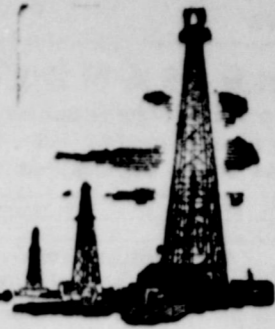

Two Showers Help Condition Of Ranges Here

Two showers fell in Sanderson the first of the week, giving welcomed and much-needed benefits to the ranges of the county.

About 75 inches was recorded by some gauges locally Sunday morning in showers that began falling at about 3:00 a.m., lasting well up into the morning. Another shower fell locally Monday afternoon from about 4:00 to 6:00 leaving about the same amount of rain in many gauges in town.

Ervin Grigsby reported lesser amounts of rain on the west side of town than were received locally. Up to 2½ inches of rain was reported by some ranchmen between Sanderson and Dryden and north of Dryden, but diminished to the north and no rain was reported south of US 90 east of Sanderson. C. F. Cox reported one-half inch and J. Garner two and one-half inches.

Both showers covered a wide area from east to west but were narrow from north to south. Some green sprigs can be seen resulting from the rain and the warm days that have been prevalent lately.

Tuesday night a reported inch of rain fell in the area of the Jimmy Martin ranch. Thunder and lightning was visible from Sanderson to the northeast and east, but no moisture fell locally.

Wednesday morning dawned with a heavy cloud cover to the entire west and possibilities of more rain. The weather has been warm and very humid.

14th Proposed State Amendment Is Discussed

The 14th proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas has caused much concern in some circles and the pros and cons to the amendment will be given in an effort to better inform the public so that they may cast an intelligent vote at the polls on November 6.

The proposal is called the "Trial de Novo" proposal and would authorize the Legislature to provide a trial de novo (that is a new trial) on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions. It would permit a complete new trial on all the evidence and details of an administrative or regulatory order, regardless of previous rulings on similar cases.

Those who are against say: No one test of an administrative ruling settles all cases affected by it; under "de novo," hundreds of cases could be filed against the same order, each requiring a complete court trial and burdening the courts with administrative duties which would impair, if not destroy, their ability to perform their basic judicial function.

This amendment would empower the Legislature (1) to destroy all semblance of coordination and uniformity in established, proven, and necessary administrative functions by rendering specified administrative actions meaningless and placing the ultimate power of decision in the courts to be decided by one judge or jury today and another judge or jury tomorrow and (2) to neutralize the effectiveness of the courts and even deny the right of trial by jury by enactments which could make the fact-finding of administrative agencies binding upon the courts and (3) to destroy the delicate balance of powers between executive, legislative, and judicial branches of government in Texas.

This amendment is such a broad proposal that years of litigation would undoubtedly ensue before it could ever be adequately construed.

The proposal would affect decisions of school boards, water boards, commissioners courts, and any other political subdivision.

In order to explain some of the "mischiefs" of the proposal, examples of how the law might affect school boards are listed:

1. School boards could very conceivably have their personnel decisions subject to court action. The courts would frame personnel policies for individual local school districts and these policies would be determined by juries of local citizens on the basis of individual appeals from the board.

2. Assessments of property for school tax purposes could be removed from the local board of equalization and turned over to the courts.

3. The local board authority for condemnation of property for school sites would be subject to litigation.

4. Local school board policies regarding school program, pupil discipline, teacher placement, teaching materials, school calendars, etc., would be subject to jury review when questioned.

5. School bonds and other municipal bonds could be subject to court decisions regarding their legality. This would seriously affect the present protection afforded municipal bond purchasers and this could be reflected in the interest rates as well as the saleability of school bonds.

6. Board policies regarding the awarding of bids for capital outlay school purchases could be overturned by the courts.

Big Hill, US 90 Work Is Slated

Archie J. Sherrod, district engineer for the Texas Highway Department, was in Sanderson Monday to meet with the Terrell County Commissioners' Court to submit his plans for highway construction work in the county programmed for the future.

The programmed work includes the reconstruction of U.S. 90 from the Terrell-Val Verde County line 15 miles west, and the obtaining of right-of-way for a possible expansion of that roadway to a four-lane highway in the future.

The construction will include the widening of structures, construction of a third lane on some of the uphill grades, and general reconstruction of the existing highway.

The second project is the reconstruction of U.S. 285 in the "Big Hill" area, about nine miles northwest of Sanderson. The work will include the straightening of the highway on the south side of the hill, elimination of the sharp curve at the top of the hill and other plans to make the hill safer for vehicular traffic.

There will be little necessity for additional right-of-way for this project, according to Sherrod.

This project is expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$300,000 Sherrod stated.

A resident engineer will be moved to Sanderson in the near future to be in charge of the preliminary work of the plans and engineering and will supervise the work, also, according to Mr. Sherrod.

The court approved payment of \$100 per acre on land for the right-of-way on US90.

The securing of right-of-way for the project on "big hill" was not discussed.

Anti-Polio Drive Plans Underway

Plans are being finalized for a gigantic 16-county "Victory Over Polio" drive to begin Sunday, November 11. On that day residents of 15 West Texas counties and Jalisco, N.M., will have an opportunity to take Type 1 of the new Sabin polio vaccine.

Individual counties will shortly announce their organizational set-ups, the places where the vaccine may be taken, and the time set aside for inoculations. Type 1 vaccine will be given on this November date with Type 2 inoculation planned for January 3, 1963. An exact date for Type 3 Sabin vaccine will be set sometime in the future.

According to word from the steering committee headed by Dr. R. L. Penn Jr., of Midland, this "Victory Over Polio" effort will encompass over 31,000 square miles in West Texas and New Mexico and will allow approximately 330,000 residents an opportunity to receive the new vaccine. An area-wide program of this nature helps to lower the cost of individual inoculations. Generally speaking, donations of 25¢ or more will be accepted for each Sabin inoculation.

The steering committee further said that pre-registration blanks will shortly be available for all families in individual counties and urged residents of the area to watch for announcements and read their newspapers for further information about the campaign.

Nov. 1-20 Time To Mail Parcels To Overseas Posts

The period November 1 to 20 has been designated for the mailing of Christmas parcels and greeting cards to members of our Armed Forces overseas. This includes all persons who receive their mail through an APO or Fleet Post Office.

It is recommended by the Post Office Department that all packages be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard packages should be wrapped in a heavy paper and all packages should be tied with strong cord. Unless completely packed and tightly filled boxes are likely to be crushed. A slip showing a list of contents and the name and address of the sender should be enclosed in the parcels.

Those who favor the proposal says: While present conditions allow a form of judicial relief from decisions of administrative agencies, this is not uniform, but instead, is regulated and limited by the statutes creating administrative agencies and the decisions of courts when such relief has previously been sought. This amendment would provide for trial "de novo" in all cases. The judicial should be separate and apart from an administrative ruling, and if a person is going to be allowed an avenue of judicial relief, it should be, in truth, a new beginning. At present, rulings already made are used, and in cases of similar appeals, there is no recourse to the courts if previous ruling is negative. The argument of those in favor of this resolution is that no two cases are ever exactly alike. Since administrative agencies are under the executive division of the government, and since one of the basic foundations of Texas law is the right of the citizen to "his day in court", each citizen should have the right to a fresh trial of his case against an administrative agency just as he
