About 1,000 Voters Eligible for Polling

Terrell County will have the usual voting strength of about 1,000 for elections to be held this year.

Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax assessor and collector, reported 777 poll taxes paid by the deadline of February 1. Fifteen exemptions were issued to young people becoming 21 years of age. Exemptions for those over 60 years of age are not necessary to voters in this county since it has a population under 10,500.

The first election scheduled is for the election of two members of the local school board of trustees and also two county trustees. All will be for a three-year term under the new law.

The election will be on Saturday, April 7.

The Sanderson Roadrunners lost a pair of cage games to the McCamey girls here Tuesday night. Both were non-conference games.

In the B team game, Sanderson was behind all during the game, but a last-quarter rally put them within eight points of the opponents at one time. The score ended 32-22.

Fly Control Is Almost Assured For Coming Season

According to information received from state-wide fly control project spokesmen, there is a good chance that fly control will be effective in 1962.

A large quantity of special sterile fly production equipment which was used successfully in eliminating the screwworm in the Southeast will be moved to Texas this week by the United States Department of Agriculture, according to Doyle Conner, Florida Commissioner of Agriculture.

Screwworms are believed to have been frozen out in Texas, and possibly for some distance into Mexico and it is thought that early eradication efforts in this area stand a good chance of making the eradication project effective this year.

Locally, the Terrell County Fly Control Committee mailed off \$12,000 as a portion of their share of the project and other collections are expected to wind up the solicitation of voluntary funds this week.

N. M. Mitchell, chairman of the project, stated that about 90 per cent of the total amount of money that could possibly be collected has been received and he considered this a better-than-average percentage and also a good showing of the cooperation of the ranchmen of this county toward a mutually beneficial goal.

Mr. Mitchell asked The Times to express his appreciation to those who worked so diligently in the collection of the voluntary contributions, and also to those who are participating in the project by their contributions.

The screwworm eradication program is literally one of self-extirmination. It is based on the fact that the female fly mates only once. The native population is overwhelmed by systematic release of screwworm flies which have been sterilized by irradiation.

The Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation is the parent organization for the screwworm eradication project and it is attempting to raise three million dollars through voluntary contributions. It is a non-profit organization governed by a board of trustees who serve without pay and is headed by C. G. Scruggs of Dallas.

The trustees of the organization have emphasized that every penny collected would be used solely to bring about a screwworm eradication program in the Southwest.

Frank L. Cochrane, Retired Engineer, Dies In El Paso

Races Set In Local Politics

The filing deadline Monday night for a place on the ballot in the Democratic Primary, has revealed the following candidates for the offices listed, according to W. W. Sudduth, local Democratic county chairman.

On the local level, three offices have no opposition: county treasurer, commissioner of precinct 2, and precinct Democratic chairman.

No announcements were received for Democratic precinct chairmen from precincts 2, 3, and 4 and it will be necessary for that office to be filled by a write-in vote in the Democratic primary.

Some last-minute decisions altered the standings, as there was one withdrawal, Monte Goode, as candidate for commissioner of precinct 4, and the entry of Cy Banner in that same race against the incumbent, Charlie Turk, who has also announced for reelection.

Sudduth did not seek reelection as county Democratic chairman and Troy Druse, who filed for the post last week, is opposed by Carlos Dunn.

Mrs. H. E. Ezelle is unopposed for precinct 1 Demo chairman.

For county judge, R. S. Wilkinson, the incumbent, is being opposed by H. E. Ezelle, a T&NO conductor.

Mrs. Sam Harrell is unopposed in her race for her first full elective term as county treasurer.

County Clerk Ruel Adams is opposed by Mrs. Ruby Duncan, local florist.

Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, who is running for a two-year term, is opposed by L. A. McBee, local television and radio, and shoe repairman.

J. A. Gilbreath, who is seeking reelection as Justice of Peace, Precinct 1, is being opposed by Pat G. Harris, Jr., auto body repairman.

John Harrison, commissioner of precinct 2, is unopposed.

On a district basis, opposition is noted in the race for legislator of the 71st Texas District. Roger Thurmond Jr. of Del Rio, is being opposed in his efforts for reelection by G. W. (Curley) Kyle, a T&NO employee, also of Del Rio.

In the race for U.S. Representative of the 16th Congressional District are: J. T. Rutherford, incumbent, Dr. W. D. Kelley, Midland; Tom Diamond, El Paso; Robert Frias, Odessa, all on the Democratic ticket, and Ed Foreman on the Republican ticket.

State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo, is being opposed by W. A. (Bill) Stroman also of San Angelo, in the race for senator of the 25th District of Texas.

Other officials for State offices are discussed thoroughly in the daily papers of the area.

Austin — A hectic final night ended the special session of the Texas Legislature. Two major problems — loan regulation and appropriations — were left unfinished.

Senate killed the loan regulatory bill by a two-vote margin, after the House had approved it by 18 votes. It was described by experts as the strongest loan regulatory law in the nation.

Death came to the appropriations bill in the House. It would have provided money to advertise for tourists, repair San Jacinto Monument, repair damage done to state properties by Hurricane Carla and by fires, pay Senate employees, and finance a number of other items.

Gov. Price Daniel called it a very productive session, nevertheless.

He said it had settled two long-standing issues — bank check reporting and farm-to-market policy.

Daniel was disappointed about the failure of loan legislation, tourist advertising and San Jacinto Monument repairs. But he said that he would not call this Legislature back into session in the foreseeable future.

Lawmakers headed for home to file for re-election and begin their campaigns for the same or other offices.

This session set some sort of record for fast action on bills to solve local problems. These rang-

ed from closing the season on alligators in Orange County, to a score of bills creating new water districts (to undertake drainage, hurricane protection or water supply projects).

Daniel was pleased at the bill changing the name of the State Board of Water Engineers to the Texas Water Commission, and reworking it into an image of the State Highway Commission. The chief engineer takes over full administrative control, leaving policy matters in the hands of the three-member commission.

Governor Daniel studied a floor of mail, telegrams, phone calls, which he had elicited, and decided that there was a definite demand for him to try to become Texas' first four-term governor. Who Should Censor?

Question of school book censorship was buffeted about by 22 witnesses, when the House Textbook Investigating Committee held its fourth weekly public hearing.

Some 200 persons attended the hearing.

Frank Wardlaw, director of the University of Texas Press, said, "There are no men wise enough to serve as censors." He stated that he would prefer that his children's textbooks be censored by authoritative professors, rather than by unqualified individuals.

Auhtor J. Frank Dobie said "the more textbooks are censored, the weaker they become."

The opinion that regulation of teaching materials by elected trustees has worked satisfactorily was expressed by former Baylor University trustee Joseph M. Dawson.

Other witnesses criticized the Board of Education's formula for censorship. They said they firmly believe that modern textbooks fail to instill a sense of patriotism and love of country.






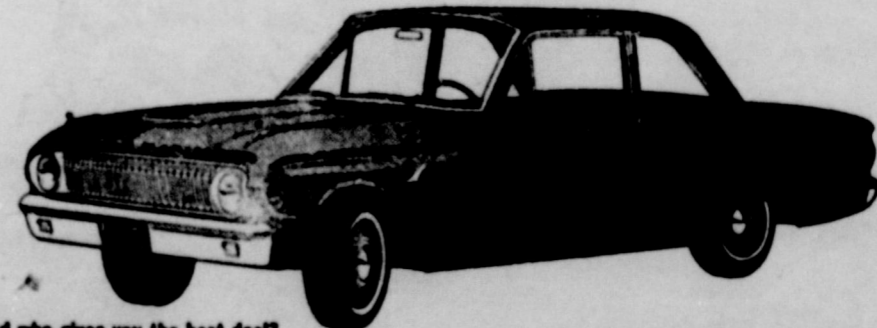
