LISTEN TO LUKE

The meeting here last week of two men with local citizens interested in flood control projects on the Sanderson Canyon and 3-Mile watersheds was interesting, in more ways than one. It was interesting to find out that there were local citizens interested in what seems like a worthwhile project, and that there were state and federal agency representatives who were also interested.

People sometimes laugh when flood control is mentioned in Sanderson. People in Ozona used to laugh at the thought, too.

And other people in other places laughed until they found themselves swimming out of their living rooms.

There has been a lot of damage to the ranches of the watersheds. There has been a lot of damage to the railroad property and to the highway on those watersheds. There has been a lot of damage to private property and to business property in Sanderson in the past due to high water.

And there stands a chance to have even more damage in Sanderson in the future from high water since there has been some building in areas which were at one time under water at flood stage.

The fact that there is a great probability that the local water wells, or at least some of them could benefit greatly by such a project does not make it any less interesting. And re-charging the wells, possibly in or adjacent to the canyon, would not do any harm, in our opinion.

The storage, even if temporary of 200 acre-feet of water behind eight or 10 dams would not hurt the ranches where the dams were located, as far as we know.

There is even a remote possibility that evaporation from such projects would help us rain-wise too! — Remote, but possible!

The size of the reservoirs — 200 acre-feet, offers little hope for a water sports area for the watersheds except for dove hunting, and possibly tad-poling.

But there are great possibilities in WATER SAVED, in property saved, in maybe, even lives saved.

Let's all give it some serious thought, and if the local Soil Conservation District decides to try to sponsor the projects, then we will all have our minds made up about how we feel about such a proposal.

We have little property involved, too old and blind to do much dove hunting, to slow for tad-poling, but we have friends who like to have some assurance of a sufficient amount of water to bathe in in 1965, and some other friends who own property who would not like to see it going down the canyon on a big wave, and some other friends who are interested in the overall benefits of the proposal.

Frankly, it's difficult for us to see any draw backs to such a move, but we will be open-minded and listen to any.

Several people besides Jimmy Caroline, manager of the local water works, have been interested in what the water level is on the local storage tank every morning. There are other people who don't seem to care.

Water is a precious commodity for living — particularly when there is a possibility that the supply might be running low.

Recent trouble with pumps, nothing that isn't expected, but something that is always hoped will not happen — has caused the supply of the storage to dip pretty low and there was a possibility that there might be some curtailment in the use of it for watering home lawns.

There was some curtailment in the watering of the football field which has caused some damage

Opening of School Set

The 1962-63 term of the Sanderson schools will begin on Tuesday, September 4, according to an announcement made this week by Supt. H. L. Richardson. Prior to the opening of school there will be faculty meetings on Thursday and Friday, August 30 and 31.

Registration of school pupils will proceed as follows:

All bus students, old and new, in grades 6 through 12, will register on Tuesday, August 28, at their respective schools. All new students in grades 2 through 5 will register on this date also. A bus will leave the gas field at 7:30 a.m. on this date and will stop at Dryden to pick up students there. The bus will leave Dryden at 8:15 a.m. and continue on to the school. Students will be returned after lunch.

All new students only in grades 2 through 5 and all new and old students in grades 6 through 12 who live in those areas are urged to register on that date. Students who come to register on the opening day of school place themselves under a handicap by missing classes, assemblies, and important announcements and place an extra burden on the teachers and administration. The first day of school is an extremely busy day of school and students who register at the proper time do a great service to themselves and the school, Mr. Richardson said.

Encouragement Given Area For Possible Control Dams

Some encouragement was given in the consideration of the possibility of flood control dams on the watersheds of Sanderson Canyon and Three-Mile Draw.

The encouragement was given by members of the State Water Commission and the State Soil Conservation Service representatives.

Don Allison, SCS representative of Pecos, met Friday afternoon with Bill Hance, local SCS specialist, Joe N. Brown, local SCD directors' chairman, and J. A. Gilbreath, secretary-manager of the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce. Allison went over the procedure for making application for flood control facilities within the state, explained the procedure, the circumstances considered, etc., and showed films of similar work near El Paso and in Oklahoma.

It was explained that such a program, if feasible and plausible, would be done by the State Soil Conservation Service at no direct expense to local citizens. It was explained, however, that the expense of maintaining the dams and the main channel of the watershed was to be borne by some subordinate government with the power to tax, to assure the continued benefits of the projects.

Public Law 566, passed by the U. S. Congress in 1953 and amended in 1954, provides for the construction of such facilities for flood control and their maintenance, etc. An amount of \$300.00 per structure and \$37.00 per mile of main channel of the watershed per year must be available by the responsible organization.

On Saturday, Mr. Luscumb of the Texas Water Commission, met with the local group, which included the aforementioned men and Edward Kerf representing the board of directors of the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, to go over the two watersheds and see the possibilities of the flood control project and the need for such a plan. Mr. Luscumb was also taken over town to see the high-water marks of previous floods, such as the one of 1935 and 1942, and he saw the building that had taken place since then, so that some idea of future potential flood damage might be realized.
