Forms have been printed in The Times for two weeks and have been given to every school child to take home, and by having them filled in, movement though the lines will be facilitated and delays prevented at the time of the giving of the vaccine.

Friday at the high school building, the vaccine will be available from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. Sunday it will be avaiable at the same place from noon to 5:00 p.m.

Regardless of having had the Salk vaccine, any or all three doses of that, everyone is urged to take the Sabin vaccine which is supposel to give immunization to all three types of polio and is regarded as having a higher level of effectiveness than the Salk vaccine

Any adult who is diabetic or a small child who for any reason cannot eat the small cube of sugar on which the three drops of vaccine will be put, is urged to avail themselves of the vaccine also as it may be given from a dropper on the tongue. It is tasteless and odorless. The vaccine will be taken to anyone physically unable to come to the school if word is gotten to the committee working there:

If everyone will take all three doses of the Sabine vaccine, it is believed that polio would soon be stamped out. It has been found that some persons are carriers of the polio germs, although they never develop the disease, and so that is why it is urged that everyone take the vaccine. There will be no charges for the vaccine but everyone who can is asked to make a contribution of twenty-five cents for each dose and in that way funds will be available to furnish vaccine for everyone, even those unable to pay for it. L. E. Muller is general chairman of the arrangements for the Sabin vaccine project and is joining members of the committees in urging that Terrell County residents respond whole-heartedly to the project by taking their first dose on Friday or Sunday.






