## LISTEN TO LUKE

We received information from Ed Foreman about his stand against federal aid for the eradication of salt cedar on the Pecos River, and we also read in daily newspapers the same information. None of the newspapers we know of condemned his action. And we think that name should.

Ed ran on a "conservative" platform and said that he thought that individuals and groups were more capable of running their business than was Washington. He seemed sincere, and his actions bear him out.

We know that the quickest way for a Senator to get everyone on his side is to start giving everyone something. But each of us supposes any gifts to other people. True conservatism is opposition to all such give-aways.

We wrote Ed and we feel — right or wrong — that the federal government has no more business getting into the salt cedar eradication business on the Pecos River than they do of going into the fly eradication business in my front yard, or other similar projects.

Too many times, too often, and too expensively, we look to the federal government as the giver of all good gifts and as the sole benefactor to needy men in time of trouble, and then, when income tax time rolls around, it's another story, and at election time it changes again.

Flies are a nuisance at my house in the summer time, causing some concern of cleanliness, some expense in thrown-away parcels of food, purchases of fly swatters, insecticide bombs, etc. Crab grass almost kills my desires to have a lawn every year. Cats howling in the neighborhood disturb my sleep. Termites cause me much concern and the expense of efforts to keep them away from my house. I face the danger of my house being blown away in a tornado, of being hit by lightning, of hail damage, and even remotely of being flooded.

How much protection from all of these things should I get from the federal government?

We look to Washington for so many of those things, and protections of one kind or another, even medicare and burial is in the mill of legislation. Soon, all of our reliance and allegiance might be toward our government.

I fear that our dependence on a government for all of our necessities will kill what little self and God-reliance we have left.

And it will if the trend continues. That is sure!

The Commissioners Court Monday in their meeting voted to table the consideration of the flood control project on Sanderson Canyon and Three-Mile Draw until such time as more information was available showing a greater need, or until those people more directly concerned came up with a real reason for pursuing the project further and a willingness to enter into the expense of the project to whatever degree was necessary.

Ranchmen whose land would be used, possibly harmed or possibly helped, and who must be willing to grant, sell or otherwise make easements available have been non-committal on the project — which is strictly their privilege and no condemnation is implied.

The Soil Conservation District, through whom any sponsoring organization must work, has had no information or indication that the project is feasible. The railroad company, who has been the biggest loser to high water locally, has had no representative to seek relief in any manner from outside for relief from possible

## Fire Department Board Meets

The executive board of the Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department met last week at the Oasis Restaurant.

The following decisions for action were taken by the board according to Dudley Harrison, secretary-treasurer:

Joe Fuentes was hired as maintenance man for the equipment with the salary to remain at \$15.00 per month.

The board ruled that the fire-fighting equipment was not to be used for any purpose other than fighting fires and that the equipment would not be used for watering down any local recreational facility, or other such uses. This action was brought about by a reviewing of the cost of the equipment's replacement and repair and also repairs which had been necessary because of the use of the equipment for such purposes.

Barton Massey was named as a member of the board to replace Lawrence Janes, who moved away.

A training schedule has been set up for firemen and will begin April 1.

Repairs were authorized for the pumps on both trucks.

A timer was purchased for the siren which will automatically cause the siren to sound at noon every day. This was thought practical because lack of use of the siren can cause it to stick and be ineffective when needed.

The board announced that a drive for funds for maintenance of the department would be in the middle of May and all local residents will be contacted to make a contribution to the fund.

## Jr. High Track Meet To Be Saturday

A junior high track meet, its first, will be staged in Sanderson on Saturday. The meet will be at the track west of town and entrance is at the baseball diamond.

Over 100 boys from the local schools, Maria, Alpine, Marathon, Grandfalls, Imperial, Rankin, Ozona, will participate in the track and field events.

Paul Hatem, athletic director of the local school system, stated that the preliminaries would begin at 10:00 Saturday morning and no admission would be charged. The finals will begin at 1:00 p.m. and admission will be 25c for students and 75c for adults.

There will be ribbons awarded to the winners of the first four places in each event in each division, and a trophy will be awarded to the winning team in each division.

Boys will compete within their own grade division only.

Mr. Hatem stated that there would be a host of entries from the local school and that emphasis would be placed on depth and participation rather than on the strength of a few of the boys to carry the load of the team in a number of events.

The school officials urged the attendance of local fans at the meet to give encouragement to the boys and lend their support to the efforts of those in the athletic department who were trying to promote interest in the events on the parts of the boys.

The senior track team was in Ozona last week end and will go to Wink Friday of this week.

Roy Barksdale, pioneer Terrell County ranchman, died Sunday afternoon in a Uvalde hospital.

After receiving medical treatment in an Alpine hospital for several months following a cerebral hemorrhage, he was taken to a Uvalde nursing home about a month ago.

Funeral services were in the Doran Funeral Home Chapel in Del Rio Tuesday afternoon and interment was in that city.

Mr. Barksdale, 79, was a native of Montell and had ranched in the Dryden country since 1915. He was a long-time member of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Laura Spruill Barksdale; a sister, Mrs. B. L. Van Cleave of Sanderson; a nephew, Bill Lawson of Del Rio; four nieces, Mrs. Bill Goodwin of Sanderson, Mrs. Esther Sanders of Lubbock, Mrs. Florence Freeman of Pecos, and Mrs. Zada Jeffers of Alpine.

## Local Ranchmen Contribute \$10,156.50 To Fly Program

Troy Druse, treasurer for the fund for the fly eradication program, announced Wednesday of this week that \$10,156.50 had been collected in the second round to assure the continuance of the program. Druse stated that this figure was about two-thirds of the amount previously collected in about a 12-month period while this collection was during a six-week period only.

He stated that he felt the ranchmen of the county should be commended for their response to the plea for additional funds needed to insure the continuation of the program intended to eradicate screwworm flies, or make them ineffective.

Malone Mitchell, county chairman of the collections stated he appreciated the cooperation of other members of the collection committee and also the ranchmen for their speedy cooperation and the interest expressed by that action.

The continuation of the program over the state has been assured by the gathering of or assurance of \$3,000,000 by the stockmen of the state as their part of the obligation.

The dance numbers were by pupils of Mrs. J. R. Hodgkins, who assisted the Girl Scout leaders in getting up the program.

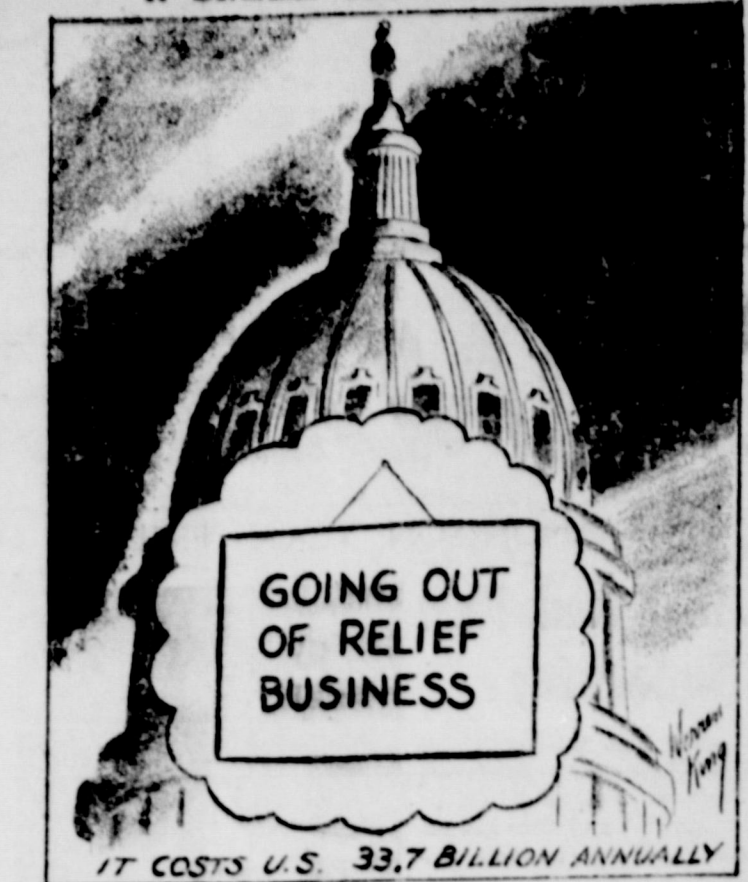

A million-dollar project is the talked-of figure, which must be offset by a million-dollar property loss resulting from floods. Is such a damage reportable on a 50-year-past record?

There are those who would go along with such a project for the mere fact of getting a hand in the pie, or for a small recreational facility. But the dams will not be built for such whimsical reasons, not unless we want to build them on our own!

And there are those who, if it rains a flood this very week end, will then blame a commissioner
