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LISTEN TO LUKE

A long-sought petition is being circulated concerning the issuance of bonds for the building of a hospital. It is hoped that the petition will be called in time to coincide with the general election, in order to save the expense of a special election for the consideration of the voters.

We have never been opposed to the hospital proposal as such, but we have had some opposition to some of the things that came out when the proposal first started taking shape.

We could spend ourselves into poverty with too large a facility offering too many services.

But we can — in our humble opinion — build a useful facility that is within reach of our pockets that will furnish many of our needs and some of our desires.

A hospital is not a cure-all — it is the availability of a hospital. There may be trouble encountered in the staffing of a hospital, or its management. It may assure us of the facilities of a doctor for all time to come, and it may not. There are questions that are unanswerable now.

There is the possibility that I — or you — will not live until the election is held, or until the hospital is built.

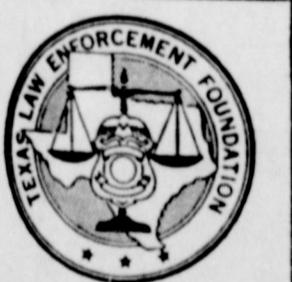
There are doubts that will always arise and exist.

If the facility is to be a success, it will be because of the backing of a large majority of the people of Sanderson particularly, and of the qualified taxpaying voters.

Sanderson's residents can contribute much to the success of a hospital by their devotion to the needs of the community and of the facility. If our interest is in the welfare of the people it serves, rather than how much it will benefit me, the operation will have a greater chance of success.

If anyone is supporting the proposal for a mercenary reason, we feel that it is the wrong thing to do.

There are many little services that we as individuals can perform toward the ultimate and overall success of a hospital if we have one, and each of us would do well to consider how we might perform those services in case we do get a hospital.

Area Ranchers Do Conservation Work

Ele Hagelstein, who ranches north of Sanderson, has completed a conservation plan on his ranch and entered into the Great Plains Conservation Program in the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District. Hagelstein's plans include cross fencing, pipelines, brush control pasture planting, water spreading, range and pasture management.

Plans to increase the carrying capacity of the ranch include establishing a highly productive Johnsongrass pasture which will receive additional water by diversion dams to supplement the water that falls on the field. During the growing season livestock will be placed in the field to rest the native rangeland.

Cross-fencing large pastures and providing additional water will aid working livestock and provide better distribution of livestock over the range for proper utilization of the grasses.

W. R. Stumberg, whose ranch is 20 miles west of Sanderson, has just completed clearing about 500 acres of cedar from his ranch. This work is part of the Great Plains Program he entered into in 1961.

The cedar was dozed out and left to prevent soil erosion and the dozer pits could collect more moisture to aid in coverage by native grasses. He reported that the same type of management following cedar dozing on an other pasture resulted in a much-improved range condition.

Deferring for one season is hoped to get quicker recover of better grasses such as side oats, green spring top, blue gramma, and black gramma.

Petition Circulates Asking Vote For Hospital Bonds

A petition is being circulated seeking the signatures of at least 10 per cent of the resident qualified taxpaying voters of the county asking the Terrell County Commissioners' Court to call for an election, either special or at the time of a general election, to consider a bond issue.

The bond issue will be for \$140,000.00 to build a hospital for Terrell County.

The petition is the result of a detailed survey and study of the needs of the county and recommendations of the committee appointed by the Commissioners Court. The committee consisted of Troy W. Druse, Edward Kerr, and James Word, with County Judge R. S. Wilkinson as ex-officio chairman.

The recommendations of the committee were printed in The Times and their proposed hospital facility would be well within the amount of \$140,000.00 sought by the petition.

It was stated that this figure was set higher than the recommended need's cost in order to take care of any unforeseen cost.

Quick Trial Given Burglar Monday

Joe Gonzales, an attorney from Del Rio, was appointed to defend the accused man who entered a plea of guilty to the charge. He waived trial by jury.

Judge Thurmond deferred the sentencing of the accused until certain facts were made known concerning the possibility of his being on parole, etc.

Persons interested in signing the petition and who have not been contacted, are asked to come by The Times office.

The report of the committee included the following recommendations and information:

Six private rooms large enough to accommodate two beds each, and other rooms necessary for the operation of the hospital, such as operating room, emergency room, etc.

An estimated cost of \$120,000, with an estimated operating deficit of \$15,000, making a cost to the county of \$6,000 annually for the retirement of the bonds, the principal, \$4,800 annual interest, plus the \$15,000 annual operating deficit, for a total annual cost of \$26,400.

The committee reported that with the cost of operation and building being what is expected and reported, the tax increase in the county would be 44 per cent over the present 77c per \$100 valuation figure.

The figures were further clarified by giving examples of taxpayers: A person now paying on \$1,200 valuation — or \$9.24 in taxes, would be asked to pay \$13.32 if the hospital proposal passed. The person now paying on a \$3,200 valuation, or \$32.08 taxes, will be asked to pay \$48.96 total tax. A taxpayer now paying on \$50,820 valuation, or \$604.76 taxes, would be asked to pay \$777.55 total tax for the new hospital facility.

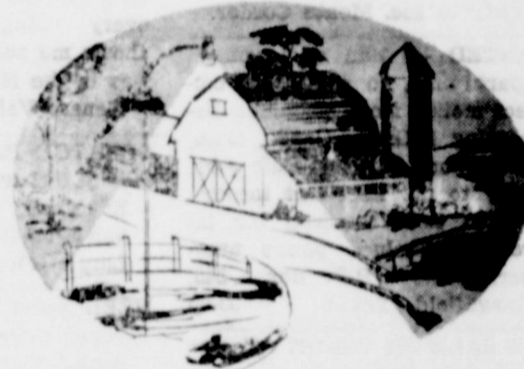


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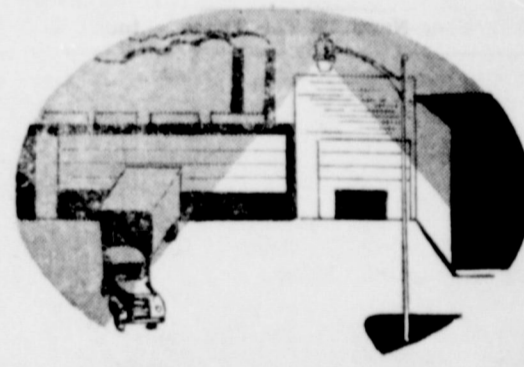
