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## LISTEN TO LUKE

The firemen are looking to us citizens to furnish them with enough money to operate the local fire department for some months ahead. The length of time the money lasts will depend on the amount of money that is contributed and the needs for expenditures that arise.

The executive board of that organization is looking for some way to collect money from all the local citizens in a manner that will be more equal in distribution, and also will be easier on the long run on all contributors.

We hope that all of you will give generously to this cause. It is our bounden duty to contribute what is necessary to keep our fire fighting equipment in shape.

The time is going to come one of these days when it will be necessary for us to replace one of those trucks and that is going to be quite an expenditure. If we could come up with some way of apportioning equally for that emergency, it would be well in our opinion.

The income and expenses of the fire department for the past two years are printed in other columns of The Times and we should familiarize ourselves with these expense accounts so that we may know what our fire department is doing.

We don't go along with the idea that has been promoted and practiced of late. That is of high government officials going over the country stumping for lesser candidates for public office, such as state governors, senators, and US government officers. In the first place, we don't think they know anything about the qualifications of any candidate — or it is rather unlikely that they do.

In the second place, we think they should have more important things to do than to be directly concerned with stumping in precincts for their compatriots politically. If they don't have anything more important to do, they should make like they do so that the people of the nation will not lose respect for those high officials.

There are laws — the Hatch Act we believe — that prohibits government employees from taking part in politics to some degree or other, and we have heard of US Army officers that were stripped of their commands for speaking out too loudly in regards to Communism and their opposition to it.

It just doesn't make sense!

Local ranchmen are becoming interested in the program to eradicate the screw worm fly. We think that the plans they have to organize locally for that purpose and join with others in the plan is a worthwhile move.

We plan to give all publicity we possibly can to the local efforts.

We think that it is extremely interesting that strains of the fly are being preserved to keep in case that nature's imbalance will cause some calamity or occurrence that is worse than the fly.

Such things have actually happened — like the nutria in our neighboring state to the east.

When we start messing with nature and going against the grain sometimes it is a costly thing and we cannot afford to bring anything worse upon the world than the screw worm fly. And there are few people who would consider anything as being worse than that.

But, certainly, we hope that the plan is successful and that it is perpetually beneficial to mankind to be rid of the fly.

## New Pay Strata Found In Hicks Dual-Pay Hole

Dual completion as a gas discovery from the Atoka and Fusselman has been effected at Rodden Oil Company, Midland, No. 1 L. H. Hicks, on section 5 of

the CCSD&RGNG RR Survey in Terrell County and seven and 1-2 miles northwest of the Brown-Bassett multipay gas field.

It rated a calculated, absolute open flow of 4,200,000 cubic feet of gas daily from the Atoka through perforations at 11,392 to 12,072 feet and a calculated, absolute open flow of 4,050,000 cubic feet daily from the Fusselman through perforations at 12,844 to 12,876 feet.

The Atoka had been acidized with 10,000 gallons and the Fusselman treated with 4,500 gallons of acid and 20,000 of fracture fluid.

The project was drilled to 13,001 feet and 7 5/8-inch casing was set at that depth.

Extensive tests were made through Fusselman perforations but Atoka perforations and tests in that zone had not been reported.

## Screwworm Fly Eradication Plans For Terrell County

Efforts will begin in the near future to organize ranchmen of Terrell County to participate in the screw worm fly eradication program planned for this section of the United States. Further details will be released when they are available.

Some ranchmen of the county have attended meeting in other counties and have been in contact with other county representatives in connection with the planned program and consider it vital and essential that local participation be obtained so that a thorough and complete job will be accomplished if and when such a program is begun.

It has been pointed out that the program, to have the best opportunity to get cooperation of certain federal agencies, and to have maximum benefits once it is undertaken, must have the cooperation of practically all stock men of the nation.

To obtain maximum strength for seeking federal government cooperation, appeal is being made to poultry raisers, dairy farmers, swine raisers, sheep, goat, and cattle raisers, and horse breeders.

As soon as is possible and feasible, all ranchmen of the county will be asked to attend a meeting to hear an explanation of the proposed program, its method of financing, its plan of trust deposits, and all other related information.

Ranchmen are asked to watch their mail closely for notification of the time, date, and place of such a meeting, and The Times will carry such information if it is at all possible and also will pass on any related information as it becomes available.

She had been taken there for medical treatment two days previously. Her body was brought to Sanderson with James Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Interment was in Santa Rita Cemetery.

The Sanderson Eagles lost all chances for district honors here last Friday night when they lost their football game to the Fabens Wildcats by a 16-8 score.

Sanderson had the ball deep in Fabens territory on two different occasions and were unable to furnish the last amount of effort necessary to put the ball over the goal line. Fabens lost the ball once on the Sanderson 5-yard line on a fumble.

Sanderson's only score came in the last period when Larry Harrell broke through for 15 yards and the score. He also ran over two extra points following the TD.

Fabens scored early in the opening frame from the 4-yard line. The tally was set up by a 51-yard scamper by Buster Shockley, a halfback. Ronnie Glover was the Wildcat who carried the 6-point over and Shuckley converted the extra two.

After the Eagles had tied up the score, Fabens took the ball down field on a spread formation which was working well offensively and Shockley carried over for the clincher and also converted the two extra points.

Sanderson led Fabens in first downs 155-9; and yards rushing 231-230; yards passing 56-3; the Eagles completed 4 of 11 passes and had one intercepted; Fabens completed 1 of 4 passes and had 1 intercepted.

The Eagles will meet the powerful Wink Wildcats here next Friday night for the final game of the season for the locals. Wink has clinched a tie for district honors with Fabens who has lost only one game and they will be

## Fire Department To Seek Funds For Operation

The Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department executive committee is in the process of preparing letters for mailing to Sanderson residents seeking contributions for maintaining the operation of the unit for the future.

The executive board stated that the balance on hand after paying bills the first of this month was less than \$100 and since the department would continue to need regular operational expenses it would be necessary for residents to begin considering another contribution.

A brief summary of the receipts and expenditures of the past two years is as follows:

Collected between Oct 14, 1959 to October 26, 1961 — \$2,942.68.

Disbursements include: telephone, \$426.00; utilities, \$42.10; fire equipment and supplies, \$682.87; maintenance man's salary, \$400.00; insurance, \$623.74; maintenance and replacement on the trucks, \$670.61, for a total of \$2,835.32; leaving a balance on hand of \$97.36 as of that date.

There were utility bills and gasoline bills due after November 1 from this amount, the officials stated.

Residents are urged to send in their contributions for the maintenance of the local fire fighting unit as soon as possible.

## Livestock Count Urged By USDA

A number of patrons of the Sanderson post office will find livestock survey cards in their boxes on November 16.

"Information reported on the cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Officer in Charge Jolly Harkins explains. Cards are distributed at random among patrons having livestock and poultry.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Harkins said. "For this reason, it is important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that the USDA can get a true sample of the state's livestock holdings."

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas crop and livestock reporting service releases, newspaper, farm magazines, radio, and television.

"This annual survey has been a joint undertaking of the post office and the Agriculture Department since 1924," concludes Mr. Harkins.

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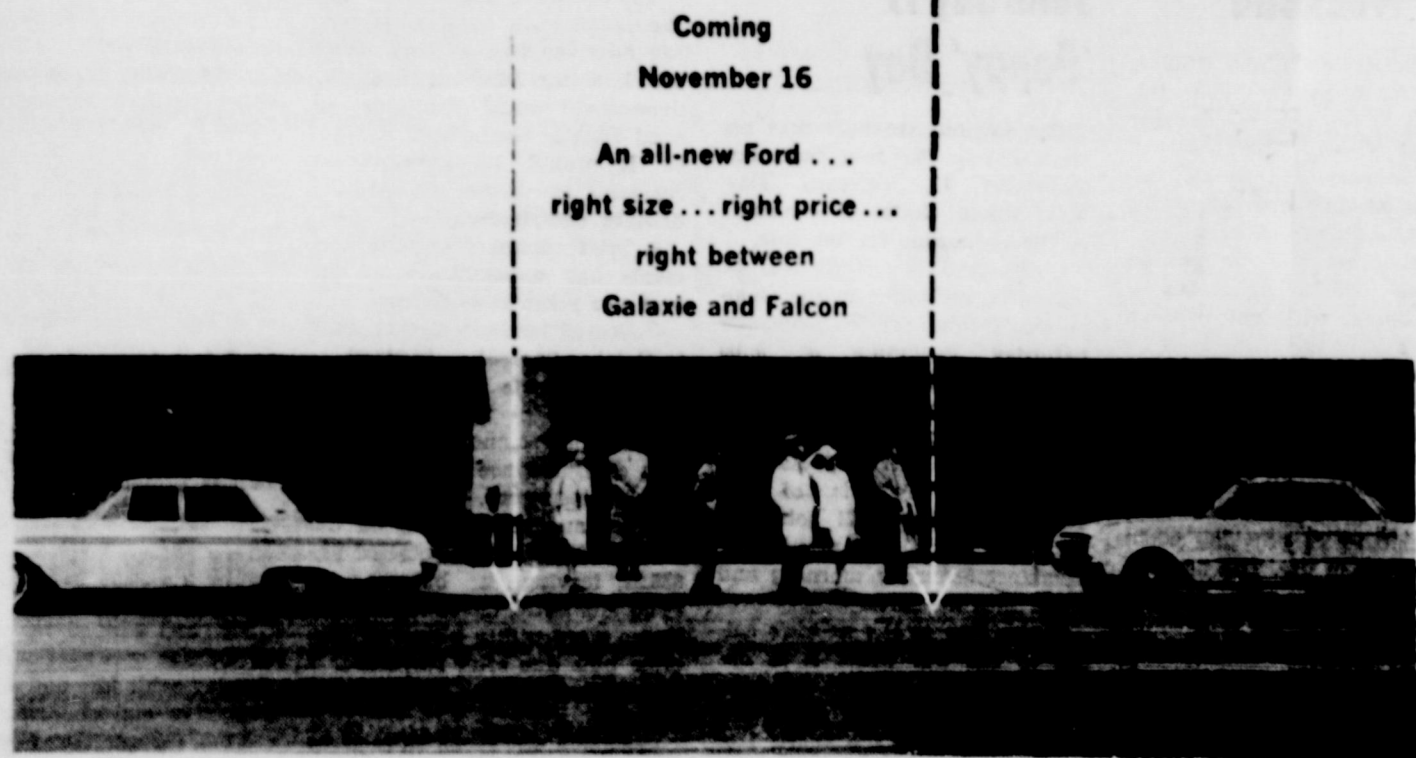

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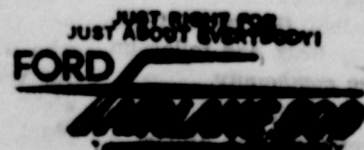

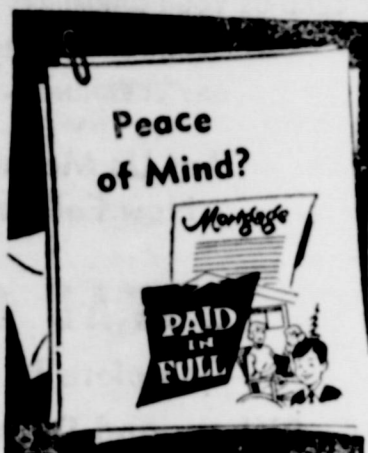
