Game Commission Alters Quail Season

Austin - The commissioners acted on several proclamation changes, at their October 12 meeting. The most important changes occurred in the quail seasons for several regulatory authority areas.

The quail season for the Trans-Pecos District was set back two weeks also, to allow for a late hatch. It is set for Nov. 15-Jan. 13. There will be no open season on Mearns' quail, commonly called "fool quail". Bag limit will be 12 per day and 24 in possession. Biologists recommended a turkey season in the Trans-Pecos to run Dec. 1-Dec. 15, and the commissioners approved it. This season will be held only in Culberson and Hudspeth Counties where transplanted turkey have reached huntable numbers. The bag limit is one turkey gobbler per season.

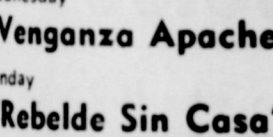

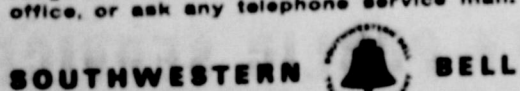
