Wool Growers Told Responsibilities Of Incentive Payments

The 1961 wool program incentive payments, to be made this summer, will cover only wool and unshorn lambs which are marketed from April 1, 1961, through March 31, 1962. Keeping adequate records on sales is very important since these must support the information on payment applications.

Documents covering sales during the 1961 marketing year should be filed in the producers' ASCS office as soon as possible. Growers only have until April 30, 1962, to file documents, execute and sign applications for incentive payments.

Producers' sales records for shorn wool should show name and address of buyer, date of sale, name and address of producer, net weight of wool sold, and net proceeds to producer after applicable marketing deductions. Producers' sales records for unshorn lambs should show name and address of buyer, date of sale, name and address of seller, net weight of lambs sold and number of head sold. All documents must have an original signature of the buyer or buyers' agent.

About Half Of License Plates Not Yet Bought

About half of the license plates are yet to be sold to owners of vehicles in Terrell County, according to Mrs. Tol Murrach, office deputy of the tax assessor-collector Bill C. Cooksey.

Up to noon Tuesday there had been only 642 plates sold of about 1150 possible plates to be sold.

Local vehicle owners may buy the plates any day this week and not be subject to penalty.

Any plates bought after April 1 must be accompanied by an affidavit that the vehicle has not been used since April 1, otherwise a 20 per cent penalty, as provided by the statutes, must be collected.

It was also pointed out by the officials that a vehicle used after March 31 without valid 1962 license plates, will be in violation of the law.

High Prices For Wool At Sale Here

Prices were strong, firm and active at a sealed bid sale of wool at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co. here last Wednesday when 27 lots of wool, totaling less than 280,000 pounds, were offered and sold.

Prices ranged from a low of 33 cents per pound for about 15,000 pounds of fall wool to a high of 50 3/8 cents per pound for 14,000 pounds of the longer spring wool. General range of prices for the 8-months wool was 46 1/2 cents. Average price for 8-months wool was around 50c.

The 10-12-month fleeces sold in the 54 cents to 58 cents range and only three lots of this type of wool exceeded 58 7/8 cents per pound.

John T. Williams, manager of the local wool warehouse, stated that the sale was concluded in a little more than three hours and he said he was well pleased with the prices paid for the wool.

Only seven of 15 prospective buyers were successful bidders on the wool sold.

The major buyer was Stevens and Co., who bought a total of 70,941 pounds.

Prouvost-Lefebvre Co., Inc., was second - highest buyer with the purchase of 30,702 pounds of 10-12 months fleeces.

Nichols and Co. purchase 68,517 pounds.

Other buyers, all of whom got 8-month fleeces, were Colonial Wool Co., Dennis Corp., Forte Deupree, Sawyer Co., Lobsitz & Co.

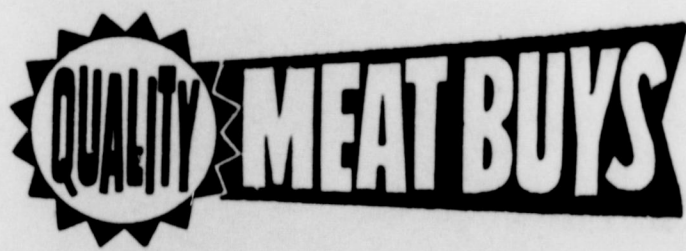
