LISTEN TO LUKE

It's only two more weeks until the election of two school board members who will serve in that capacity for three years.

There has been some politicking by some of the candidates, and very little, if any, by some of the others, as far as we know.

Politicking for such a job entails some difficulties that are not common with politicking for a lot of other jobs in that if a person makes a lot of promises he is overstepping his bounds — or is likely to — since there will be six other men on the board, each of whom will have an equal say-so in everything that comes before the group. And it might be that he is not persuasive enough to put over all of his ideas and proposals.

It would seem to us that the best criteria for a knowledgeable vote would be to know the type of thinking of the candidates, their philosophy, their outlook how each conducts his personal affairs, etc., rather than whether or not he sleeps in pajamas, and whether or not they are long-legged, or short, or how he parts his hair, or whether or not he walks with a limp, or a drag.

The operation of the school is one of the largest operations in Terrell County, and there is a lot of responsibility and a lot of obligation on the part of each member if he is to do a good job in the administration of the local school.

We are learning more and more every year that there is a lot of running in running a school. There has not been the increase proportionately in the number of scholastics as there has been an increase in the overall operating expenses of the school. We are not saying this in condemnation, but we are using this fact to note the necessity of discretion in the selection of a school board member.

The cost of everything has increased, so has the school tax income, so has our grocery bill, and everything else.

It is getting to be a responsibility that cannot be treated with indifference, in our opinion, in the operation of all facets of our government.

There are those who are in favor of raising taxes for the sake of raising — so that we will have enough money to buy some things we don't have now.

We think that this is not a very sound attitude. We would disagree with such tactics all day.

We will also disagree with the idea of buying something because some of our neighbors have something and we don't.

Neither can we go along with the idea of spending ourselves into prosperity or prominence.

C. G. Bradford, Former School Head, Honored In Abilene

Carlos C. Bradford of Abilene has recently been named Teacher of the Year for the senior high level in that city. The award came at a Teacher Appreciation banquet.

He teaches four advanced math classes, trigonometry, analytical geometry and advanced algebra, daily. The students in these classes are, for the most part, seniors since all must have completed their math courses and, showing themselves to be talented in math, have been recommended for advanced work. He encourages his students to call or come by his house if they need help.

In the mornings at eight o'clock he is on hand to teach a special class in slide rule to volunteer students — a non-credit course.

On Sundays he teaches an adult Sunday School class at the First Christian Church. He has also done work with the Boy Scouts for fifteen years. He is a business advisor to the Flashlight, A. H. S. yearbook, and a member of teacher organizations. Mr. Bradford, before going to Abilene, was the superintendent of the Terrell County Schools. He has taught school for about 30 years, 12 of them in Abilene High School.

Four Youths Are Charged With Theft of Auto

Four boys, ranging in age from 15 to 17, from DeSoto, Texas, were arrested in Sierra Blanca Sunday and returned to Sanderson and charged with the theft of an automobile belonging to Pablo Galvan. The boys each waived the examining trial and bond was set at \$1,000 each by Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath.

The boys abandoned an old convertible about four miles west of Sanderson Saturday and were seen walking back to town that day. The Galvan car was stolen Saturday night, according to local officers, and the apprehension was in Sierra Blanca Sunday morning.

It was reported that local railroad employees saw the boys in the car in Valentine and recognized it as a local car.

The youths were allowed to notify relatives of their whereabouts and are being held in the local jail in lieu of their bond.

Two of the youths who are juveniles, will have their cases heard by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, the juvenile officer.

Two Charged With Burglarizing Box Car

Two Negro transients were arraigned before Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath this week and charged with burglarizing a box car in the local rail yards. Both defendants waived the examining trial and bond was set at \$1,000 for each.

Earlier, three transients were charged with being drunk in a public place and pleaded guilty to the charge and received a fine of \$1 and costs in the JP court.

All five men were apprehended last weekend by local officers and special agents for the railroad.

The charges grew out of the theft of two cases of wine from a box car, after the seal on the door of the car had been broken and the car entered.

Rutherford Asks Re-Election To U.S. House Post

Congressman J. T. Rutherford has made his official announcement for re-election as U.S. Representative from Texas' 16th Congressional District.

Rutherford's depth of legislative experience includes four years as state representative and two as state senator. Now serving his fourth term in Congress, Rutherford is known for his fidelity to official duty. He has compiled a near-perfect voting attendance record during his Congressional tenure.

The Congressman introduced a new feature into public service several years ago by equipping a house trailer as a mobile office and taking the Congressional office to all points within his 13-county district.

The long-time West Texan, a Democrat, serves on two important Committees in the Congress. He is a member of the House Armed Services Committee and the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee. Rutherford is chairman of the House National Parks Subcommittee, and is serving his second term on the joint United States-Mexico Inter-parliamentary Conference. He is vice-chairman of the House delegation to that Conference.

"I will have a very limited time to campaign in West Texas due to my Congressional duties here," Congressman Rutherford said in his official announcement. "My personal desire is to return home and enter into the campaign. But I feel that I cannot abandon my post while Congress is in session. To do so would deprive West Texas of its voice and vote at a time when critical issues are daily before Congress. Any campaigning that I am able to do will not be done at the expense of my official duties."

"I will leave the election-year campaign promises of questionable validity and the irresponsible charges to others in this campaign. I shall continue to be a working, active Congressman and that is the pledge I make to the people.

"Man can aspire to few callings higher than serving his fellow man. I want to continue to serve my fellow West Texans the 16th District and our nation I will appreciate the active support of all persons who share my desire for sound, constructive, and responsible government."

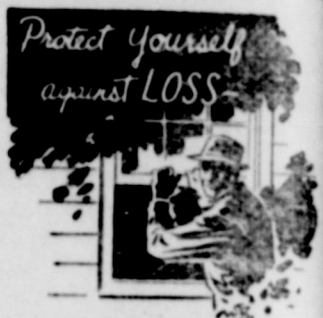

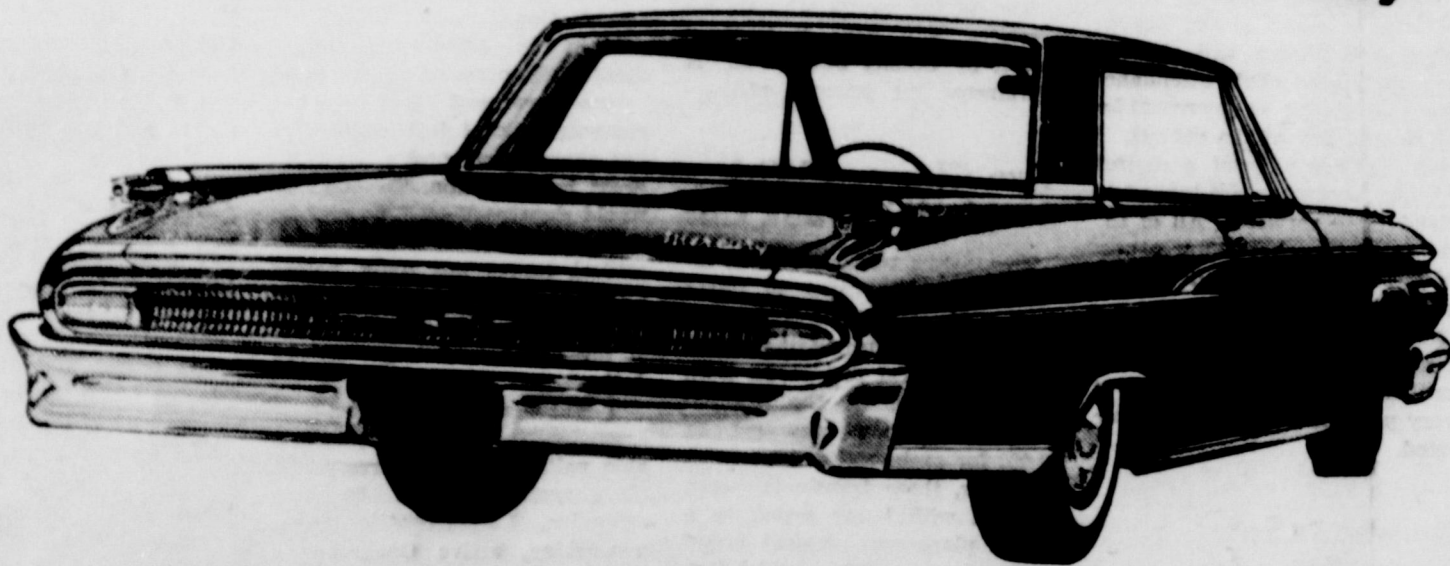

Avocados for Elegant Eating



Potato salad, all-American favorite, goes elegant in "Sumptuous Salad." Cubed potatoes, diced red apple, luscious avocado halves and sour cream dressing make hearty, "he-man" eating.
Avocados are usually very firm when they come to market. Because they can be used so many ways, it's wise to buy several at a time and keep at room temperature until eating-ripe. Smooth-skinned varieties of California avocados are ready to eat when they yield to gentle pressure in the palms of your hands. To test dark, pebbly-skinned varieties, insert toothpick at stem end; if it slides in easily, the avocado's ready to serve. Cut lengthwise completely around, twist halves apart gently, whack seed sharply with knife blade, twist and lift out, then strip off skin.

SUMPTUOUS SALAD
2 avocados
Lemon juice
1 large red apple, diced
1 cup cooked cubed potatoes
1 cup dairy sour cream
1 tablespoon white vinegar
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon grated onion
Cut avocados lengthwise into halves; remove seed. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Toss apple and potatoes. Blend remaining ingredients. Place avocado halves on lettuce-lined plates. Spoon on apple-potato mixture. Top with cream dressing. Serves 4.

It is a brilliant man, indeed

who is able to say when and at what point the perfect situation exists, and who is able to say, without any doubt, that this is positively, the happy medium.

We try to pay for what we are forced to buy, we try to have a few of the things we are not forced to buy, and we try to enjoy everything we have because of the fact that we are not depriving any of our neighbors of the same privileges.

We think that our local government should have pretty close to the same attitude.
