## LISTEN TO LUKE

The Texas Legislature, it seems, might have done the ultimate in passing such a muddled-up tax bill, but not so. Now they have passed the blue law which seems destined take top place in boob-tubs for all time to come.

We thought that the way they had figured out to tax shoes, but not under all circumstances, and rose food, but not tomato plan food, etc., etc., was about as far to the ridiculous as one could go. Nope!

There are 42 items listed on the blue law bill which cannot be sold on Sunday if they are sold on Saturday, or vice-versa. You can take your choice and sell them on either day — but not both — that is out of the same store.

At the last meeting of the directors, several items of business were discussed, but there was no official action on such topics as Rural Area Development program, boosting deer hunting business, etc.

## Casing Run, Tests Slated In Noelke Hole

Shell Oil Company has set 5 1/2-inch casing on bottom at 10,238 feet for completion at 10 mpt through perforations in No. 1 Noelke, section 2, Block A-2 TC RR Survey. Connell sand gas-condensate strike in the Terrell County portion of the Yuca Butte area and three miles southeast of the triply completed Pennsylvania detrital, Connell and Ellenburger gas-condensate discovery in the Pecos County portion of the same area.

Water had been encountered on a drillstem test of the Ellenburger at 10,152 to 10,227 feet. Previous two-hour and 35-minute test of the Connell at 10,042 to 10,090 feet developed a flow of gas in one minute, the volume being rated at 5,600,000 cubic feet daily. Produced with the gas were 20 barrels of 65.5 gravity condensate in one hour and 35 minutes on 24 1/2-inch choke. Recovery was 10 feet of condensate and 10 feet of water.

## Murderer Gets 15-Year Sentence Here Thursday

Houston Dickerson got a 15-year sentence in district court here last Thursday morning in a trial in which he was accused of murder. The selection of the jury, arguments on the case, the jury's deliberations, etc., consumed about one hour's time.

The case grew out of the death of Albert Edmund Wood, 59, of San Antonio, about the middle of August. Wood is said to have died as a result of injuries on the head inflicted by Dickerson.

Wood and Dickerson were seen boarding a freight train together in Sanderson and were seen riding an eastbound freight train together. When the train was in a siding at Malvado, the convicted man's confession stated that he and Wood had an argument at which time the injuries were inflicted to Wood with a rock in the hands of Dickerson.

When the train left the siding Wood's body was sighted and the train was stopped. Wood was alive and the train crew was instructed to place the body on the caboose and proceed on to Del Rio where Wood would be given medical treatment. He is said to have died shortly after having been put on the train.

Local officers were alerted and they notified Val Verde County officers who met the train and took suspects in for questioning. Wood is said to have confessed the crime and given a written account of the murder to officers.

He was brought back to Sanderson and after waiving examining trial, was placed under \$5,000 bond by Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath. He has been held in the Terrell County jail since that time in lieu of bond.

District Judge Roger Thurmond presided at the trial. District Attorney Douglas A. Newton was the prosecutor and W. C. McDonald of Fort Stockton was the court-appointed defender for Dickerson.

Mrs. Belle Southerland of Del Rio, court reporter, was also here for the trial.

Dickerson pleaded guilty to the charge and asked that sentence be given immediately after the trial.

Soon after his arrest he told local officers that he was an escapee from Folsom prison and he had a long record of both petty and felonious cases. It is said that he will have to serve every day of his murder sentence because of the fact that he is an escapee.

The front bus stopped at the cafe and the second bus rammed into it, shoving the front bus into the back of the band director's car which was parked there.

Local officers investigating the accident stated that the back of the front bus had a window broken and some damage done to the body. The back bus had considerable damage to the front end.

The band borrowed a bus from the Terrell County Independent School District to return the members to Wink and the bus was returned Saturday morning when the Wink bus was driven home.

One of the girls on the back bus received a broken nose and facial cuts and was returned to Wink that night. Another girl received a cut lip. Several of the other occupants were bruised and shaken in the accident.

## Fire Monday Threatens Home Of H. A. Smiths

The Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department was called about noon Monday to the ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Smith west of town.

Sparks or heat in the fireplace had ignited lumber at the place where the cavity of the house joined the fireplace.

A part of the roof had to be torn off the house, part of the plaster broken off the side of the house and a part of the cement removed from the chimney before the firemen could gain access to the boards where the flames alone were negligible but the necessary damage to the house to get to the flames was in the neighborhood of \$250.00 it was estimated. There was no water or smoke damage to the interior of the house.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith and their visitors, Mr. and Mrs. F. L. King, her brother-in-law and sister and Ernest Jesup, had been sitting by the fireplace in the living room and when they walked to the west part of the house noticed there was an excessive amount of smoke in the room where they had been sitting. On examination they found smoke billowing from the attic of the house and called the fire department.

The location of the fire was ascertained immediately and work at getting to the blaze to extinguish it began immediately.

Laborers on the Smith ranch and from the ranch of Charlie Gregory were on hand to aid in whatever work had to be done.

## Trans-Pecos Deer Season Dec. 1-8

Deer season opened in some parts of the state on Thursday of this week and the season will be open to December 31.

In the Trans-Pecos area, however, the deer season runs from December 1-8, both days inclusive. The Trans-Pecos area includes Terrell, Pecos, Reeves and all counties to the west and north in Texas.

Some earlier closing dates in the white-tail country have been specified, and some counties have a "bonus" deer offered in an effort to reduce the herds of does in those areas. The taking of does also will be permitted in many of the counties, but not as a "bonus" deer.

Hunters who are not sure of the hunting laws and bag limits in the area where they are hunting are warned to obtain the correct information from the game conservationist.

## Eagles Feel Wink Power In Season Closer, 41-0

The Sanderson Eagles had a full dose of the Wink Wildcat power here last Friday night as the Wildcats took the district title and were on the top side of a 41-0 drubbing. The Wildcats did not let up in their mauling of the Eagles after they had insured the win.

Coaches Carlton Smith and Gerald Petersen liberally substituted reserves during the third and particularly the fourth period to get advantage of the experience for the boys who will be carrying the Eagle banner during the coming season.

The Wildcat scores began early in the first period when the quarterback, Dean Bates, hit end Johnny Langford on a 30-yard pass. The Wildcats had a TD returned in this period due to a clipping penalty.

In the second period Curtis Robinson, all-state candidate of the powerful Wink team, scored on a four-yard plunge, again on a five-yard run, and then tossed a pass to Arnold Holloway for a two-point conversion. Also in the second period Jackie Thompson went 34 yards for a score.

In the third frame Robinson went over from the one-yard line and the final tally was in the last frame when Bates went in from 20 yards out and then kicked the extra point.

Robinson tries kicking an extra point in the third frame which was no good and tried a field goal in the fourth which was no good.

Robinson went into the game with 119 points this year and raised the total to 139 points during the local fray.

Sanderson had one serious threat in the fourth quarter which was stemmed by the Wildcats. A fourth-down try needed only inches for a score.

The Wildcats wound up their season with 10 wins and a perfect conference record. They will meet Sonora in the bi-district game this weekend.

The Eagles won six games, lost three and tied one during the season.

Sales Tax Deducts Computed for '61 For Texas Taxpayers

Texas taxpayers will get a break in claiming Texas sales tax payments on their federal income tax returns for 1961. B. Frank White, Internal Revenue Service Regional Commissioner for Texas and four other southwestern states, has announced. The IRS has devised a Texas sales tax table to help the Texas taxpayer calculate his state sales tax deductions at a glance and without troublesome record keeping. According to White, Texas taxpayers who itemize their deductions on Form 1040 will not have to keep their state sales tax records, providing their Texas sales tax deductions do not exceed those on the tax table. "Texas taxpayers making state sales tax payments in excess of the amounts shown on the table may take deductions to which they are lawfully entitled," White said. However, these taxpayers must keep sales tax records and be able to prove their deductions in the same way as they would be required to verify any other deductions on their federal tax return. "Taxpayers using the standard 10 per cent deduction would not be entitled to deduct the Texas sales tax payment," White said. The tax table, shown here, gives average amounts spent by Texas residents for sales taxes and is arranged according to various adjusted gross income brackets. Since the Texas sales tax law did not go into effect until September 1 of this year, the IRS tax table covers the period between September 1 and December 31, 1961. A new table will be published for 1962. White explained that estimates of average Texas general sales tax payments are based on two kinds of information—state sales tax laws and a statistical analysis of consumer spending. When new spending patterns are established or substantial changes are made in the Texas sales tax law, the table will be revised. The table does not include such deductible items as the Texas state tax on gasoline which is five cents a gallon, or the state tax on cigarettes, which is eight cents a pack, which was effective August 28, 1961. White said that the time saving Texas Sales Tax Table will be off the presses and available for general distribution at IRS district offices in Austin and Dallas by December 6. three senators for the lieutenant governor's race assures warm competition for the place left open when Ben Ramsey moved to the Railroad Commission.

Sen. Jarred S. Crest of Temple, Sen. Bob Baker of Houston, and Sen. Preston Smith of Lubbock are the announced candidates. There is likely to be GOP opposition for this post as well as at least one other Democrat.

Only thing certain now is that there will be stiff competition for those primary votes on May 5.

### Capitol Value

For years, the huge red granite State Capitol, which was paid for with 3,000,000 acres of land, has been carried on the state's books at a value of \$131.50.

Board of Control has appraised the Capitol at \$9,948,391. They valued the land on which it is located at \$5,143,623. It's not for sale for the total of \$15,092,014. But at least it's on the books right now.

Incidentally, the old Capitol is getting a refurbishing. Workmen are replacing cracked and splintered panels in the hallways, and removing the old varnish. It will come out lighter and brighter.

### New Laws

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson quickly plugged one possible loophole in the "Blue Law".

He advised Dist. Atty. Henry Wade of Dallas that a corporation owning two or more stores must close on the same day. One can't open Saturday and the other Sunday. Nor can a store accept orders by phone in advance to be delivered on Sunday.

Wilson also is busy interpreting other new laws, among them the one requiring holders of property for others, except banks, to report it to the state when the owner hasn't been around for seven years.

He advised Treasurer Jesse James that an oil company which holds royalties outside Texas on oil produced in Texas does not have to report it to the State of Texas except that amount held

for persons whose last known address was in Texas.

The Attorney General expects so much work out of this new law that he set up a special division to handle it.

In another opinion, Wilson held that wiretapping to record phone conversations is not illegal in Texas.

### Third Round

In the next few weeks, Gov. Price Daniel will have completed his third round of appointments.

Most of the state's operations are directed by 3 or 9-member boards appointed for six-year overlapping terms.

These appointments are made to more than 140 state boards and commissions.

### Short Snorts

Starting January 1, the Welfare Department will begin paying medical, hospital, and nursing home bills for the 225,000 needy aged who are on the old-age assistance rolls. Program will cost about \$12,000,000 in state money in the coming 20 months. Federal dollars will match the state's.

Governor Daniel has reactivated the Governor's Committee for the White House Conference on the Aging to resume its study of the problems of the aging. Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro was renamed chairman.

The first month's payments under the new natural gas tax totaled \$356,481, but \$306,532 of it was paid under protest. Gas pipelines have brought suit to kill the new tax.

Income from the first 90,780 re-

ports received by Comptroller Robert S. Calvert was \$7,206,727. Calvert thinks it will be February, when the first full quarter's sales tax is collected, before he can tell whether it will yield the estimated \$319,000,000 in two years.

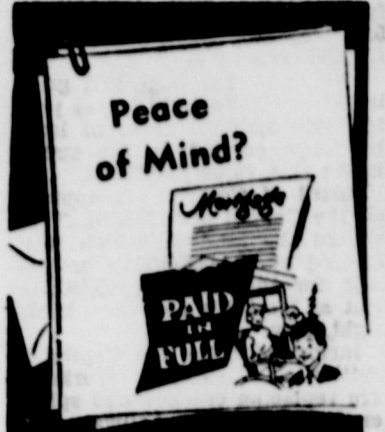



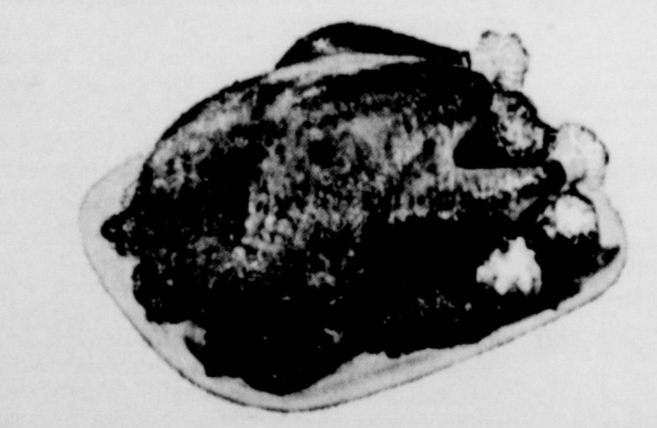

**Social Security Law Changes Noted**

Many people are receiving social security benefits even while working for more than \$1200. This is possible by withholding a certain number of social security benefits based on an estimate the worker gave before his benefits started.

H. P. Thomas, manager of the Odessa district office, reminds workers who are receiving benefits based on an estimate that they should notify their social security office if their earnings are going to exceed the original estimate so an additional adjustment can be made in their benefits.

This revised estimate can be made any time during the year when a worker knows his earnings will exceed his original estimate. By sending in the post card form, number OA-C669 to the Social Security Administration. If the worker has lost his card or if he has some question he should feel free to write to the district office located in Odessa at 1428 East 8th St. telephone FE 2-9423. Office hours are 8:45 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

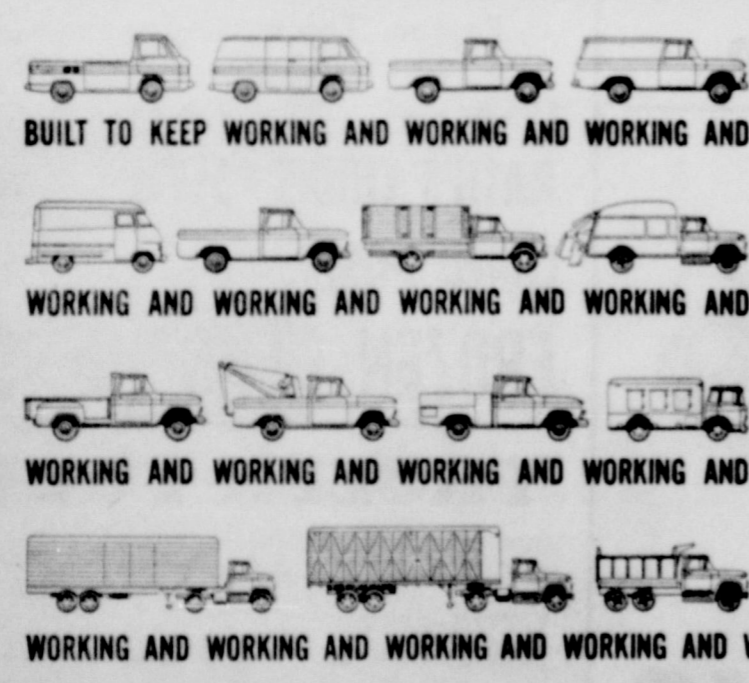
