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LISTEN TO LUKE

The Legion and Auxiliary convention last weekend was a huge success by everyone's standards. There was a seeming awakening of all present to the need for greater devotion to the American flag which members of the Legion bore arms. There seemed to be a greater response to the wonderful messages by those who spoke. There seemed to be an urgency to stop the drift from devotion and loyalty to the principles of the real meaning of America.

The American public needs to have an awakening to the real meaning of Americanism. We must learn, and soon, that being American is more than simply having been born in America. The basic factor for us to be real Americans, is to be firm in our convictions that we, the people, are America. This obligates us to it that proper conduct of people in public office is demanded from the lowest office to the highest. It places us in the responsible position of holding the reins of government in our hands to do our part in guiding every move that involves the destiny of this nation.

Too long we have asked what the government do for me. We must ask what can we do for our government. Abuse of power, and seeking more and more centralized power must be halted if this republic can survive. There must be an end of complacency and yielding. The Legion stands for and speaks a loud voice for the things that make America what it is and that we hope it can remain—by amending the Constitution of the United States out of the window, by the way we have the Monroe Doctrine in the past few months — is no way to keep America great.

Let's work to defeat all candidates for all offices who are in sympathy with socialistic trends of continued appeasement of Communists, since both are Communist helpers and have no place in any position in our government.

The people who want the government to have a hand in everything are in one of two classes. They want to be little dictators themselves and possibly have a voice in dictating, or they are too lazy or incompetent to get the job done themselves.

It is our candid opinion, and the opinion of several with whom we have talked this week, that if the Sanderson Eagles ever play another game with the San Felipe Mustangs it will be for some reason or another, Sanderson boys can play in several games and not have an injury on the team other than a bruise or pulled muscle, or a bad nose, but over the years, Sanderson players have suffered everything from a broken neck on down in games against the Mustangs. We think that this is indicative of the need for the cessation of such an agreement.

Sanderson fans who have followed the boys for games on their field have had tires slashed, packages stolen, the buses have been "rocked", and other humiliating and costly experiences. If we are to be "beaten" on the gridiron, it would seem better to take such a beating from a superior team that does not have a record of severely injuring its opponents.

Identification Of Remains Is Made

Positive identification of the remains found on the Fred Barrett ranch recently has been made by the Texas Department of Public Safety, according to Terrell County Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey.

The man was Henry Webber Askins, a Negro male, born January 2, 1916, in New Orleans, La. He was five feet seven inches tall and weighed 169 pounds.

Identification was made from the fingerprints which were still visible on the near-skeletal remains.

Every effort is being made to contact the nearest kin of the deceased by Sheriff Cooksey.

There was no apparent result or foul play found by the laboratory nor visible examination made by laboratory technicians. Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath stated that the death certificate would show the cause of death as "unknown" following the laboratory report and the investigation made at the scene where the body was found.

The remains will be held at the Sanderson Funeral Home pending possible location of relatives of the deceased.

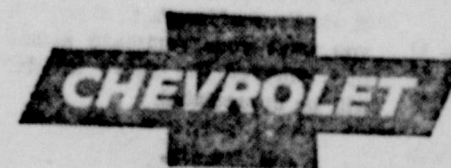

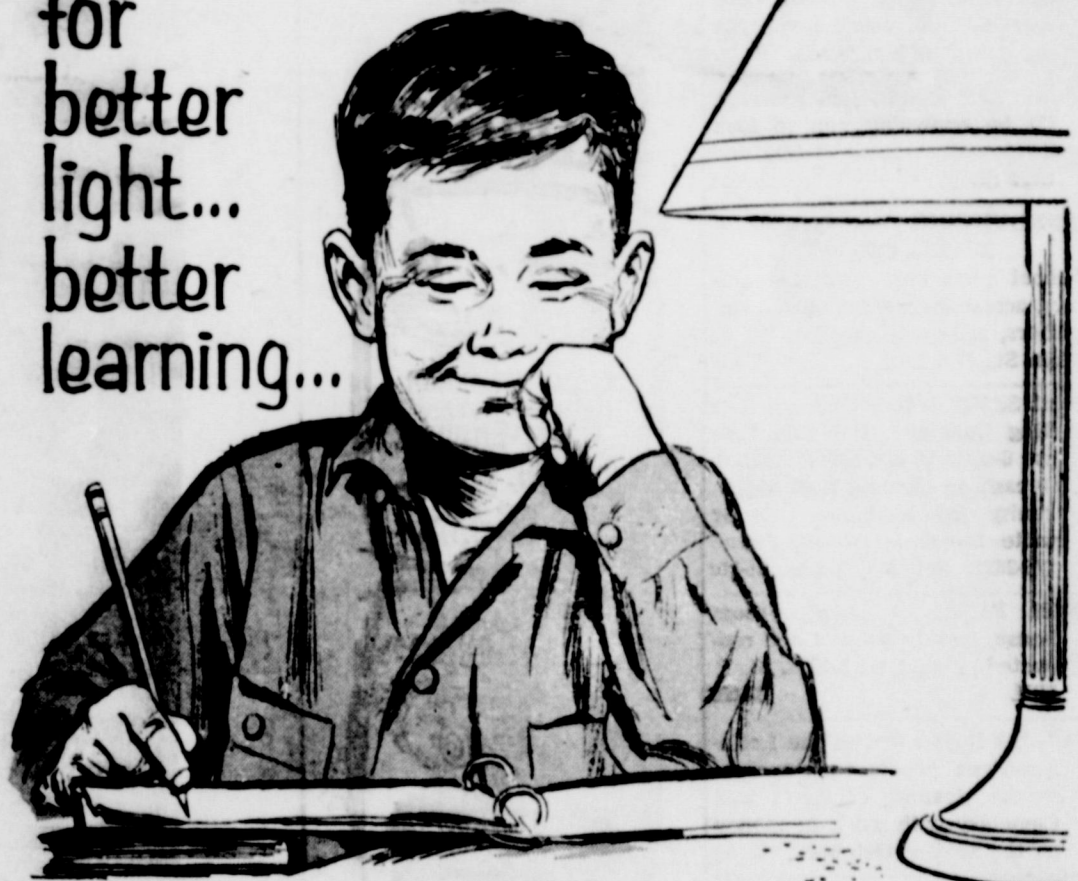

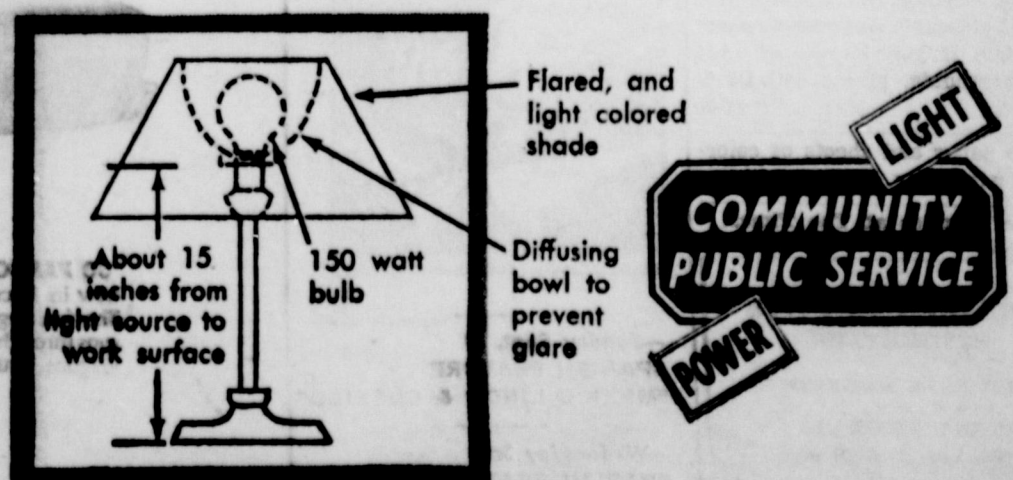
