LISTEN TO LUKE

Area ranchman have been here for some time of the need for rain and local gardeners are planning to realize almost to same extent that the need is great.

At sultry days and high winds have sapped the ground of the bit of moisture left from the rains of last fall. This occurred so ago that outside of the lawns and gardens in the county there is nothing but dust and no growth showing in weeds and bushes.

Many ranchmen say that their crops are as dry as it was during the height of the recent dry spell.

Local people who have any idea of a yard at all know what it is to have to struggle with the weeds and trying to keep things growing in hopes that it will rain.

Drive around the town to see some of these miracles is uplifting and encouraging to those who spend quite a bit of time in a little money in getting and planting grass and flowers, and shrubs and trees.

Representatives of the Texas Employment Commission were in Sanderson the first of the week to lay the ground work for efforts to find local employment for unemployed and also to area ranchmen in getting to employees.

They don't know what tactics to be used, but what they do know is the cooperation that can be given by the representatives in their efforts to clean up a looming unemployment-with-pay situation which could be given.

They think that if all unemployment compensation were cut off that a new start could be made by all concerned, it might lead out to the best interest of employer and the unemployed tax payer.

Another meeting of interest to area ranchmen will be held here in this meeting concerns the fishing deer season and is one of the most important meetings of this kind up to now. Future information will be released as it is available.

The Game and Fish Commission is also going to try to get cooperation of Trans-Pecos ranchmen in getting regulatory authority for fishing laws. This is being brought up at the deer hunting meeting or it may not be deemed important by the Commission to get such authority since most of the fishing in the Trans-Pecos is in international waters, or man-made lakes that has never been any cut laws governing all the uses of fishing set for this area. The regulatory authority would enable the acceptance of laws and regulations to deal with the problems peculiar to this section, many such problems now covered by any law.

This is due, it was explained, the fact that only in very recent years, has there been very much or any fishing west of the river.

Efforts To Be Made To Find Employment For Local Jobless

Joe Wolf, manager of the Texas Employment Commission office in Pecos, announced this week that a special recruitment drive is being conducted in the Sanderson area this week in an attempt to locate unemployed persons interested in farm or ranch jobs.

The results of this recruitment drive will be highlighted by a ranch labor day which will be at the court house in Sanderson between 8:00 a.m. and noon on May 22. On this day, persons interested in farm and ranch jobs will be assembled in the office.

Attendance by ranchers and workers at this meeting will permit a personal interview between the rancher and worker whose experience and skills most nearly match his needs without the usual loss of time in trying to contact each other.

It was pointed out by Mr. Wolf that there is no charge for this service and no obligation on the part of the rancher to hire anyone.

"There is complete freedom of choice on the part of both the farmer or rancher and the worker," stated Mr. Wolf.

Highway Litter Costs Taxpayers

Austin — Almost two million dollars — funds that could have built 72 miles of farm-to-market roads or 24 miles of two-lane primary highways — had to be spent by the Texas Highway Department to remove litter from the highways and repair vandalism damage last year.

Vandalism, according to the highway Department classification, covers such items as damaging and destroying signs and sign supports, marking on structures, and damaging safety rest areas (roadside parks). Litter includes beer cans, watermelon rinds, bottles, wrappers, newspapers, milk cartons, and cigarette packages.

At the present time, well-traveled federal and state highways are cleaned about three or four times a year, farm to market roads once a year.

Many concerned citizens and highway engineers feel that an education program and strict law enforcement of the anti-litter law are necessary to stop the litterbug.

Commissioners Lease School Land For \$50 Per Acre

At the regular meeting of the Terrell County Commissioners' Court here Monday a lease was granted to Paul L. Davis of Midland on the oil and gas minerals of the Terrell County School Land in Gaines County. Davis was the only bidder on the land and his bid was for \$50.01 per acre for the three tracts of land which included 1,189.5 acres.

The amount included in the rental and bonus was \$75,842.67, bringing to \$943,079.06 in the permanent school fund of Terrell County.

All of this amount, with the exception of the returns from the recent transaction, is invested in government and municipal bonds, according to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, who stated that about one-third of this amount was invested at four per cent interest rate.

The income to the permanent school fund from the Gaines County land from royalties and drilling was between \$4,000 and \$4,500 per month.

Only interest from investments of the permanent school fund may be used in the maintenance of the schools.

George R. Skay, T&NO Conductor, Dies In Del Rio

Stricken while walking toward his home in Del Rio, George Roland Skay, 63-year-old T&NO railroad conductor, died of a heart attack in a hospital in that city last Tuesday night.

He was on the west-bound passenger train to Sanderson and, rather than remain overnight here, had caught a ride back to Del Rio, planning to return to Sanderson to board the train returning east Wednesday night.

A native of New York, he was stationed at Del Rio during World War I. He was married to Miss Ella Walker of that city and they had made their home there.

He is also survived by a son, Roland Skay, of Everett, Washington.

Rattler Killed On Porch

Mr. and Mrs. Grady Wilson killed a rattlesnake on their front porch Tuesday evening late. The snake was about two feet long, Mrs. Wilson said.

Marion T. Powers Dies After Surgery In El Paso Hospital

Marion Tyson Powers, 28, died in an El Paso hospital Wednesday morning. His body arrived here by train Thursday night and funeral services will be Friday afternoon at 2:30 in the First Presbyterian Church. Rev. John W. Byrd, pastor, will officiate and burial will be in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

After having a heart defect practically all of his life as a result of rheumatic fever in childhood, Powers underwent heart surgery Tuesday. His family had accompanied him to El Paso for the operation.

He was born in Rankin February 13, 1934. He was graduated from the Sanderson High School in 1953.

On July 24, 1954, he was married to Jane Reinhardt of Walden, Colo. They had resided in Dryden where he was a T&NO telegrapher, also in Sanderson, and recently in Fort Stockton where he was a truck driver for the Sanitary Laundry Service.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church in Fort Stockton.

Besides his widow, he is survived by a son, Scott, and two daughters, Debbie and Colleen; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Powers of Dryden; a brother, J. H. Powers of Odessa; two sisters, Mrs. J. H. Mathers of Sanderson and Mrs. R. E. Walsh of Del Rio.

Bobby Sid Wood Injured In Wreck

Bobby Sid Wood received severe and serious injuries in an accident early Monday morning in the Lemons Gap area, some 40 miles west of Sanderson on U. S. Highway 90. Only the pick-up he was driving was involved in the accident, according to reports from investigating officers.

Wood, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sid Wood of Sanderson, was en route to Van Horn where he is employed, at the time of the accident.

The pick-up was totally demolished. Wood was taken to an Alpine hospital after the accident and later was moved to El Paso for examination and treatment by a bone specialist.

He is said to have received a broken leg, broken vertebrae in his neck, severe head injuries, and injury to the spinal cord.

Paralysis was present in his entire body with the exception of his right leg, according to reports, but the family was given hope of the possibility of his recovery from the paralysis.

Mr. and Mrs. Wood have been at the bedside of their son since the accident, also Mrs. Ben Causey who returned home Tuesday night.

Area Wool Brings Good Prices At Local Sale May 10

More than 335,000 pounds of spring wool were sold at a sealed bid sale last Thursday at the Sanderson Wool Commission Co.

Prices ranged from 47 1/4 to 59 1/2 cents per pound on the 12-month fleeces and from 51 1/2 to 56 5/8 cents on the 8-months wool.

Shearing is still going on in the county and John T. Williams, manager of the wool house, said that from 200,000 to 500,000 pounds of wool is expected within the next few days.

Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co. of Boston was the largest buyer in the sale. They purchased 78,416 pounds of 8-months wool and 51,228 pounds of the 12-months wool.

Other buyers were Prouvost-LeFebvre Co., Inc., of Boston and J. P. Stevens and Co., Boston.

Driver Education Course Planned For This Summer

Sanderson High School will not offer driver education in the fall and spring semesters, but will instead teach this course during the summer on a tuition basis of \$15.00 per student, according to Supt. Matt Bader, who last week sent letters to parents of high school pupils.

Reasons for the change in the instructional program, according to Mr. Bader, are: scheduling for ninth grade students will be much easier and students will have fewer conflicts with other desirable courses; the course can be completed in the summer in five weeks or less; the DE teacher will be able to teach two classes during the regular school term in place of the DE courses.

Classroom instruction will be three hours a day for the first two weeks and behind the wheel instruction will take approximately three weeks to complete. Each student is required to have six hours of instruction behind the wheel and six hours of driver observation. A student will not have to be present for every session of behind the wheel instruction, but only those when his time of driving and observation is scheduled.

Paul Hatem, newly-hired athletic director, will teach the course which will be open only to high school students.

Johnny Benevidez Receives Gunshot Wound In Stomach

Johnny Benevidez was taken to a Fort Stockton hospital Tuesday night for treatment of a gunshot wound in the abdomen, according to local officials. Johnny is a junior student in the Sanderson High School.

Investigating officers reported that a .22 calibre rifle had been fastened to two water pipes outside the house with a string tied to the trigger. The shooting occurred about 10:00 p.m.

Only one shot had been fired from the rifle and it struck Benevidez on the right side of the abdomen, according to the officers, and emerged on the right side of his back. He was found lying on the ground near the water pipes by members of the family who heard the shot fired.

Young Benevidez is the son of Mrs. Andrea Benevidez.

He is reported to be in satisfactory condition.

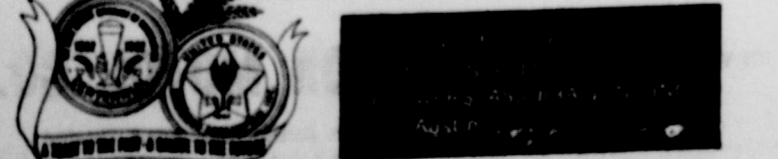

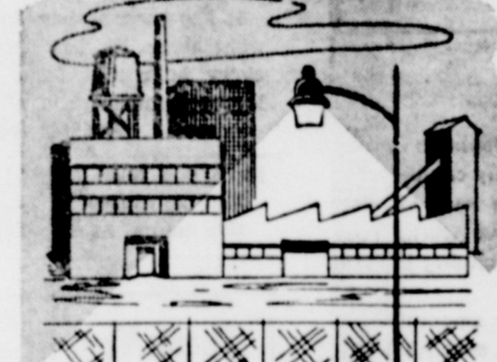

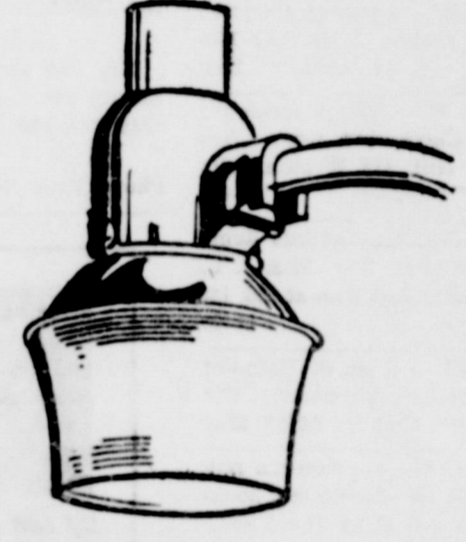

cepted a bid of \$50.01 per acre on Gaines County land oil and gas lease Monday. This makes about \$925,000.00 that land has earned since the county has owned it.

And the peculiar bit of it is according to the commissioners the land once sold for a paltry sum and was repossessed for non-payment. And the minerals were included in that sale.

There have been other notions of selling the minerals in later years, but the commissioners have held onto them for the benefit of future generations of school kids. The interest from investments of the money is all that can be used and that is mounting up as the revenue increases. Some of the money was used to buy local school bonds at a low interest rate, thus saving the school district that much in interest and finding a quick buyer for some bonds. Some of the money is drawing a nice four per cent interest.

Such actions and business dealings only go to prove the importance of the commissioners' court to the people of the county now and in the future.

A sound and businesslike operation of the county is an important factor that should be appreciated by the tax-payers of the county.

Change Benefits Older Workers Under Social Security

A 1961 change in the social security law has made thousands of older workers eligible for benefits, said H. P. Thomas, District Manager of the Odessa Social Security Office. This change, he said, reduces the amount of time a person needs to work to qualify for benefits. To illustrate, he pointed out that men reaching 65 or women reaching 62 in 1962 need only 2 3/4 years of work. Those who are older may need as little as 1 1/2 years of work under social security to qualify for payments.

This change in the law also affects those who have been turned down before because they did not have enough work to qualify at the time they applied. These workers should check with the social security office right away Thomas said.
