Hospital Plans Heard Monday By Commissioners

The special hospital committee named by the Terrell County Commissioners to study details on the possibility of a hospital in Terrell County reported their findings Monday to the court.

The group consisted of Troy Druse, Edward Kerr, and James Word, with County Judge R. S. Wilkinson as ex-officio member.

Their recommendations for the size hospital plant, an estimated cost, an estimate on the required or desirable staff, and an estimate on the probable annual cost were also reported. The committee also gave the court their opinions on the financing and the probable increase in taxes, even giving examples of the increase in taxes for several local property owners, but not giving the names of the property owners whose present taxes were used in the examples.

The Commissioners asked that copies of the report be made so that each could have a copy to study and recommended that the committee meet with the commissioners later after they had time to study the report and, when they had time to go back and review the details of it and make any necessary changes or recommendations so that the proposal could be given to the public for their consideration.

The Commissioners were high in their praise and appreciation to the committee for the work they had done and for the results of their efforts in submitting the detailed and thorough report for the information of the Commissioners' Court.

Weed Cutting, Spraying Urged By TB Association

Realizing the need for a clean-up campaign and spraying in the community, the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association sparked the first interest in the project at their quarterly meeting in the home of Mrs. M. W. Duncan, vice-president, Monday evening by voting an amount not to exceed \$200.00 toward the project.

Recent rains and showers have brought an increased crop of weeds and grass and the resulting menace of flies and mosquitoes are expected to soon be in evidence. After first instituting the clean-up campaign to get rubbish, junk, and accumulations of trash away from the vacant lots and residences of the community, the spraying and fogging to kill flies and mosquitoes should be most effective. On previous occasions when such a move was started, the cooperation of various clubs and individuals in the community was sought, holding the work and expenses incident to the project to a minimum.

Other business transacted at the meeting included naming of County Judge R. S. Wilkinson as Christmas Seal Sale chairman and Miss Antonia Cardenas as secretary to mail the seals. Mrs. Troy Druse will head a committee to give skin patch tests to the pupils in the first and fifth grades after the opening of school in the fall.

Mrs. Clyde Higgins, president, presided at the meeting. C. G. Riggins, treasurer, gave an annual report to the association. Mrs. Duncan served punch after adjournment.

W. A. Davis, Former Resident, Dies in Accident

Funeral services were held in Monahans Saturday morning for W. A. Davis, 56, who was killed in a car-truck collision Thursday afternoon. Burial was made in Monahans.

Survivors include his widow and a daughter, Dixie, of Monahans, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Davis of Big Spring, and two brothers.

The Davises are former Sanderson residents when he was an employee of the Texas Highway Department as resident engineer before being transferred to Monahans in the same capacity.

Davis, who supervised state highway work in that area, was dead on arrival at the hospital in Monahans after the collision about six miles south of Grandfalls. He was driving a Texas Highway Department car, with Bobby Jones of Odessa as a passenger when the two vehicles collided at the intersection of two roads, according to reports. Jones died about two hours after the accident. The driver of the truck is in a Midland hospital.

Remodeling Of Kerr Bldg. Underway

Remodeling work is in its second week on the Kerr Building which houses the Community Public Service Co., the Water District office, Big Bend Gas Co. and the vacant office on the west end of the building. The remodeling work will be complete, according to Edward Kerr.

A curbed drain has been built on the north and east sides of the building and the sidewalk in front of the building re-done to eliminate a steep slope and to change the drainage system for the roof of the building.

The front of the building will be finished with a porcelainized metal and an aluminum awning to replace the present awning.

Mr. Kerr stated that some alterations would be made to the existing front windows and doors of the building.

The false front above the awning is also being evened and will be finished with the porcelainized metallic material in harmony with the front of the building.

The events and contestants will be divided as follows:

Girls 12 years old and under: barrel racing, flag racing, pole bending.

Boys 12 and under will compete in barrel racing, steer riding, pole bending.

Girls between 13 and 15 will compete in barrel racing, pole bending, ribbon roping.

Boys 13-15, tiedown calf roping, steer riding, goat hair pulling.

Girls 16-19: barrel racing, flag racing, tiedown calf roping and ribbon roping.

Boys 16-19: bareback bronc riding, tiedown calf roping, goat hair pulling, ribbon roping.

The rodeo events will be staged at the Rodeo Club's arena on US 285 northwest of town.

The delegates will participate in activities that demonstrate the working of a democratic government and will elect their own officers of a model state, a model town, and view the workings of the state government in Austin.

Friday the boys will make a trip to the Capitol and they will attend the Governor's Ball Friday evening.

Each year the selection of two boys and an alternate to attend Boy's State is made by the high school faculty with the approval of the Legion, the selection being made from the boys of the junior class on the basis of leadership, character, cooperation, scholarship, etc.

Carlos Pena Dies In El Paso, Burial To Be Here

The Rosary service will be said for Carlos Pena Thursday evening at 7:00 o'clock at his home here in Sanderson. Funeral services at 9:00 a.m. Friday from St. James Catholic Church and burial in Santa Rita Cemetery will follow, with all services under the direction of Rev. N. Fenner.

Mr. Pena died in an El Paso hospital Tuesday morning early after a long illness. His body was returned to Sanderson Wednesday night by train.

Pena was born November 4, 1909, in Boquillas, Texas to Mr. and Mrs. Epifanio Pena. He came to Sanderson in 1918 and worked on ranches for a while before going to work for the railroad in 1938. Ill health forced his retirement in 1960.

On May 28, 1929, he was married to Genaveva Rodriguez in Sanderson.

He is survived by his widow, and the following children: Ascension Pena who lives in El Paso, and Miss Marcellina Pena, Humberto Pena, Guillermo Pena, and Misses Margarita, Mary, and Lupe, all of Sanderson; brothers, Felipe, Higinio, Reymundo, Clemente, Jose, Leonardo; a sister, Mrs. Eulalia Rios; and three grandchildren.

Youth To Compete In Swim, Track Meet In Stockton

Between 800 and 1,000 young athletes, both boys and girls, are expected in Fort Stockton Friday and Saturday, June 14 and 15, for the Texas Junior Champ Meet, which will be a statewide track, field, and swimming competition run-off by the Fort Stockton Jaycees and other area citizens.

Bobby Morrow, one of the great sprinters in history, both at Abilene Christian College and in the Olympics, will open the meet with an address at a barbecue Friday evening at 6:00 p.m. at Fort Stockton High School stadium.

Boys and girls between 10 and 17 are eligible to enter the meet, and all entrants are being encouraged to enter at least four events each. Winners of first, second, and third places in each age group will receive medals in the track events and ribbons in the swimming contests.

All out-of-town contestants must have adult supervision, and be sponsored by a school or organization, in order to enter Junior or Champ competition. All boys will be housed Friday night in the junior high school gym, and all girls will lodge at Fort Stockton motels.

About 1-Inch Rain Falls This Week In Sanderson

Approximately one inch of rainfall has been measured in Sanderson during the past several days, with widespread scattered showers of varying amounts.

Local rainfall has been varied in measured amounts, with the heaviest falling to the east and north.

Last Saturday afternoon late, about 45-inch was gauged locally and a shower Tuesday afternoon left about the same amount of rainfall in some gauges to total the near-inch.

Ervin Grigsby stated that his official gauge showed 30-inch last Saturday and 35-inch Tuesday.

There was a trace of rain fall Monday morning early and another Wednesday morning with threatening skies prevailing and high humidity.

Ranches to the south of the railroad track received beneficial rains over the weekend and Tuesday afternoon, as did the country to the west and north. Some damaging hail was reported north of Sanderson last Saturday.

Ranges generally are said to be better than any time during the past several years, though there are some ranchers in the county that are feeding now due to the lack of rain.

The effects of the rains can be seen on the hills surrounding Sanderson which have greened up considerably.

Ranchmen also report the noticeable effects of the rains in the resulting good condition of the lambs and ewes.

Keith Mitchell Wins Sheep-Goat Award

Keith Mitchell, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. K. Mitchell of Sanderson, was chosen winner of the Area II Sheep and Goat Raisers Award on production and wool and mohair records at the Area II FFA Convention held in Snyder last Friday.

The project on which Mitchell was selected as winner will be checked later in the summer by a state checking committee made up of state staff, state officers, and representatives of the 10 FFA districts.

Applications from two members of the Ozona chapter were passed at the Area Convention and will also be reviewed by the state board. They were the application of Tommy Everett for the American Farmer Degree and that of Keith for the State Farmer Degree.

Results of the consideration of the state committee will be announced at the State convention to be held in Lubbock in July.




