Plans Completed For Diabetic Screening Here Next Week

Plans have been completed for the diabetic screening program to be in Sanderson on Wednesday and Thursday of next week, February 26 and 27.

The Legion Auxiliary is sponsoring the project which is being conducted in several selected areas in Texas by the chronic disease division of the Texas State Health Department.

There is no charge for the test which will be made by a team from the State Health Department who will set up their equipment in the Legion Hall. The screening procedure is quick and almost painless as it involves only the pricking of one's finger to obtain a drop or two of blood.

The blood sample will be taken to Austin for testing at the Texas State Health Department by a technician using an Auto-Analyzer, a blood-testing instrument which measures the amount of sugar in the blood samples.

Anyone found to have an unusually high blood sugar content will be referred to his private physician for further tests.

The test will be given to all persons over 35 years of age. However, all children 15 years of age and over in a family where either parent is known to be diabetic, is urged to take the test.

The hours for the testing will be on the two days from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. and from 6:30 to 9:00 p.m. Persons are asked to pick the time that is after their heaviest meal of the day to aid in obtaining a better test.

It is hoped that there will be whole-hearted support by the residents of Terrell County to this screening program. Workers and helpers will be provided by the Legion Auxiliary members.

Laborer Found Dead On Ranch Of Burch Woodward

Francisco Chavez, about 69 was found dead Wednesday morning on the Woodward ranch in the northeastern part of Terrell County. Clayton Jones, who works for Woodward, found the man on the east side of the ranch after he had been missed that morning.

Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg and Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath were summoned to the ranch just before noon Wednesday.

Jones related the following story to the officials:

"Chavez was working at repairing a fence Monday afternoon when Jones left the ranch to go to his home in Girvin. He was last seen about the middle of the afternoon. Jones stopped at the headquarters to do some things before leaving for Girvin, and among other things emptied the ashes in the stove in Chavez's quarters to put the ashes on a hide he was tanning.

"When he returned to the ranch Wednesday morning, he noticed the pickup gone and on looking around, noticed the stove had not been used since he had emptied the ashes.

"He went to look for Chavez in the area where he had been last seen, and followed the fence noting where some repairs had been made, until he came upon the body of Chavez lying near the fence, and apparently dead.

"He went to the David Mitchell ranch to call local authorities.

"He also called Mr. Woodward in Fort Stockton and the Owens Funeral Home in Fort Stockton Chavez's home.

Chavez was found with his hat and gloves still on, grasping a small bundle of wire in his left hand. He had a double-bit axe at his side, and wire-cutters in his hip pocket.

The investigation of local officials revealed no signs of foul play and every indication was that Chavez had died of a coronary occlusion.

Gilbreath ruled death as a result of natural causes in the case and the body was taken to Fort Stockton in an Owens Funeral Home coach.

Chavez had been a long-time resident of Fort Stockton and was a ranch laborer in that area for many years.

Funeral arrangements were pending.

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THIS GLITZING MUST BE STOPPED



UNQUENCHABLE POWER THIRST

It may be difficult to predict the exact direction of the power hungry bureaucrats' next move but you can safely bet that it will involve expansion of the federal government's control over the affairs of states and communities.

Austin — It used to be the dogwood blooms which set off politics in Texas. But the Legislature changed that when it moved the primaries to May and June.

So, Texas candidates are losing no time in getting down to roughhouse campaigning.

Gov. John Connally and his rival for the Democratic nomination, Don Yarborough, spoke to the AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education, but neither asked for endorsement.

Labor made no endorsements in races for state offices. Instead it centered its interest on Washington. It gave strong support to President Lyndon Johnson and Senator Ralph W. Yarborough and to the re-election of Texas Congressmen who support the Johnson program. It urged union members to help defeat Congressmen who do not support the LBJ administration.

Republican candidate for U.S. Senate George Bush complained the COPE failed to invite Republicans to its meeting.

John Van Cronkhite of Dallas announced his withdrawal from the Senate race after what he called "unbelievable pressure". But Gordon McLendon, conservative Democrat, said he was in the race "as solid as a grand piano set in concrete".

Former District Attorney Dan Sullivan of Andrews provided the upset of the session. COPE leaders recommended that the group support former Sen. Robert W. Baker of Houston for the statewide Congressional seat now held by Rep. Joe Pool. Sullivan made a speech that sold many delegates, and when it came to a showdown, the roll call vote was 139-139. As a result, COPE endorsed no one for the place.

Petticoat Politicians
A look at the roster of Democratic candidates for the legislature shows 404 contestants for 150 seats in the House of Representatives, with 13 of these women. And three women are among the 83 House candidates

on the Republican side of the ledger.

Two of the 16 female candidates are incumbents — Miss Maude Isaacs of El Paso and Mrs. Myra Banfield of Rosenberg.

Texas also boasts a woman state senator, Mrs. Neveille Colson of Navasota. She is a veteran with 24 years' service in the House and Senate. However Senator Colson drew a four-year term last year and is not up for re-election.

History shows that women have scant success in senate elections. One notable exception is the late Miriam A. Ferguson, governor of the state from 1925 to 1927 and from 1933 to 1935.

Whether their luck will be better in legislative races in 1964 — a leap year — remains to be seen. It may be significant to note that as of January, 1964, the number of Texas women aged 21 and over was estimated to be a little more than 3,000,000, while their male counterparts were estimated to number less than 3,000,000.

Free Voter Registration Continues

Registration of voters who want to qualify for free votes in federal elections will continue through March 7. County tax collectors are issuing the free receipts which may be obtained by direct personal or mail application.

Holders of the free registrations cannot vote in state or local races, in constitutional amendments or bond elections — only for president, vice president, U.S. senator, U.S. representative, and congressman-at-large.

State attorneys emphasize however, that the free registration receipts are good for primary elections, the November general election and any special election involving federal offices during the coming year. In other words, those who have them can vote in their party primary for senator, congressman and congressman-at-large or in any special election for these offices, as well as the general election.

Voters over 60 in cities of 10,000 or more population who did not get their poll tax exemptions before the January 31 deadline cannot qualify for special registration. Over-age voters in smaller cities need no certificates of any kind.

A LESSON IN HUMILITY

One of the great attributes of George Washington which, in our opinion, has never been adequately extolled was his deep humility. In proof of this we offer the following excerpt from Washington's inaugural address on April 30, 1789:

"Among the vicissitudes incident to life no event could have filled me with greater anxieties than that of which the notification was transmitted by your order and received on the 14th day of the present month.

"On the one hand, I was summoned by my country, whose voice I can never hear but with veneration and love, from a retreat which I had chosen... as the asylum for my declining years.

"On the other hand, the magnitude and difficulty of the trust to which the voice of my country called me, being sufficient to awaken in the wisest and most experienced of her citizens a distrustful scrutiny into his qualifications, could not but overwhelm with despondence one who (inheriting inferior endowments from nature and unpracticed in the duties of civil administration) ought to be peculiarly conscious of his own deficiencies."

Green Thumb Tips

The "freshness factor" is far more important with some vegetables than with others. So, if your garden space is limited, concentrate on the vegetables in which freshness means superior flavor. Peas, sweet corn, lettuce and tomatoes are examples of these, with carrots and beets not far behind.

Do you own a vacation home where you'd like to have plenty of flowers with little work? Order nasturtium seeds now, both the dwarf and the tall form. Dwarf nasturtiums will make a gay carpet wherever you need one. Tall nasturtiums, which are vines, will cover fences or walls in short order. Just clear the spot where you want nasturtiums to grow and scatter the seeds over it.

The reason for planting certain flowers and vegetables as early as it is possible to work the soil is that they require cool weather to start growth. Sweet peas, larkspur, poppies, calendulas and delphiniums are among the flowers with this requirement; onions, peas, spinach, radishes and lettuce among the vegetables.

Should the weather prevent your working outdoors, take the opportunity to check over your garden tools. Sand any roughness on wooden handles, replace old handles with new, clean off rust and repaint the handles of small tools bright yellow or orange so they can readily be seen.

One kind of stock that will flower even in the northern part of the country is known as Trysomic Seven Week stock. Most of the flowers will be fully double and all the stock colors will be represented.

From early spring to late summer you can tuck a few onion sets in any odd corner and, within 3 weeks from planting, have them ready to use on the table. So don't let those little corners go to waste.

One of the easiest of all flowers to grow is calliopsis. There are both tall and short-growing varieties, both with flowers in shades of golden yellow, reddish brown and purplish brown. Scatter the seeds where the plants are to grow.

Rhubarb chard may be used as an ornamental as well as a vegetable. Grow the plants in a seedbed and space them evenly when transplanting so they have room to spread and reach full size.
