Legislative Panel Okays Bill For Local School Board

Austin—Rep. Roger Thurmond of Del Rio got his bill to change the term of Terrell County school trustees through the House Education Committee Tuesday and ready for a vote on the floor, despite objections from a committee member that it was unconstitutional.

Thurmond got a favorable report from the committee and the bill, HB 507, was reported out with a recommendation that it pass.

Rep. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi objected to the bill on the ground that the attorney general's office has held that one-county bracket bills (those which apply to a population bracket, for instance 5,000 to 5,100) are unconstitutional.

Thurmond explained to the committee that the bill was drafted because under the present two-year terms, it is possible to elect a majority part of the school board in one election. He said that the school district's attorney, J. M. Hayre, had gone over the bill and this was the only possible way to draft the bill. Thurmond felt that the bill would not meet opposition and it would not be held unconstitutional if it were not disputed.

Hale contended that the bill would have to name the county and 30-day notice be given in the county affected to be valid. However, the committee felt that this was a local bill and favored by the school board so it went along with Thurmond's recommendations.

Three of the seven-man board will be named in an election on April 1 of this year and next year the terms of four members will expire.

County To Seek Bids For Local Seal Coating

The Terrell County Commissioners Court Monday approved a resolution to ask for bids for seal-coating local streets.

Bids for the project will be advertised within the next few weeks and if contracts are let work is expected to be done this summer.

All local black-topping will be seal-coated in the proposal. Also proposed is the black-topping of additional streets in Sanderson and the widening of the shoulders on 1st and 2nd Streets north of Oak Street to Richard Street. These proposals will depend upon the cost, according to the decision of the Commissioners.

It has been several years since a seal-coat was applied to the local streets and this work is badly needed, according to the officials. Several instances of the complete deterioration of the black-topping have been noted and also considerable damage to the shoulders of the black-topping and corner radii.

Terrell Gas Field Gets Designation

The Texas Railroad Commission, Oil and Gas Division, has announced a new field designation for Terrell County.

The Brown-Bassett (Strawn) gas field of Terrell County was opened February 25 with dual completion of Socony Mobil No. 1 Banner-Street, 29 miles northeast of Dryden.

The well was finaled for a calculated, absolute open flow of 21.5 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 11,205-642 feet.

It was completed from the El-Burgener on February 9 for 165 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 13,370-423 feet, and from open hole between 13,423-529 feet.

Location of the well is on section 332 in Block 2 of the TW & NG Survey.

New Manager For Phone Company

Matthew M. "Matt" Butschek has been named manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. in Fort Stockton. Fred Kester, district manager in Midland announced this week.

Kester said Butschek succeeds "Rusty" Lummus who has been appointed manager for the company in Longview, Texas. Lummus was appointed manager for Fort Stockton in December 1959.

Butschek and his family are moving to Fort Stockton from Dallas where he was a commercial staff assistant for the company.

He will have charge of the company's commercial and business office operation in Alpine, Big Bend National Park, Crane, Fort Davis, Marathon, Presidio, and Sanderson, in addition to Fort Stockton.

Butschek began his career in the company's plant department as a stockman in 1946. He was later transferred to the engineering department, then in May of 1959 he became a commercial staff assistant, the position he held at the time of his promotion as manager in Fort Stockton.

Butschek attended TCU, Texas University, and SMU, and was in the U.S. Navy during World War II. Property Owners To Have Chance At Black-Topping

Property owners of Sanderson may have an opportunity to have black-topping applied to their property if plans materialize between the county and contractors for this type of work, according to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson.

The Terrell County Chamber of Commerce Monday night voted to act as a clearing-house for applications for black-top work desired by local property owners.

The Chamber will report all its findings to the county and they will approach contractors for a bid on the proposed work. Property owners who are interested in having black-topping done on their property, possibly between existing street shoulders and their curb, or other premises are asked to measure the number of square yards to be black-topped and report that measure to J. A. Gilbreath, Chamber secretary, and this information will be turned in to the county. The contractor will then know of the number of square yards of topping desired by local residents and will be asked to make a bid on the work.

Property owners will then be apprised of the contract price and money will be collected for the work desired.

It was thought that this manner of assembling the information would offer an opportunity for many local property owners to have desired work done at a minimum cost.

Caroline Gets Award For Operation Of Water District

Austin — An official State Health Department citation was awarded this week to James Caroline, manager of the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, for proficiency in water plant management.

The certificate credits the recipients with having demonstrated "skill and knowledge" of water treatment plant management and an understanding of the public health importance of the work.

Under the State Health Department's operator certification program, operators are carefully examined on their technical ability and on their knowledge of their work's influence on community health. Each must pass a stiff written test to qualify for certification.

Nichols To Head Local Rotary Club

Joe D. Nichols was elected president of the Sanderson Rotary Club at the regular meeting Wednesday. The retiring president is E. J. Hanson and he was chosen as vice-president for the coming year.

The candidates for the honor are chosen by the American Legion from the junior class members after recommendations are made to the Legion by the high school faculty members.

Man Killed By Fall From Train West of Here

Billy Jennings, 33-year-old resident of Little Rock, Ark., was killed about 1:15 a.m. Tuesday after falling from an east-bound train about 10 miles west of Sanderson.

Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath ruled the death accidental after making an investigation at the scene of the accident.

The body of the victim was completely dismembered, disemboweled, decapitated and mutilated by the train and was strewn a distance of about 75 yards along the tracks.

Identification was possible by papers found in clothing and a tattoo was verified by a brother who was contacted by local sheriff Buster Babb.

The body was being held in the Janes Funeral Home pending instructions from the brother.

The body was discovered early Tuesday morning by a train crew and reported to Sheriff Babb. The time of the accident was determined by a check with railroad officials on east-bound train times and followed up by a check for possible clues or verification by San Antonio officers who were able to identify the cars of the train on which the accident occurred.

Contents in a bag of the deceased determined the fact that he had been in El Paso very recently and it is presumed that he was riding on a hopper car on the freight train and by some accident fell beneath the train.

There were no empty boxcars on the train, according to railroad officials.

Sheriff Babb, T&NO Special Agent, J. L. Walters, and Virgil Franks and Sam West, Border Patrolmen, investigated the accident.

Red Cross Drive To Begin Monday

The 1961 Red Cross Drive will begin here Monday with a kick-off breakfast in the dining room of the Oasis Restaurant with serving to begin at 7:30 a.m.

Ray Caldwell, drive chairman, is urging generous contributions from everyone in the community to build up the local funds in order that help may be available for cases of need referred to the home service chairman of the local Chapter which has recently been re-activated.

A house-to-house canvass will be made during the drive for one week only.

Last year, 139 Chapters in Texas reported assistance given through home service to a total of 48,702 cases. Other requests handled but not counted as cases amount to 50,928.

Last year services to the armed forces, veterans, and their families amounted to \$33,557,642 about 39 cents of every Red Cross dollar. In Texas alone, 9,610 cases received direct financial aid totaling \$308,294. American people who made voluntary gifts to the Red Cross made this help possible. The organization's only source of income is through annual fund campaigns or through federated campaigns in which the Red Cross participates.

Tax Office To Close On April 1

The tax office, and all other offices in the court house will be closed Saturday, April 1, on account of the election to be held there that day.

This notice is printed because of the fact that many local vehicle owners wait until that day each year to buy their license plates, and Mrs. Tol Murrah, the deputy tax collector, stated that under no circumstances would the purchase of license plates on April 1 be possible.

Persons who do not have their license plates by that date and who drive their cars for any purpose will be assessed a 20 per cent penalty, according to state law, she said. Vehicle owners who purchase their license plates after April 1 must also sign an affidavit that they have not operated their vehicles since April 1 in order to avoid the penalty.

Vehicle owners are asked to please cooperate with the deputy tax collector by buying license plates early.

One of the defendants was arrested after his car ran off the highway coming up 10-mile hill. The vehicle struck a guard post and hung over the edge of the embankment. Witnesses also told officers that the driver had several near-accidents with other vehicles prior to running off the highway. He received a fine of \$75, plus the mandatory three days in jail and six-months suspension of his driver's license.

The other defendant was picked up on suspicion and charged with DWI. He received the minimum \$50 fine and other mandatory penalties from County Judge R. S. Wilkinson.

A passenger in each car with each driver was filed on for being drunk in a public place in Justice of Peace Court and after a plea of guilty each received a fine of \$1 and costs of court.

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Austin — After hours of fiercely critical debate, the House voted by a surprising 149-to-1 to attack the state's fiscal problems by working first to retire the deficit as an emergency measure.

This is the approach advocated by Gov. Price Daniel and Speaker of the House James Turman. Several who spoke against the deficit-retiring resolution voted for it.

Agreeing to retire the deficit, however, is not the same as agreeing on how to do it. Some new measures, big and broad, have been introduced.

One representative has submitted an omnibus tax measure which he says will bring in \$233,000,000 over a two-year period. It is backed by Gov. Daniel.

The bill includes levies on natural gas pipelines, power-driven objects, and parts, utilities, and stock transfers, and jewelry and watches, construction materials, soft drinks, beer, wine, liquor, restaurant meals.

According to the governor's office, the bill would provide revenue for an \$800 a year teacher pay raise and other spending but is not aimed at wiping out the deficit.

Representatives are proposing an even bigger one. It is a 2 per cent general sales tax to raise an estimated \$317,000,000.

A "broad-based" excise tax has also been introduced.

It is not called a sales tax but, in the language of the bill, imposes "upon each separate sale at retail of tangible personal property within this state an excise tax of 2 per cent." It has a long list of exemptions, including some already-taxed items. Co-Op Bill Killed

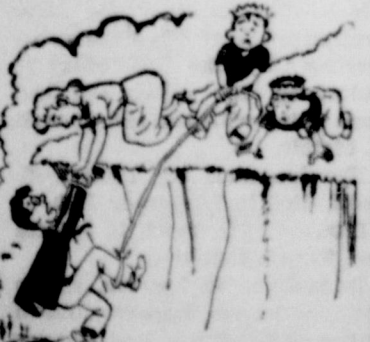
REA electric co-op hopes for more city privileges were tumbled by a 77-to-64 House vote.

Several years ago the Legislature passed a law authorizing co-ops to continue to serve the same customers when a co-op area is annexed by a city. This year the co-ops sought permission to add new customers to existing lines in annexed areas.

Opponents charged that this would put a government-subsidized operation in competition with private enterprise. Spokesmen for private utilities declared they have to pay 27.4 per cent of their income in taxes compar-

Passage of the 60-day midpoint in this session ended the period when bills may be introduced without special consent. A flood of new bills came in under the wire. Among them are measures that would: allow voters to put an "X" by the name of the person they wish to vote for instead of scratching all others on the ballot; provide for a 10 per cent merit pay raise for teachers to be awarded by local districts and financed 50-50 by state and district; provide penalties for law enforcement officers who come out of "ambush" to arrest motorists; require children entering the first grade in public schools to have polio shots; increase workmen's compensation insurance benefits to a maximum of \$50 per week.

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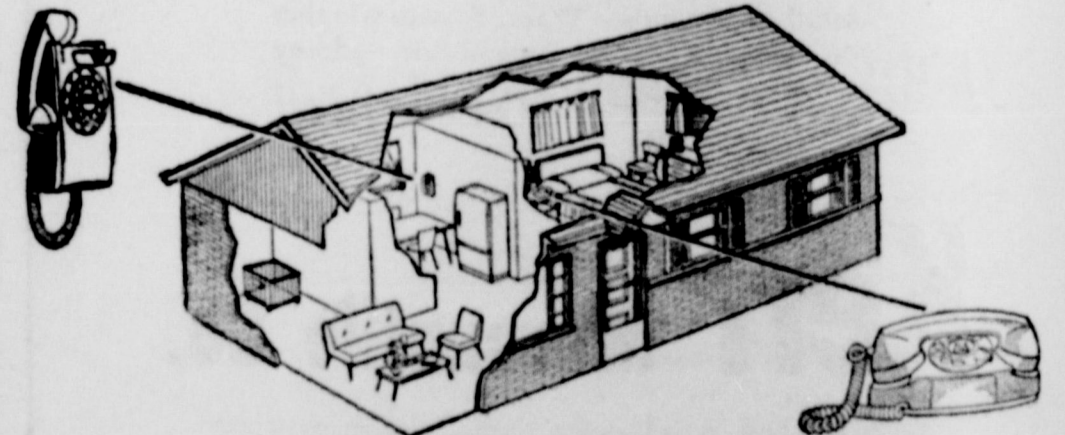
