District Governor Rotarians Hear

Addressing the local Rotary Club Wednesday, Ernest W. Wehman, Rotary Governor of this area linked Sanderson Rotarians with more than a half million other business and professional men who belong to Rotary Clubs in communities around the world.

"Rotary Clubs are functioning in more than 11,500 communities in 129 countries," he said, "and despite the diversity of their languages, customs, and political and religious beliefs, they are working toward such mutually desired goals as community betterment, the promotion of high standards in business, and the advancement of world understanding."

Mr. Wehman, of Pleasanton, Texas, was in Sanderson making his official visit to the local Rotary Club, one of 36 clubs in his district.

Referring to the program of Carl F. Miller, President of Rotary International, Wehman said, "This district has been 'matched' with District 235 located in Bloemfontein, South Africa, as a means of furthering better understanding and friendlier relations between Rotarians of the two countries. All Rotary Districts have been similarly matched. Our monthly contacts with our "sister" district are taking shape and we plan to exchange District Governor letters, exchange of correspondence by students of high school and college levels, exchange of tape recordings and slide program, and club to club to District 235 in South Africa and our District.

In the field of youth, Mr. Wehman spoke of the new club for boys that is now a part of the Rotary program. Called INTERACT, it is for boys in the upper three years of high school. "It is a club for international action," he said, "and is designed to turn the attention of young men to service and international understanding. Mr. Wehman is placing special emphasis on setting up Interact Clubs in his Rotary District, sponsored by Rotary Clubs. It is the goal of the District Governor to have each of his clubs adopt at least one project with our sister District 235 of South Africa.

Seasons, Bag Limits On Game Noted For West of the Pecos

At the regular meeting of the Texas Game and Fish Commission, held July 12, seasons and bag limits for all counties under regulatory authority were established, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. No major changes were made in the seasons and bag limits, except that the whitewing season has been eliminated and the bag limit on doves was reduced to 10 per day and 20 in possession. Wild aoudad sheep were added to the list of protected game animals. Perhaps the most important change was advancing the quail season in most counties under regulatory authority to November 16 through January 31.

In the Trans-Pecos area of West Texas:

Pronghorn antelope — open season September 28 through October 6 by permit only. Bag limit, one antelope per season. Deer — open season November 30 through December 8. Bag limit, two buck deer in the aggregate per season of which not more than one shall be a buck mule deer. In areas to be designated by the Game and Fish Commission, three deer in the aggregate; only two of the deer can be mule deer. Antlerless deer may be taken by permit only. Elk — open season Nov. 30 through December 8. Bag limit, one elk per season by permit only. Javelina — open season November 1 through December 31, except in Val Verde County west of the Pecos River, there shall be no closed season. Bag limit, two javelina per season, except in Val Verde County there shall be no bag limit. Quail — open season November 16 through January 14. Bag limit, 12 per day, possession limit 24 quail. There will be no open season on Mearns Quail. Turkey — open season only in Culberson and Hudspeth Counties, November 30 through December 8. Bag limit, one turkey gobbler per season.

New Speed Law Effective Aug. 23

More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed this week.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed August 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission passed a Minute Order which zoned some 18,640 miles of the highway system at the maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger cars, effective August 23. These highways will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indicate they are inadequate to accommodate a 70-miles-per-hour maximum.

The Commission's action followed a series of engineering traffic studies conducted throughout the state by the Highway Department's 25 highway districts.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market road system will come under the 70-mph maximum although some of these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60-mph maximum where conditions warrant.

Vote Planned On Proposed Amendments

Four proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution will face Texas voters in a special election to be on Saturday, November 9, and notices of the election on the four proposed changes are being published in The Sanderson Times for four consecutive weeks.

Major interest centers in the amendment which would abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting in Texas, and substitute instead a requirement that voters just register.

Other proposals have to do with: 1. Increase in the total available for old-age and other welfare programs to a total of \$60 million yearly; 2. A retirement program for elected and appointed officials of Jefferson County and its subdivisions (strictly a local bill); 3. Increase in the Veterans Land Program fund from \$200 million to \$350 million, and extension of the program.

Texas voters are being urged to study the proposed amendments. They may be clipped from this or the next two issues of The Times.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. of Midland was preparing to run casing at its No. 1 Lillian M. Allison in section 24, Block A4 in the Mrs. N. King Survey in Terrell County, for completion attempt as a second producer and one-mile southeast extension to the Mesa Grande (Leonard) gas field. The well is 20 miles south-east of Sheffield.

The discovery was finalized May 13 for a calculated absolute open flow of 4.6 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 3,373-421 feet.

Supporters of the proposed billion-dollar Trinity River development plan won the first round on opening day of hearings when the Texas Water Commissioners turned down the railroads' motion to delay the Austin hearing.

Gov. John Connally's approval of the commission's proposed plan was expected. He had long since pledged his support.

Connally called the navigation project, "a major step in one of the most important water conservation, flood control, and navigation projects in the history of Texas."

Texas Highway Department's 420-seat capacity auditorium overflowed during the two-day hearing as every community in the vast Trinity watershed was represented.

Spokesman for the railroads was Walter Caven, counselor for the Texas Railroad Association.

Plan of the U.S. Corps of Engineers calls for development of the entire watershed for navigation, flood-control, water conservation, water quality control, drainage, irrigation, hydroelectric power, fish, wild life, and recreation.

Thirteen reservoirs are included in the long-range plan. Locks and other features to make the river navigable from the Gulf to Fort Worth would claim more than \$515,000,000.

Carr said that while "riders" — i.e. restrictions on legislative appropriations — usually get by, this one went too far. It would have kept colleges from spending all their allotted budget if compulsory physical training programs were offered.

Congressman ED FOREMAN Reports

NUCLEAR TEST BAN

As the United States dashes headlong toward a test ban agreement with the Soviets, it might be well to recall the warning of the late John Foster Dulles, who was Secretary of State under President Eisenhower. Discussing the possibilities of a U.S.-Soviet pact several months before his death in 1959, Dulles commented to a close associate:

"Since a treaty is what the Russians want, it wouldn't be difficult to come up with one which would look good on the surface. We could include in it all the fuzzy language of diplomacy — and believe me, I know some of the phrases — and present it to the world as a great achievement for peace. All of this would result in a relaxation of world tensions, generate a feeling of international goodwill, and probably elect a Republican President in 1960."

"But, we're not going to do it. If we signed such a pact with the Soviets, there would develop a tremendous pressure to cut back on our defenses, reduce the size of our armed forces, and curtail our armaments. And we'd have only the word of the Russians that they were doing the same. Our NATO, SEATO, and other alliances would be endangered perhaps to the point of deterioration. As a result, within a few years we could be a sitting duck for the Communists to pick off whenever they felt the time was ripe."

So spoke a man who understood the Communist and the Communist menace. Communist Problems

We must not be led astray by the current dispute between the Soviets and the Red Chinese. While their differences are deep for us they represent only a falling out of thieves; both camps are intent upon our destruction. In our eagerness to exploit this

division in the Communist world, we should not form an alliance with one of the thieves. One Proposal Might Be Jenkin Lloyd Jones in the Tulsa Tribune says, "One of the most pernicious illusions abroad in the world today is the fond hope that if nations give up testing atomic weapons that the threat of an atomic holocaust will vanish. We ought to quit dispatching futile emissaries to face the familiar and bitter choice of frustration or surrender. Instead, we should send Mr. K. a simple note in non-diplomatic language: 'Look, Buster, we think tests in the atmosphere aren't even for the birds. We'll quit them if you will, but one more trick like the last time and we won't make this offer again. As to underground tests, we'll have them as often as we like and you are welcome to yours. If you ever want a moratorium on them, send us a letter telling us how many monitors you'll allow — and if we're interested, we'll write you back.'"

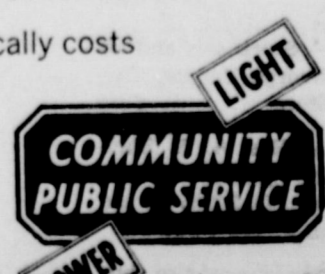

High Sky Ranch has had one horse on the property. "Mike's the only one who can catch him," Miller said. But he recently acquired 83 acres which will enable other donated livestock to become part of the family.

"The girls will have indoor and outdoor chores, as all ranch children do," said Mrs. Nobles. "Loving and caring for animals is a first step in adjusting from a poor home situation."
