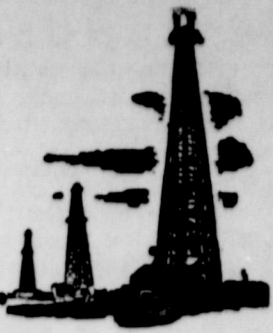

The game and fish department costs too much money, according to the non-sportsman, the school teachers get too much money now, say some who do not have children in school. The state employment program is sorely misused, say the employers, and poorly inadequate, say the unemployed.

The state highway system has many chiefs and committees for expedient operation and to other group wastes money in the lack of organization.

Yes, the people are looking to the government, state and nation more and more, to blame them with all of the failures we have as citizens or business men or both.

We want controls on other people and a free rein ourselves. We plead for aid when we need it and then raise the devil because of the cost of administration after things get back to near normal.

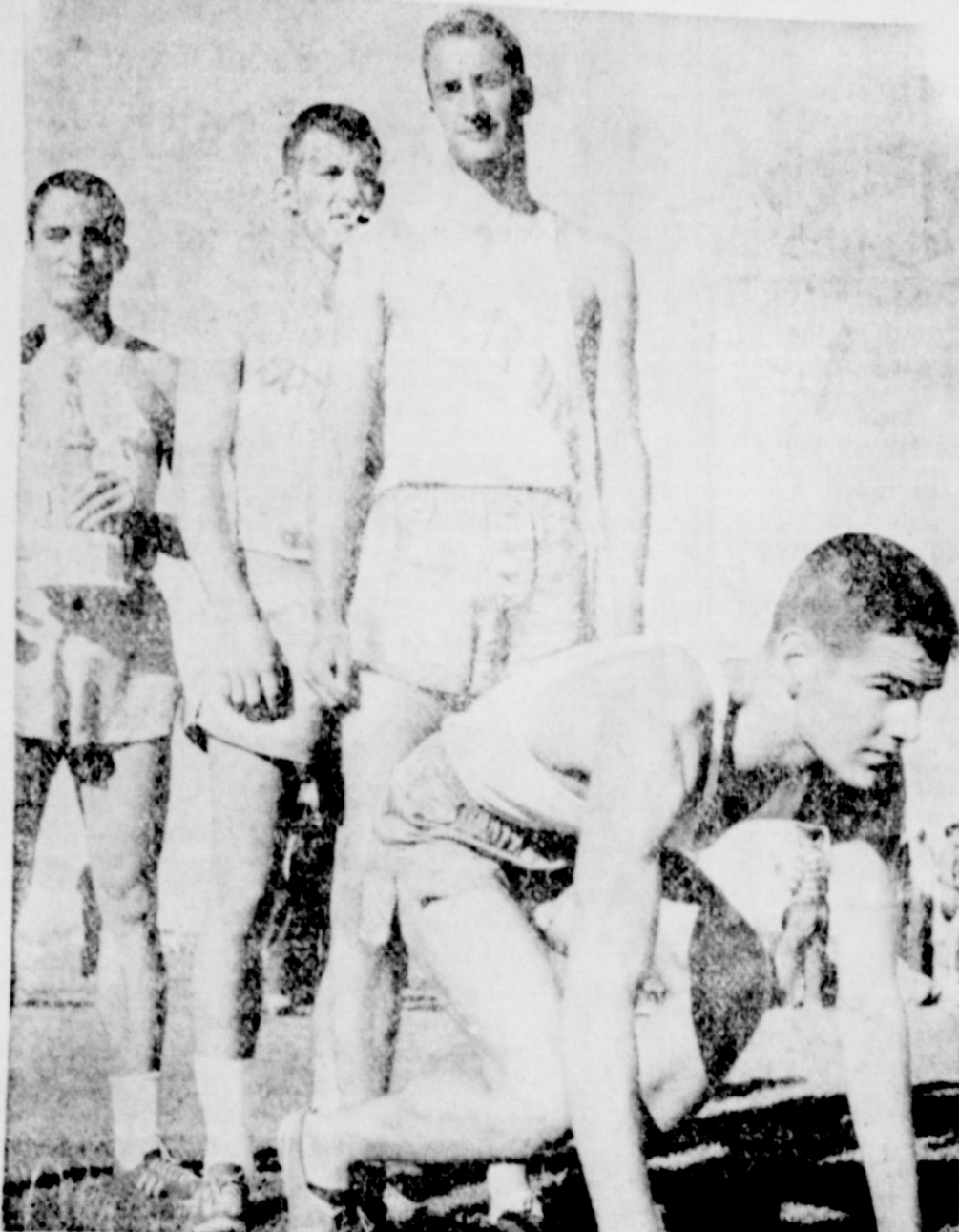

The Sanderson High School trackmen who competed in the State Interscholastic League finals in Austin last Saturday came home with a third and fourth place in two events.

Felix Valles placed third in the 880-yard dash with a time of 1:57.2, only 6 of a second off the state record.

The mile relay team, composed of Bill Stavley, Dee Gray, Larry Harrell, and Valles, placed fourth with a time of 3:31.2.

These two events were the only ones in which Sanderson trackmen had qualified for by virtue of second-place wins at the regional level.

Coach Carlton Smith accompanied the boys to Austin.

## Location Slaked For New Well

Location has been made for an outpost to Ellenburger production in the Brown-Bassett Field of Terrell County.

Shell Oil Co., Midland, will drill the No. 1 Shell-Sinclair Scott and State as a 2 1/4-mile west and slightly north of the Shell Turk and State.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of section 19 in Block R of the TCRR Survey. Contract depth is 16,000 feet and the estimated derrick floor elevation is 2,450 feet.

## Socony Mobil To Re-Work Brown-Bassett Discovery Well

Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., and Western Natural Gas Co. plans to re-enter and dually complete from the Ellenburger and Silurian their field discovery hole, Brown-Bassett No. 1, originally Magnolia Petroleum Co. and Western Natural Gas Co.

The hole will be known as the No. 1-DD Brown-Bassett by Socony and Western.

The hole was finished March 5,

1958, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 75 million cubic feet of gas daily through perforations between 12,387-12-446. Drilled to 15,556 feet, it assured Ellenburger production through six sets of perforations between 14,120-943 feet, however, the Ellenburger was plugged off due to mechanical difficulties with production coming only from the Silurian in the hole.

While drilling in the Silurian at 12,407 feet in July of 1957, the well blew out and gas ignited and was out of control for nearly three days before being extinguished by the world-famous oil and gas well firefighter, Myron Kinley. At the time of the fire, the \$450,000 rig collapsed in a matter of minutes, destroying practically all equipment connected with the drilling operation.

Total production of the well at the time of completion was said to be about 185-million cubic feet of gas.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of section 218 in Block Y of the TCRR Survey and is just southeast of the El Paso Natural Gas Co. CO<sub>2</sub> extraction plant.

Ellenburger completion was made at the Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Alma H. Poulter on section 21, Block 1, TCRR Survey, a 3 3/8-mile northwest extension of Ellenburger production in the Brown-Bassett Field. The well is also completed for Wolfcamp gas-distillate production.

Completion is being effected through perforations between 14,252-384 feet.

The Wolfcamp completion was for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.85-million cubic feet of gas per day, plus 53 barrels of 60 gravity distillate through perforations between 6,221-2 feet.

The gas liquid ratio was 91,000-1.

Texas Crude Oil Co. and Superior Oil Co. No. 1-22 Allison in section 22, Block B2 of the CCSD&RGNG Survey, a Terrell County multi-pay prospect, was continuing to test the Strawn and Pennsylvanian detrital.

Tested 24 hours through a choke of unreported size and the Strawn perforations between 10,251-54 feet, it flowed 179 barrels of fluid, no breakdown, with a trace of oil and gas.

Tested for 24 hours through a 24-64-inch choke, and Pennsylvanian detrital perforations between 10,300-345 feet, it flowed 30.8 barrels of new oil, plus gas at the daily rate of 500,000 cubic feet.

## Area Citizens View Gas Plant Facility

Area people got a first-hand view of the operations at the El Paso Natural Gas Co. carbon-dioxide extraction plant in the Brown-Bassett Field Saturday.

Charley Smith, superintendent, along with officials from El Paso, Jal. N.M., and the local employees, took pride in showing the visitors through the plant, the community hall, and the beautiful homes at the plant.

A barbecue dinner, prepared and served by the Sanderson delegation from the Chamber of Commerce, American Legion, Rotary and Lions Clubs, was served at 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

Dudley Harrison, president of the C of C, was master of ceremonies during the introduction of distinguished guests and employees of the company. Rev. John W. Byrd, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, gave the invocation prior to the meal.

Later in the evening, square dancing in the hall with W. J. Morris doing the call, furnished entertainment until about 10:00 p.m.

The plant is now handling 53 million cubic feet of feed gas daily, is designed to remove carbon dioxide from the natural gas and uses a new commercial process developed by the Fluor Corporation of Los Angeles and El Paso Natural.

Adjacent to the plant are a 16-cottage camp, warehouses and offices. The entire camp has been graded and lawns are beginning to grow with grass and trees and shrubbery arranged to make for a picturesque site.

The new citizens in the northeastern part of the county were loud in their praise for the welcome given by the county's citizens.

The local committee in charge of arrangements asked The Times to express their most sincere thanks and appreciation to all those who helped in any way to make the venture a success.

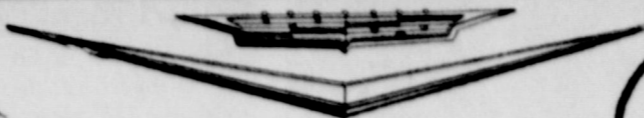
