## Mrs. Landon Rose Dies In Del Rio

Services for Mrs. Elizabeth Rose, 87, pioneer Del Rioan, were held at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday in the First Methodist Church in Del Rio.

Mrs. Rose, wife of the late Landon Rose, died Monday night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Sam Draper, in Del Rio. She had been in failing health in recent months.

She was born October 21, 1874, in Boerne, the daughter of the late P. D. Saner, early-day Kendall County pioneer. When Mrs. Rose's mother died in 1186, she came to Del Rio to make her home with a sister and brother-in-law, Judge and Mrs. W. K. Jones.

She graduated from high school and later attended a boarding school at San Marcos known as the Caronal Institute. After her graduation she returned to Del Rio and taught school for two years before her marriage to Mr. Rose September 21, 1897. In 1947, the couple marked their golden wedding anniversary.

Except for the time spent on the Rose ranch in Terrell County, Mrs. Rose had lived in Del Rio for 75 years. After Mr. Rose died in 1951, she made her home with her daughters.

Other survivors include another daughter, Mrs. Tol Murrell and one son, Hugh F. Rose, both of Sanderson; two grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

## Study Made of Sheep Industry In United States

Denver — What's the future of the sheep industry? That may be decided by a study being made of the industry by McKinsey and Company, one of the top-ranking management consultant firms.

McKinsey was hired by the American Sheep Producers Council — the industry's promotion organization — to study all the facets of the sheep business and on how it can best succeed.

Don Clyde of Heber City Utah, president of the American Sheep Producers Council, the study by McKinsey offers the sheep industry a new note of optimism. Here, for the first time, he said, an unbiased, authoritative source will give the sheepmen specific recommendations on what it will take to bring a greater return to the sheep industry.

"We have been discussing the problems of the sheep business for half a century," Clyde declared, "but now is the time for action."

Funds for the study will come from accrued interest on the promotion funds, Clyde pointed out, and will not dilute the effectiveness of the promotion program. Clyde said this is the first time the sheep industry has had funds available for such an intensive study. Directors of the American Sheep Producers Council have authorized this study in an effort to align all segments of the sheep business "on target" for a successful sheep industry.

Almost every sheepman in the country contributes one cent per pound of wool and five cents for each one hundred pounds of unshorn lamb sold. This fund is used to promote lamb in 36 major market areas throughout the country, and to promote wool on a nationwide basis through promotion, advertising, and education.

## Fort Stockton Man Found Dead On Edwards Ranch

Pedro Salas, 59-years-old, was found dead about 200 yards south of the headquarters at the W. M. Edwards ranch about 30 miles north of Sanderson early Sunday morning.

A verdict of death by natural causes was rendered by Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath, who went to the ranch with Sheriff Bill C. Cocksey, Deputy Dalton Hogg, and Immigration Officer Bob Turner.

The story of events prior to the death were related by Walter Butz, who was spending the weekend at the ranch. Butz stated that Salas had saddled up his horse about 4:30 p.m. and ridden off. About dark, another of the ranch hands noticed his tardiness and reported it to Butz. A vigil was kept until just after dark when it was decided that search should be made for Salas.

Tracks were followed as best possible in the dark and by the use of flashlights and the horse was found in the pasture just north of the house, indicating the general vicinity of the man.

Frank Hinds, who neighbors the Edwards ranch, and one of his hands came over to help in the search and the body was found about 2:00 a.m. Sunday approximately 200 yards south of the house, and 10 feet from the east fence of that pasture.

The position of the body indicated that Salas had gotten off his horse, sat down by a cedar bush and then fallen back dead. There was no indication of having been thrown from the horse, or of foul play.

The body was taken to a Fort Stockton funeral home and held for burial.

His wife resides in Fort Stockton.

Salas was a veteran of World War II, having served in the Air Corps. He had worked for Mr. Hinds and other ranchmen of this area and had been working on the Edwards ranch for about 45 days, according to Mr. Butz.
