Power Line Is Being Built Up Mountain

Community Public Service Co employees are in the process of building a power line up the mountain to the south of Sanderson. The line will carry power to a micro-wave transmitting and receiving tower.

The micro-wave is used to transmit messages between the local station and trains and between trains.

The Department of Public Safety also plans to use the facility for the erection of a transmitting and receiving station for FM radio.

The tower is expected to give radio contact between local law enforcement officials and other officers of this area, plus contact with the central unit at Pecos for the Department of Public Safety.

Some Dependents Eligible For Social Security Payments

A disabled worker may qualify for monthly benefits for himself and his dependents if he has worked long enough under social security (at least 5 years out of 10 years in which his disability began) and is so severely disabled that he is unable, in the words of the law "to engage in any substantial gainful activity."

An important aspect of the disability program is that all applicants who apply for social security disability insurance benefits are also considered for vocational rehabilitation services. Any disabled person should contact his local social security office to inquire about his rights. This is particularly important for people who have long-standing severe disabilities. Such individuals may lose some monthly benefits if they do not file before the end of this month.

Another important phase of the social security disability program is the availability of child-dependent disability benefits for the adult disabled children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers if the adult disabled child's disabling condition occurred prior to age 18.

Supt. Matt Bader Resigns Post Here, Effective July 15



Superintendent Matt F. Bader announced his resignation as head of the Terrell County Independent School District at a special meeting of the school board last Friday night. The resignation was accepted, effective July 15.

Bader has been superintendent of the county's school system for the past 12 years. He came here from LaCoste where he had served in a similar capacity for 13 years. He had been a teacher in Devine for four years prior to that time.

Mr. Bader has accepted a position as superintendent of Medina Valley Independent School District near San Antonio. Although he had another year left on his contract, he stated that wanted to be near a large city.

A successor to Bader has not been named. Herbert Brown, president of the Terrell County Independent School District Board of Trustees, announced that the board would receive applications for the superintendent's post until July 14.

Incentive Checks On Wool Mailed

The Terrell County ASCS office mailed checks the first of the week to area ranchmen eligible for payment either of shorn wool or unshorn lambs.

There were 112 applicants who received a total of \$303,099.53 for shorn wool after deductions at the rate of 1c per pound were made. The deductions, which go to pay for wool promotion, were \$15,026.14.

Seventy-four applicants for incentive payments on unshorn lambs totaled \$34,481.69 after deductions of 5c per cwt for promotion in the amount of \$2,428.28.

The wool producers received \$44.50 for each \$100.00 worth of wool sold during the 1961 marketing year, April 1, 1961, through March 31, 1962.

In addition the producers received 76c per 100 pounds live-weight on unshorn lambs sold during the same period.

The incentive level, under the National Wool Act, is 62 cents per grease pound. This level has remained stationary since the wool act was passed.

The grower who receives 60c a pound for his wool during the marketing year, will receive 44.5 per cent of that price as incentive payment.

The incentive payment for 1960 was 46.7 per cent on grease wool and 80c per hundredweight on unshorn lambs.

Spotted Rains Hit County

Spotted rains and heavy clouds have continued to tease the area during past weeks.

Various ranchmen of the county have reported up to 50-inch of moisture in some places, and also report the rains that fell were very spotted and scattered. General rainfall over the entire area and prolonged clouds and daily rainfall for a period is said to be the answer to the woes of the ranchmen at the present.

Spotted rains, while they do some good where they fall, are not general enough to provide much benefits, the stockmen say.

Courthouse Lights Prevent Escape Of Accused Pair

The mercury arc lights which were installed at the courthouse recently were responsible for the prevention of the escape of two young women last week, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey.

The women had been arrested along with two men, at the front of the Sunset Siesta Motel about 2:00 a.m. and the men were being questioned by the sheriff's department officers. The women were left seated in the courthouse hall.

The officers heard the front door of the courthouse open and going into the hall to see why, they saw the women gone. They ran to the front of the building and caught one of the women out near the street, and the other hiding in the shrubs on the west side of the courthouse.

All four were charged with being drunk in a public place. Each pled guilty to the charge and after paying fines to Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath were released to go to their home in Kermit.

New Superintendent For SP Division

The appointment of J. D. Ramsey of Ennis as division superintendent of the Southern Pacific Lines at San Antonio, effective July 1, has been announced by the railroad.

He succeeds J. W. Kraemer, superintendent at San Antonio since March 1954, who leaves the SP to accept the presidency of the Texas Mexican Railroad Co. with headquarters in Laredo.

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State Capital NEWS
 By Vern Stanford

Austin — State-owned islands along the coast, and submerged lands in inland waters, now are available for lease for industrial purposes.

Leasing for industry was authorized last year by the Legislature. First step in the program was for Gov. Price Daniel to select the men to serve on a committee to advise the School Land Board on leasing procedures.

Procedure is this — a person who wants to lease state land must first apply to the city government if the land lies in a city limit, or to the county commissioners court. They publish notices and have public hearings. If they recommend the lease the three-man School Land Board then can consider it and set the amount of rent to be paid.

First application was from Port Aransas, which wants to lease part of Mustang Island for an airport.

School Bus Bargains
 State Board of Control, which buys buses for all the school districts on sealed bids, found that the price of 72-passenger buses has fallen by about \$1,200 this spring.

May purchases averaged \$5,430, while the 1961 average was \$6,618. Same sort of declines were noted in prices of smaller buses.

Leases Go Up
 But there was a note on higher prices, too.

For many years, the University of Texas lands in West Texas have been leased for oil and gas with only one-eighth royalty reserved for the University of Texas and Texas A&M College, which share in the proceeds.

This year, the royalty was raised to one-sixth, and only 9 of 101 tracts offered for lease were passed over by the oil company bidders who bought them at an auction sale. Cash bonuses averaged \$38.64 and acre. This is lower than at some sales in the past. But if they find oil or gas, the University found will get more of it due to the higher royalty fees.

Impact Still Dry
 That long-expected "oasis" in West Texas will stay dry a while longer.

It is the town of Impact, in the edge of bone-dry Abilene, which incorporated and voted itself wet in 1961.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson and the City of Abilene brought suit to declare the incorporation invalid. But District Judge J. R. Black held that the incorporation had been validated by the Legislature. It was done in a validating act passed mainly for the City of Plano, which just happened to apply to Impact, also.

However, State Liquor Administrator Coke Stevenson Jr. announced that he will not grant a package store permit which has been pending for months. He'll wait to see what the higher courts say about Judge Black's ruling, since the case will be carried to the Texas Supreme Court.

So there won't be any legal liquor in Taylor County for several more months.

Textbook Storm
 The special House of Representatives committee which had some stormy hearings wound up its business with an internal storm.

Rep. W. T. Dungan of McKinney held the final hearing all by himself in Dallas. Other four members boycotted the meeting, then voted to expunge in from the record.

Each member will write his own report to the House on the procedures by which textbooks are selected.

During its stormy life, committee heard one member called a "card carrying communist" by a

lady in Amarillo. He filed suit against her, and apparently the folks back home didn't believe her because he won renomination.

Retiring Judges
 The judicial retirement system was designed so judges could leave the bench for a few years of rest before their deaths.

Statistics just worked up on the operation of the system by State Auditor C. H. Cavness, reveals that there are 29 district and appellate judges paying into the retirement fund, and 31 who are on retirement.

During the last fiscal year, five retired judges died and 11 retired. Of 62 judges who have retired, 31 had died as of the date of the audit.

But the retirement system may not have succeeded in keeping judges on the bench. During the year, 10 left the bench without retiring, to go into private law practice.

Legal Rulings

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson answered a variety of questions this week. He told Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar that it is legal for a school district to buy gasoline and oil from a consignee who is a member of the school board, even if he got the contract as low bidder on sealed bids.

He told County Atty. John Lawhon of Denton that Jim



George, who won the nomination for two justice of the peace seats, can't hold them both, and that he vacated the office he held when he became a candidate for the other place. George's name cannot appear on the general election ballot for both jobs.

He told County Atty. Bill F. Griffin Jr. of Center that trucks owned by a farm corporation and used exclusively for hauling poultry and farm products are entitled to the half-price license fee.

More Oil Suits

More and more lawsuits are being filed out of the East Texas Field crooked hole investigation.

Latest was a \$13,000,000 suit filed by the attorney general against operators of a lease which he contends had been produced through a crooked hole since 1949.

There had been indications that the "deviation" practices whereby wells wound up under somebody else's property had been going on quite a while. But this is the first indication that it

was happening that far back.

Efficiency Study

Request for an efficiency study of the Texas Railroad Commission won approval from the executive committee of the Texas Research League. So that big agency will be looked into thoroughly.

Oil men had complained in the past that there was too much red tape about Railroad Commission's operations.

Chairman William J. Murray Jr. had defended his agency on that point, saying that many requirements had had to be added

Sales Better

Total retail sales in Texas in May rose to 3 per cent above the April level, after the UT Bureau of Business Research made its seasonal adjustments.

Durable goods sales were up 7 per cent and auto sales were up 16 per cent above April and 24 per cent above May of 1961.

Furniture and household appliances apparently reflected a bumper crop of weddings. They usually rise about 14 per cent in May over April. This year they rose 22 per cent.

Nationally there was a 1 per cent decline in retail sales compared to the Texas rise of 3 per cent.

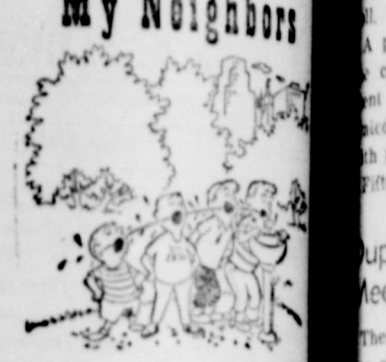
