Last Saturday up to 2½ inches of rain fell north of Sanderson giving some relief to the Sid Harkins, Monty Corder, David Mitchell ranches, and other ranches in that general area received only that sprinkles.

Also reporting good rains last Sunday were Charlie Turk, Herbert Brown, Reg Monroe and the Banners, and up to 3-inches of rain was reported in some areas in the extreme eastern part of the county.

Monday night E. E. Harkins Jr., and other ranch country to the south of Sanderson got rain up to 1½ inches.

N. M. Mitchell and Mrs. E. H. Jessup got a good rain Monday night also, according to reports.

It was pointed out that the rains, while more general than anything of late, were still only spotted and in strips.

No results of the benefits of rains received within the week are yet visible, according to ranchmen who have received rain during the week and all say help did not come a bit too soon and would have been so much more beneficial had the rain come during the early part of the spring.

The rain Monday night left from one-quarter-inch to half-inch in local gauges, according to residents from all sections of town. The rain accompanied a brilliant electrical storm and its accompanying thunder.

Heavy thunderheads continued to build up Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday, bringing hopes for additional moisture.

Webster's body was taken to the Owen Funeral Home in Fort Stockton and transferred later to Maples Funeral Home in Kermit. Funeral services were held Tuesday from the First Methodist Church in Jal with burial in Kermit.

Texas Highway Patrolman Carl L. Davis investigated the accident and was assisted by Terrell County Sheriff's Department.

The investigation revealed, according to the officers, that the car was coming south and met the north-bound truck on a curve. The car was on the wrong side of the road when it hit the driver wheels of the truck-tractor and the impact threw the auto into and under the trailer of the truck. The car bounced back and into the embankment on the road and then straddled up to its original direction.

July Letting Hoped For Completion Of RM 2400 Road

Sid Harkins, County Commissioner of Precinct 3, announced at the meeting of the commissioners Monday that the right-of-way for the remainder of RM 2400, connecting U.S. 285 and State 1217, had been virtually assured and it was hoped that the contract for the work would be in the July letting, thus assuring completion of the road by next year.

Only stretches of highway right-of-way in state-owned land and one individual landowner remained to be acquired and the landowner had already given verbal consent to the deal, according to Harkins. There is no question of the availability of the state land for the road, Harkins added.

The acquisition of the remainder of the right-of-way and the letting of the contract will assure the culmination of a 20-year-old project of Mr. Harkins and of others in having a paved road to connect the highways between Sanderson and Fort Stockton and Dryden and Sheffield. This route will furnish all-weather travel for the ranchmen living in the north central and northeastern part of the county to and from Sanderson and other marketing places. It will also furnish a shorter and better paved route for taking livestock to market or central shipping centers, thus affording a savings to ranchmen.

Residents of this area who customarily travel to the northern part or northeastern part of Texas will have a shorter route between Sanderson and Sheffield.

The road, when completed will roughly follow the present route with the exception of going up the hill on the northeast end of the project. The new road will be further north of the present junction and will leave the present road site west of the present junction to go up the hill for a new junction.

County Rejects Plea For Grid Field Land

Terrell County Commissioners Monday morning rejected a plea for the land which contains the Sanderson High School football field. Representing the school in making the plea for the land were High School Principal A. J. Riess, and school board members F. M. Wood Jr., Jack Turner, and Dudley Harrison.

The plea for the land was made on the basis of the possibility of future needs or desirabilities of the school board concerning the construction possibly of a field house or other large installation. The need for quick relief for shower facilities for boys during football season was pointed out as one of the reasons for their request of the county commissioners.

The commissioners rejected the proposal on the basis of the fact that the bowl containing the football field was built as a flood-control measure for the town and that the football field and all related installations was an afterthought and was permitted be-

cause of the need for a field and the fact that such installations would not interfere with the original purpose of the bowl's construction. They stated that they felt that some future board or school administration possibly would desire to make some changes at the field which would ruin the intent of the construction of the bowl and would break the trust of the people whose money was spent in the purchase of the land and the cost of the construction of the dams.

It was brought out that the school, civic clubs, and individuals had all worked diligently in making the field what it is today and that the Commissioners' Court felt that it was and should continue to be a community project under the direction and responsibility of the Court. The Court added that they had always cooperated with the school in any proposals concerning the use of the ground and that the school had used a portion of the ground previously as a feed lot for some FFA lambs, and that they saw no reason why the school could not continue to use the ground for such projects for all time to come so long as no effort was made to destroy the flood-preventive measures which had been built on the ground.

They added that ownership of the land by the county had offered no handicap in the improvements to date and could see no reason why any future improvements could not be worked out to the agreement of all concerned.

The school board members indicated that rejection of such a plea by the Commissioners might bring about the necessity of moving the field to another location, thus making necessary the passage of a bond issue and the expense of a completely new installation so that the school could have ownership of the land and could thus make any improvements they deemed necessary without the consent of the county officials.

The Commissioners stated that they were willing to work out any reasonable and feasible plan to permit and make possible the construction of any facility that the school or the public wanted on the site, but they felt that the Commissioners Court should retain the ownership and responsibility of seeing that the present installation of dams which forms the setting for the football field forever remain as a flood preventive measure.
