Eagles Win Ozona Basketball Tourney

The Sanderson Eagles won the Ozona invitational basketball tournament, much to the surprise of many West Texas coaches and sports writers, according to information received. Sanderson met Sterling City in their first game and copped a close 44-43 win after holding a lead at the end of each period. Larry Harrell scored 4; Alberto Escamilla, 9; Dee Gray 7; Buddie Joe Hahn 9; Jimmie Jones 9; Bill Stavley 6.

Sanderson led 17-9; 29-21; 37-35 at the end of the first three periods.

In their second game, the

Eagles took a game from Eldorado by 48-42. The score by periods was 15-6; 27-11; 38-31 and 48-42. Harrell looped 9; Escamilla, 11; Gray, 29; Hahn, 4; Jones, 0; Stavley, 2.

In the semi-finals Sanderson met Ozona and won 44-34, leading 6-9; 23-21; 39-29 in the first three periods.

Scoring was as follows: Harrell 10; Escamilla 17; Gray, 7; Hahn, 9; Jones 0; Stavley, 6.

In the finals, against Big Lake, Sanderson had the lead at the end of the first two periods \$4-18-14. Big Lake came back strong in the third frame and led 31-30, but Sanderson took the

lead early in the fourth quarter and went on to the 48-40 victory.

Dee Gray and Larry Harrell made the all-tournament team.

According to the scribes and other witnesses, Sanderson's control of the backboard was the contributing factor in their wins over their opponents, and their consistent defensive play.

In total scoring in the tournament, Gray led with 49, followed by Escamilla, 46; Harrell, 25; Hahn, 28; Stavley, 17; and Jones, 9.

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Enthusiasm High Locally For Eradication Project

The enthusiasm was thought to be high locally in favor of the screwworm eradication program planned by the ranchmen of the state. The observation was made at the reception given thoughts and plans at the meeting of the ranchmen of the county Thursday last week at the court house.

Herbert Brown was coordinator for the meeting and called the meeting to order to introduce T. A. Kincaid of Fort Stockton. Mr. Kincaid explained the film that he was to show and gave the background of the fly control efforts of other stockmen in the United States.

The equipment to be used in the program and the kinds of flies to be dealt with were also discussed.

After the showing of the film, Kincaid introduced Jerry Puckett, also of Fort Stockton, who made the final statements and stressed the importance of future meetings of that kind.

In the business meeting which followed, the Sanderson State

Bank and Troy W. Druse were named as depositor and treasurer for the funds paid toward the project by the ranchmen and assessments of 50¢ per cow and 10¢ each for sheep and goats were set to be paid by the ranchmen.

Thurmond Asks Re-Election As State Representative

Roger H. Thurmond Jr. has authorized The Sanderson Times to announce that he will be a candidate for re-election to the office of State Representative for the 71st Legislative District. He is at present serving his second term in that office and is in Austin attending the special session of the Legislature. The 71st District, formerly the 190th, is composed of Kinney, Maverick, Terrell, and Val Verde Counties.

Mr. Thurmond was first elected to the Legislature in 1958 and was re-elected in 1960. During his term of office he has served on the following committees: labor, judicial districts, livestock and stock raising, counties, constitutional amendments, examination of Comptroller and Treasurer's accounts, aeronautics, liquor regulations, and state hospitals and special schools. Among the measures he has supported are farm-to-market road financing, regulation of the small loan industry, livestock sanitation and disease control, water legislation, and improvement in the quality and standards of our public school system.

In his announcement Mr. Thurmond stated, "Population shifts from the rural areas of the state to the larger cities and Constitutional provisions regarding redistricting required the rural areas to lose some of their house seats. For this reason it is extremely necessary that those members of the Legislature who represent rural areas have as much experience in Legislative affairs as possible."

In conclusion Mr. Thurmond stated that it is his hope that before the Democratic Primary on May 5th he would have the opportunity to discuss Legislative matters with all interested persons in the district.

Mr. Kerr was born in County Donegal, Ireland, March 31, 1879. His parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. James Kerr Sr., brought him to Campbellton when he was one year old and he was reared and educated there. He attended San Antonio Business College and St. Louis College, now known as St. Mary's University, in San Antonio.

He came to Sanderson in 1907 to visit his brother, the late Joe Kerr Sr., and remained to work for him in the general merchandise store, buying a half interest in 1913 in the business which became known as The Kerr Mercantile Co. He served as manager and vice-president of the firm from 1915 until the death of Joe Kerr Sr. in 1939 when he became manager and president, the place he held until his retirement in

1946.

He was a charter member of the Sanderson Rotary Club, an honorary life member (retired) of the Knights of Columbus, San Antonio Council No. 786, and a member of the Selective Service Board of Terrell County during World War II.

A director of the Sanderson State Bank for over 40 years, Mr. Kerr became vice-president in 1939 and then served as president for six years from June 13, 1948, until his retirement in 1954.

He was married to Miss Josephine Tarrillion of San Antonio in 1915. One son, Robert James Kerr, died several years ago.

Besides his widow, he is also survived by a son, Bernard Kerr, and two grandchildren, John and Anne Kerr, of San Antonio and a sister, Mrs. Rosa DeWees, of Floresville.

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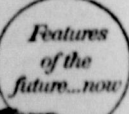

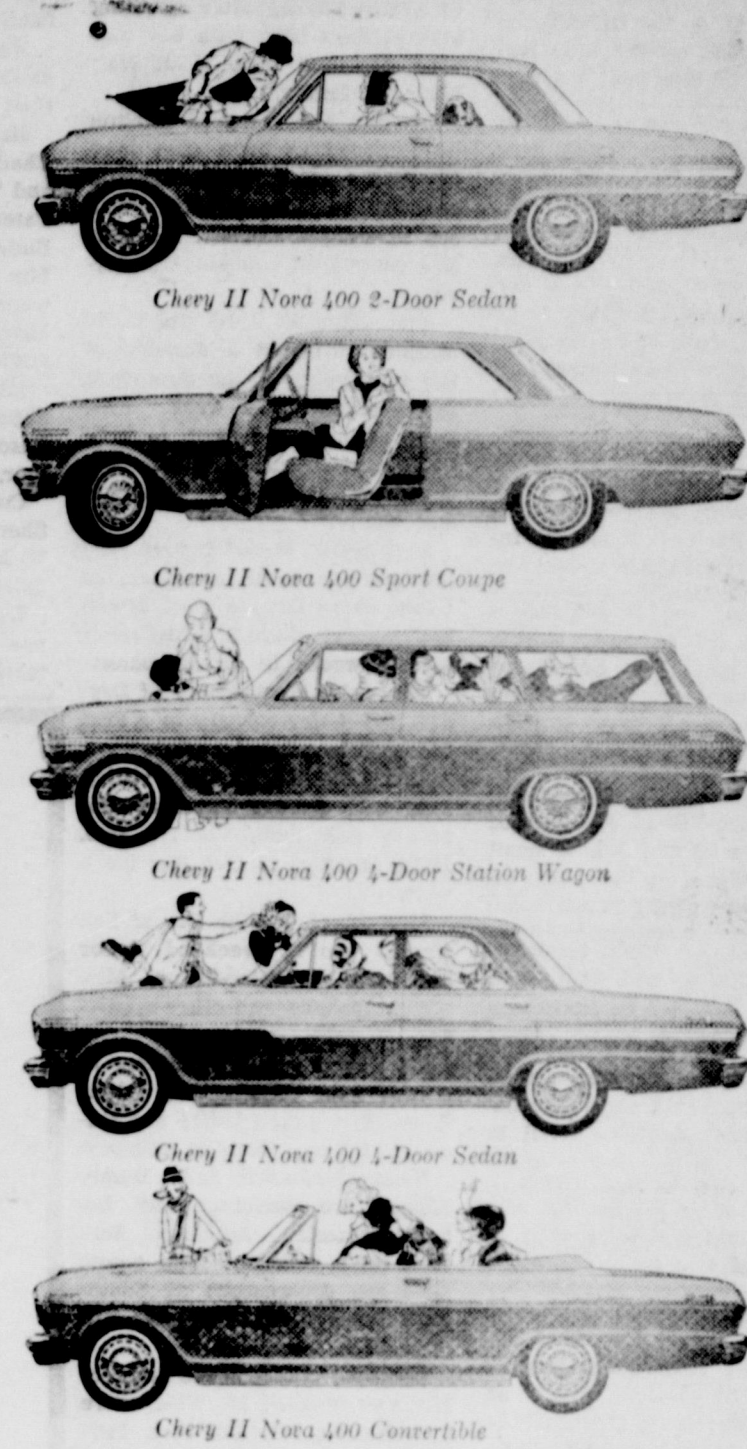

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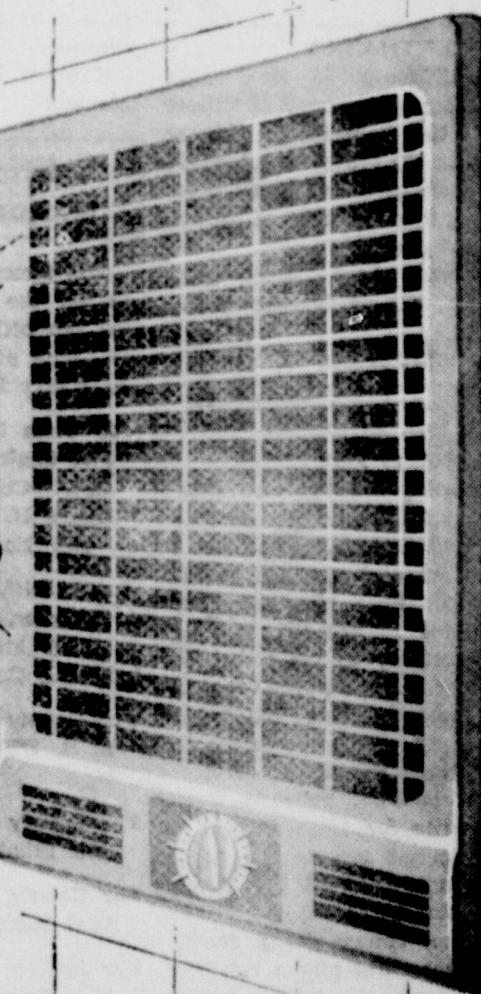
