The Bitterweed (Leonard) gas field of Terrell County was opened May 14 by Humble Oil and Refining Co. with completion of its No. 1 W. M. Allison, 18 miles southeast of Sheffield.

It was fanned for a calculated absolute open flow of 4.6 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 3,373 to 3,421 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and east lines of section 8, Block A4 in the Mrs. A. Pride Survey.

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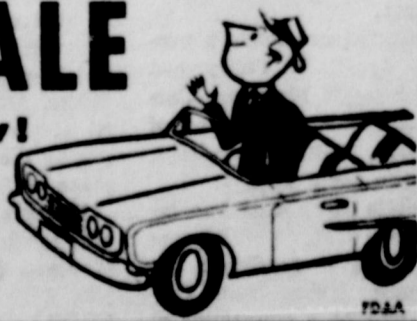

You CANNOT WORK for a GIFT. God's salvation, Eternal Life, must BE ACCEPTED through FAITH IN His Son. We EARN or MERIT wages, but we CAN ONLY ACCEPT GIFTS. TO OFFER ANYTHING FOR A GIFT, is an INSULT to the Gracious GIVER of the GIFT. ANY good works of ours, God looks upon them as "filthy rags" in His sight. (Isa. 64:6; Titus 3:5; Rom. 4:5; Rom. 7:18; Rom. 3:10-12)

We cannot BE JUSTIFIED before God UNLESS we ACCEPT BY FAITH, "THE RIGHTEOUSNESS of God" IMPUTED to us by God WHEN WE TRUST IN the atonement of His Son for OUR SINS. (Rom. 3:21-31; 4:1-25; 5:1)

God's Gift of Eternal Life is RECEIVED WHEN Christ is RECEIVED BY FAITH IN THE HEART. "AS MANY as RECEIVED Him (Christ), TO THEM He (God) GAVE the POWER TO BECOME the sons of God, even TO THEM that BELIEVE ON His name." (John 1:12) "BAPTIZED INTO Jesus Christ BY the Holy Spirit" (John 3:1-8; 1 Cor. 12:13; John 1:33; Gal. 3:26-27; Rom. 6:3; Eph. 4:5)

The Bible teaches simply and clearly that salvation is a FREE GIFT of God to BELIEVERS in the Lord Jesus Christ. WHEN Christ "died for our sins" on the Cross, He PAID the PRICE of sin and FINISHED the WORK of Redemption. "It is finished", is the message from Christ's Cross. The penitent sinner's PART is to "repent" of his sins and "believe on" the Lord Jesus Christ and ACCEPT Him as your Savior and Lord. BY TRUSTING IN His Atonement for "your sins" TO SATISFY God and RECONCILE you unto Him BY His Matchless Grace in His Son, "He (Jesus) BORE our sins, in His own Body on the Cross". "HE WAS MADE SIN for us, that we might BE MADE THE RIGHTEOUSNESS of God IN Him". (1 Cor. 15:3; 1 Peter 2:24; 2 Cor. 5:21)

If you will CONFESS with your mouth the Lord Jesus and will BELIEVE IN your HEART, that God HAS RAISED Him from the dead, you WILL BE SAVED. FOR WITH THE HEART man BELIEVES UNTO RIGHTEOUSNESS, and with the mouth CONFESSION is made unto salvation." (Rom. 10:1-13)

This is THE BIBLE WAY of RECEIVING Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. This is THE BIBLE WAY of RECEIVING Eternal Life, God's GIFT to YOU! Are you WILLING to MEET God on His terms, and receive His Son as Savior from your sins? WHEN you RECEIVE His Son, "BY REPENTANCE TOWARD God and FAITH TOWARD Jesus Christ," you RECEIVE Eternal Life, the FREE GIFT of a loving God! (Acts 20:26-27; John 3:1-8, 36; John 6:29)

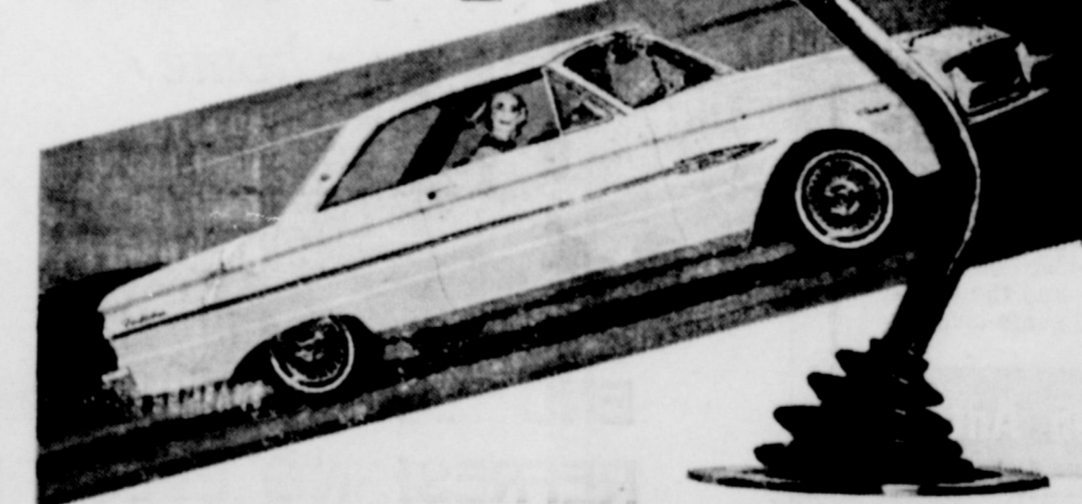
