LISTEN TO LUKE

As was predicted, there is to be some opposition in the race for trustee of the Terrell County Independent School District.

Three have announced for the race in which only two will be elected to serve, with the two receiving the most votes getting the job.

There is lots to be said for any candidate for such a post. He is asking for a thankless job with no remuneration in money and little in appreciation of the public. The job calls for meetings at odd times and under times of normalcy and stress and the member is expected to lay all prejudice and personal feeling aside under all circumstances and express his vote for the good of the district at all times, with malice toward none.

We don't know of any personal axes any of the candidates have to grind. There has been no public statement of intentions and desires of any of the candidates, one of whom is seeking re-election.

The deadline for filing is March 7.

The election of two candidates for that post will be on April 7 at which time voters in precinct 1 and 3 will name a precinct member of the county school board and all precincts will vote on a county school board member-at-large.

All eligible voters will be able to vote in the trustee election.

We have heard of some unusual statements being passed around locally by some supporters of some of the local candidates, and it is always aggravating that such things will be told and even more exasperating that they will be believed.

Regardless of the tale, whether or not you are asked to believe it, the truth can be ascertained relatively easily, particularly if it is a matter of record at the courthouse.

Let's not get off on a wild lie-telling tangent and stretch the truth too far, because it is too easy to prove conclusively the truth or falsity of so many statements.

Then, too, personalities have no business in the issues, because all of the candidates have lived here a long time and they are well-known for what they are and what they stand for. We feel sure that none of them are trying to change their ways now for the sake of votes, and if they did, few people would believe they were sincere in it or could do it so quickly, or that it might last.

Many months ago, before any of the candidates, encumbers or opponents, got into the race, they were well-known for what they stand for, by their actions. Those are the same ones who are in the race now.

We were interested in recent "exposés" of extreme right-wingers and explanations about them. We heartily agree.

Wells Assured In Brown-Bassett Area of County

Ellenburger production was extended 3-4-mile south and slightly west in the Brown-Bassett multipay field of Terrell County with the completion of Austrel Oil Co. Inc. No. 1 Brown-Bassett.

It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 29-million cubic feet of gas per day from open hole between 14,222-859 feet.

Location is 2,150 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of section 226, Block Y of the TC RR Survey.

Lyda Hunt-Herbert Trusts Dallas, No. 1 Annie Spencer, in section 16, Block 1, TCRR Survey, 3-4-mile east and one mile northwest to Ellenburger production in the northwest portion of the Brown-Bassett field, has been shut in after making tests of the Devonian through perforations between 12,145-75 feet.

Tested 12 hours, on a choke of unreported size, it flowed gas at the maximum daily rate of 1.1-million cubic feet, decreasing to 900,000 cubic feet at the end of the test. Then tested for an unreported time on a 1-2-inch choke, it flowed at the daily rate of 3.3 million cubic feet, decreasing to 200,000 cubic feet daily.

Earlier it tested the Ellenburger in open hole between 13,836-14,695 feet, making gas at the daily rate of 13.5 million cubic feet daily, however, flow declined and operator decided to test the Devonian section.

Gas production from Strawn formation has been indicated at Roden Oil Co., Midland, No. 1 Frank Rashap Jr., section 3, in Block 176, TM Survey, a Terrell County wildcat 10 1/2 miles southwest of Sheffield and 10 miles north-northeast of the Brown-Bassett multipay gas area and 4 1/2 miles northeast of the operator's dual Atoka and Fusselman gas discovery of the North Brown-Bassett area.

The wildcat topped the Strawn at 10,230 feet, minus datum point of 7,745 feet, and was drilled to 10,370 feet, where a gas flow, estimated at 4,000,000 to 5,000,000 cubic feet daily developed. Deepening continued below 10,680 feet on a 16,000-foot Ellenburger contract.

650 Scholastics In Terrell County

A total of 650 children eligible to attend school in Terrell County this fall were listed on the scholastic census which was completed the last of January. Clyde Griffith was the enumerator.

Supt. Matt Bader in releasing the final count this week, noted a decrease of 33 students since last year. Fifty-eight pre-school children were enumerated in the group that included those children who will have attained the age of six before September 1 and who will not have become 18 before that date.

By age groups further figures show 54 7-year-olds; 64 8-year-olds; 51 who are 9; 70 10 years old; 50 11 years; 64 12 years; 51 who are 13; 68 14 years old; 46 who are 15; 47 16 year-olds; and 27 who are 17.

Screwworm Vials Ready for Reports

Vials and mailing containers have been delivered to the Sanderson Wool Commission Co and to the Terrell County ASCS office to aid area ranchmen in reporting suspected screwworm cases, according to N. M. Mitchell, county chairman of the county fly control committee.

Ranchmen are asked to collect 10 worms from any suspected case and mail them in a vial to the address furnished with the mailing container.

There is no charge for the vial or mailing container.

If the screwworms are brought to town to be placed in the vial, ranchmen are asked to put them in a bottle full of water or alcohol to bring them in.

It was stated that there was not a sufficient number of vials and mailing tubes available to give each ranchman a supply, but if they will bring the screwworms in or go by and pick up a vial as they need it, an effort will be made to stay ahead of the need for additional vials.

Mr. Mitchell pointed out that his was a vital part in the new screwworm eradication program which began in Texas last week with aerial distribution of laboratory-sterilized screwworm flies. USDA plans spot treatment of areas in which any screwworm infestation is confirmed. Laboratory-raised flies will be released by air over any such outbreak areas to overwhelm the native flies and snuff out a spread of screwworms.

Stockmen are asked to mail in specimens, because common maggots are often mistaken for screwworms. The methods used now against screwworms will have no effect on maggots and any aerial fly release over an area which had only a maggot infestation would be wasted.

Each livestock producer who submits a specimen will receive a report on the analysis.

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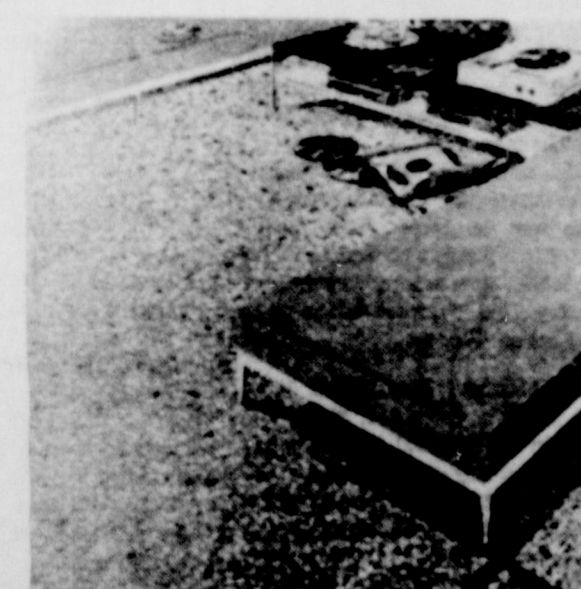

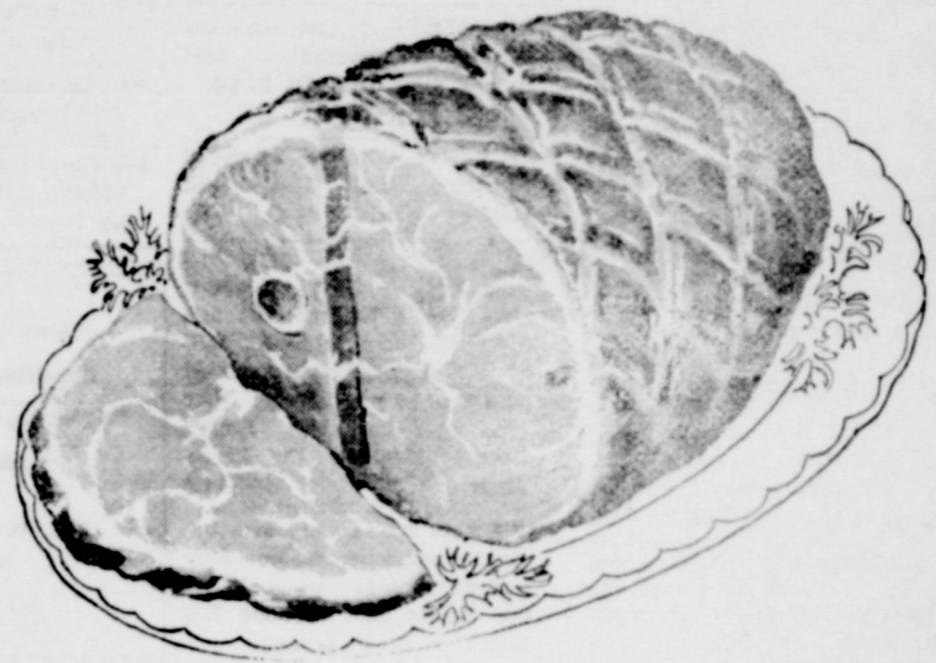
