AUSTIN — Attorney General Will Wilson issued an opinion that the Constitution Party of Texas cannot nominate members for district offices at its state convention.

But the opinion came a bit late. Election ballots already have been printed, and the tardy nominations are listed.

Secretary of State P. Frank Lake made the request for an opinion on Constitutional Party nomination procedure in September. The "third party" didn't release its list of nominations until early summer, whereas Republicans and Democrats had to comply with a law that says candidates must announce by the second Monday of February.

According to Wilson, the same law applies to the Constitutional Party.

High Cost of Learning

Tuition for Texas' 20 state universities and colleges may be doubled by the time members of the 1964 high school graduating classes are ready to enroll.

Texas Commission on Higher Education decided to ask the legislature to double tuition — from \$50 to \$100 a semester — and increase appropriations by 35 per cent during 1964-65.

Commission approved a \$4,000,000 boost in the previously recommended biennial budget of \$162,000,000; agreed to raise college presidents' salaries; and ordered its staff to look into the elimination of remedial writing and reading and tours from college curriculums.

Request for more money came after it was noted that this fall's enrollment of 110,000 students in 19 colleges was an increase of 9 per cent over last year, and the "war babies" will soon be knocking at the doors.

Deficit Rises

Deficit in the State's General Revenue Fund increased by almost \$13,000,000 during mid-October, according to a report from State Treasurer Jesse James.

On October 9, the State was in the red to the tune of \$41,250,349. By October 24, the deficit was \$54,074,283.

Map Project Pushed

Absence of topographic maps

of the entire state may be holding us back to the nationwide race for new industries.

At a meeting of the Texas Mapping Advisory Committee, Harry Clark, director of the Texas Industrial Commission, said that topographic maps are very necessary to industries considering sites here. Chairman John J. Vandertulp said the maps are essential to industrial and agricultural planning.

Topographic maps are those that show the physical features of a region in minute detail.

When a mapping program of 73 counties is completed, Texas will be half mapped.

Attractive Nuisances State Health Department officials issued a warning against the use of arsenious acid containers for water bottles.

Field engineers recently found about 40 of the one-gallon size containers along the highway in Collin County. One had about one and one-half ounces of arsenic left in it—enough to kill more than 100 people.

Death of three members of a Josephine farm family was attributed to accidental poisoning caused by drinking water out of a container which had been used for cotton defoliation.

"These plastic bottles are attractive nuisances . . . and deadly," an official said.

Radiation Detection Plan

An officer of the Texas Department of Public Safety soon should be able to help out at the scene of a radiation accident or incident anywhere in the state in about 30 minutes, Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., announced.

A stepped-up training program in radiation detection which began on October 29 is expected to provide enough trained men to handle any emergency.

Officers who have completed the course already are driving vehicles equipped with a Geiger Counter to measure very low amounts of radiation, a mid-range survey meter, and a high-range meter.

Men also carry personal "Dosimeters" on their persons so they periodically can determine the amount of radiation they have

been subjected to during the survey of an area in which radioactive spillage has occurred.

Department's also helping to train members of city police departments, sheriff's departments rescue squads and other groups.

Highway Home Help

Property owners and tenants who become displaced by Interstate Highway right-of-way acquisition now are entitled to help from the district engineers of the State Highway Department.

In compliance with the 1962 Federal Aid Highway Act, people who must give up their homes or property because of right-of-way acquisition can get relocation assistance.

Assistance will include listings of available rental and sale properties, referrals to services such as local housing bureaus and chambers of commerce, and similar advisory aid.

Most Scenic

Two Texas highways are finalists in Parade Magazine's Scenic Highway Award contest, and rank among the 20 "most scenic" in the U. S.

One is Interstate Highway 45, "The Way of the Pines," which runs through a wooded area southeast of Huntsville. The other is a section of F. M. Road 170, "El Camino del Rio," which traverses rough country along the Rio Grande between Lajitas and Redford.

Attorney General Rulings

Sen. Louis Crump of San Saba asked the attorney general whether newspaper publication of a new State Constitution would be required before one could be adopted. "It would not," says Wilson.

A male juvenile, between 10 and 17, or a female juvenile, between 10 and 18, cannot be tried in a county court for negligent homicide in the second degree. Wellington County Attorney R. L. Templeton was informed.

A county court cannot commit a person to a mental hospital for temporary hospitalization for any period longer than 90 days.

A school district which does not teach high school grades cannot cancel or annul the transfer of one of its resident scholastics to a school district which provides high school grades.

Job Training Offered

A plan to discourage high school "drop outs" and retrain adult workers was implemented when the Texas Employment Commission and the Texas Education Agency appointed an advisory committee to assist in carrying out the terms of the 1962 Manpower Development and Training Act.

Act, which became effective on Aug. 1, was designed to provide occupational training in skills which can be learned in 52 weeks. Adult students who show satisfactory progress may be entitled to unemployment compensation while attending classes.

State Vocational Agency will arrange for facilities and instructors for local schools, but training will be under the complete direction of local educational systems.

Training programs for household appliance repairmen and for auto mechanics already are in operation, the former in Corpus Christi and the latter in El Paso.

Code Revisions

Texas State Bar officers and directors have selected revisions in the Code of Criminal Procedure as number one on its 12-point legislative program for 1963.

Bar president Leon Jaworski, said "There is particular need for criminal procedure reforms in our state."

Other proposals will include a statute regulating the execution of bail bonds in Texas, a Uniform Commercial Code, a Uniform Arbitration Act, and amendments to the Texas Securities Act.

Bar also will propose a constitutional amendment calling for the local option abolition of justice of the peace courts and replacing them with courts of record.

Legislature also will be asked to repeal acts of its last regular session making jury findings instead of court findings, conclusive in custody cases.

Enforcement Fund

Railroad Commissioner Bill Murray says an enforcement tax of 1c per barrel of oil is not needed.

According to Murray, there would be enough money for oil and gas law enforcement if the Legislature would allocate all funds collected for the purpose.

His comments were inspired by the enforcement tax of 1c per barrel of oil recommended by the Gregg County grand jury. Legislature authorized the

commission to take \$300,000 a year from the gas utilities fund to supplement oil enforcement tax income.

LOOK AT THE RECORD:

- ▶ In 1937, before Connally graduated from college he was working in Lyndon Johnson's first race for Congress. Following Johnson's election, Connally went to Washington as Congressman Johnson's assistant.
- ▶ In 1948 Connally managed Johnson's Senate campaign, (87 vote landslide) which involved the scandalous vote frauds of Duval County and Box 13 in Jim Wells County. Johnson took Connally back to Washington as administrative assistant (top man) in his Senate office.
- ▶ Late in 1949 Connally joined the law firm of Powell, Wirtz and Rauhaut in Austin. State Senator Wirtz was Under Secretary of the Interior when he resigned his Washington post to return to Texas to run Johnson's first Senatorial campaign in 1941.
- ▶ In 1952 John Connally went to work for Fort Worth oil man, Sid Richardson. Attorney General Will Wilson said, "Sid Richardson did not hire (Connally) for his training or knowledge. Sid Richardson hired him because he was LBJ's campaign manager." Lyndon Johnson had this comment on Mr. Richardson, "Nobody did more to send me to the Senate than the late Sid Richardson." Fort Worth Star Telegram, January 12, 1961.
- ▶ In 1956 Lyndon Johnson tapped Connally to place Johnson's name in nomination for President at the Democratic National Convention.
- ▶ In 1956, 1958, and 1960 Connally was picked to lead the Johnson forces in the county and state conventions.
- ▶ In 1960, Johnson called on Connally to lead the drive to obtain the Presidential nomination for him. Later, Connally was active in Johnson's Texas campaign.
- ▶ As a reward, Connally was tagged for the post of Secretary of the Navy shortly after President Kennedy visited Vice-President-elect Johnson's ranch. The New York Times termed Connally's appointment as "Mr. Johnson's biggest patronage plum." (June 4, 1962)
- ▶ In 1961 Connally, after less than a year on the job he pledged to fill for four years, resigned to run for Governor of Texas. Time magazine said Connally's announcement for Governor "certainly seemed to carry Lyndon Johnson's political fingerprints." (December 22, 1961) After Connally's victory over Yarborough, Time said "His mentor Lyndon Johnson thus tightened his grip on the Texas Democratic organization." (June 8, 1962)
- ▶ All over Texas long-time Lyndon Johnson backers are spearheading Connally's million dollar campaign. Why? Federal pay offs from the Kennedy-Johnson team.

With this background it's an insult to Texans' intelligence to pretend that John Connally is not the hand-picked candidate of Lyndon Johnson. Thinking Texans will reject this brazen attempt to merge State and Federal patronage into one gigantic political machine run out of Washington by L. B. J.

don't mind much, others mind less, and some mind a lot. And that is only natural, since it is not the most pleasant duty in the world. But isn't it wonderful that if you or I face a charge in some court, that we can have a jury of our equals to decide the merits of the testimony? Wouldn't it be appalling to face a group of professional jurors, or not to have the privilege of any jury at all?

Some people have been known to say, "But I don't want to have to find a person guilty of some violation of a law."

It is our opinion that it is the evidence that should govern the findings of a jury, and that evidence is put there by the guilty party, or there is no evidence.

If the evidence is so strong against a person, it is evidence that goes along with the violation and the juror should not feel himself responsible, in our opinion.

Through his methods of obtaining all the sympathy for a client, a defense attorney will often use sympathetic tones, words and appeals, either for mercy or acquittal. That's what he is paid to do. But if evidence stacks up against a person to the degree that a juror feels that he surely must be guilty of a violation of a law, then we cannot see why the juror should feel guilty. If he bases his findings on facts and exercises his duty and obligation with fairness and equality, then we see that he owes an apology to no one.

Justice should not only be tempered with mercy, but with an attitude of absolute fairness.
