduced a bill which gives Dallas two congressmen and re-carves all the other districts.

McGregor's proposal is based strictly on population, with no thought to personalities or politics.

In some instances it would result in two congressmen being put in one district. Some districts would be enlarged and some reduced.

Raise Proposal Axed
 County school superintendents are a touchy subject with the Legislature.

County Superintendent Geo. Corso has come back to the session to work for a bill to abolish the county superintendent's office in counties with few or no pupils in the county schools. Under this year's plan, abolishment would be on a local option vote. Supporters say it could save the state \$1,500,000 to \$2,000,000.

In this same atmosphere is a bill by Rep. R. A. Bartram of New Braunfels. However it would raise the salaries of assistant county superintendents. Money-hurting House members killed the bill.

Old Rules Re-Adopted
 Teacher pay raise advocates were disappointed when both House and Senate adopted the same rules of procedures as was used last session.

These rules prohibit passage of any new spending measure until the general appropriations bill is passed.

Last session passage of the general appropriations bill was virtually the last act before adjournment. Teacher raises and other new spending proposals died without ever coming to a vote.

Also Running
 Among other measures in the legislative churn are bills that would: exempt from state license fees farm trailers that farmers borrow from cotton gins and elevators; provide procedure for acquittal, and erasure of the blot of a criminal record of persons found to have been convicted of

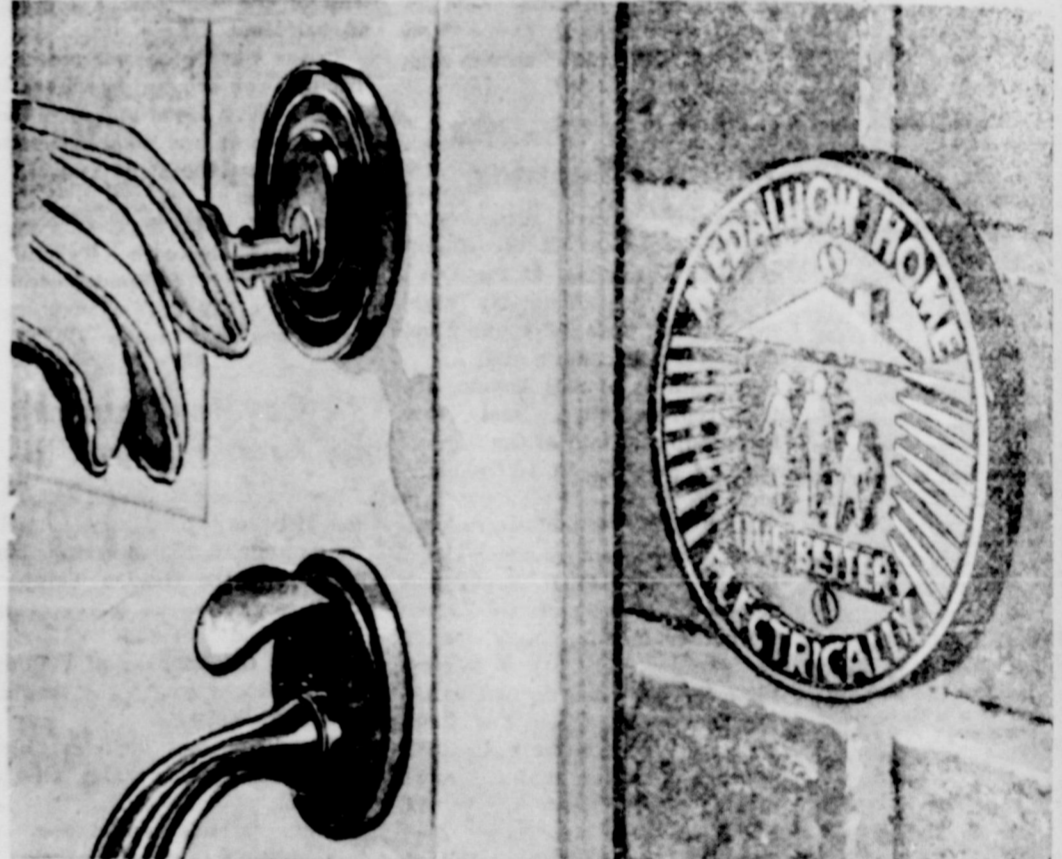

We have an idea that it will take quite a spell to get information together completely enough to present an intelligent and concise picture of the proposal for approval or disapproval by the voters.

Probably the most difficult bit of information to be obtained will be a method of paying for a hospital, and then how to make a hospital come close enough to paying its own way that it won't be too much of a burden on the tax payers to make up the deficit.

With a present tax valuation in the county of just over \$6-million there is some question in our minds as to how far that will go in furnishing that facility.

There is no doubt here, whatsoever, that a hospital is needed and would be a wonderful addition to our county. That fact is as definite as that this type is black.

When information is available we will pass it on to the readers.

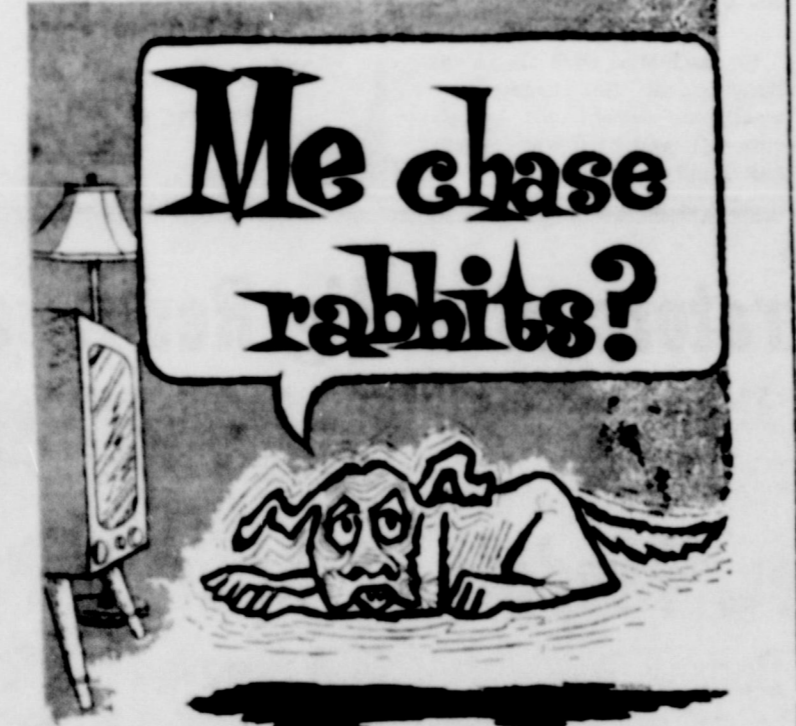
We are interested in this project, that's for sure. But there are several facets to be looked at.

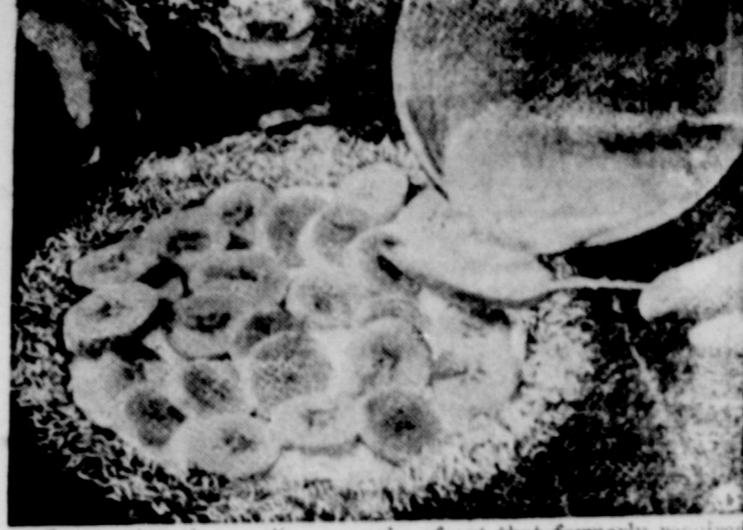
