LISTEN TO LUKE

We thought the following timely and good, so we are printing it for the information and consideration of our readers.

There are some who think that the civil rights bill will do only what the name implies — equalize the rights of all people to eat in public cafes, ride public conveyances together, and have equal educational, cultural, and social possibilities.

This Eutopian dream is not advocated, promised, or implied in the proposed bill, according to all interpretations of all who try to be unbiased in their thinking and interpreting.

What follows is one man's opinion:

The Civil Rights Bill

Former Internal Revenue Commissioner

The most insidious piece of legislation in the history of our country is now being railroaded through Congress. Its passage would destroy our rights to govern our own lives.

If you have been led to believe the Civil Rights Bill was designed to give "justice" to minority groups, you have been sold a bill of goods.

Few Americans, especially businessmen, realize that this vicious measure would convert this nation into a police state under the direction and control of a powerful central government. Its effects would adversely affect everyone, black and white alike.

The bill has been hailed in glowing terms by the President and has been passed in the House. It is now before the Senate. By its action on this bill the Senate will determine the fate of the Constitution and the freedom it guarantees.

Its evils are not concentrated in, nor are they confined to, the much discussed and highly publicized "public accommodations" section, vicious though that section is. It becomes more and more evident that "public accommodations" is a red herring that has been used to divert public attention from the basic evil that runs through all of it like a fine electrical wire, ready to be charged whenever the Attorney General chooses to throw the switch.

Like all such schemes, this Socialist Omnibus Bill — misnamed Civil Rights Bill — is sponsored and pushed under the guise of do-goodism. The phrases "guaranteeing rights for minorities" and "ending discrimination" cover its real aim, the subjugation of 185-million Americans to an all-powerful centralized Washington bureaucracy.

If Congress passes the Civil Rights Bill, the United States Attorney General will thereby be made a dictator with practically unlimited powers. His "inspectors" will swarm, snooping and prying, over the countryside — as if Judicator Warren and his presumptuous usurpations were not enough.

This proposed legislation goes far beyond the wildest hopes of the Socialist-Liberals. It impairs the rights of homeowners to be the sole judges as to whom they will rent, lease, or sell their homes; it impairs the seniority rights of employees, union and nonunion, alike; and it impairs the right of banks and other institutions to make loans and extend credit in accordance with their best judgment.

The bill can affect nearly every individual in the United States: insurance, realtors, editors, broadcasters, merchants, manufacturers, bankers, farmers, homeowners, teachers, recipients of veterans pensions, civil service workers, receivers of social security, and parents of children attending school, even school boards themselves. It would out-

White is a native of El Paso a graduate of the University of Texas in history and government. He took his L.L.D. degree from the University of Texas Law School in 1949.

He was El Paso County Democratic Chairman and was chairman of the Citizens' Committee for the President Kennedy-Vice President Johnson visit to El Paso in 1963.

He served in the Texas House of Representatives for three years.

Water Wells Tested At 90 Gallons

The recently acquired McCue water wells have been tested at an average flow of 90 gallons per minute, according to officials of the Terrell County Water Control & Improvement Dist. No. 1.

The wells have been tested for over 100 hours each with an electric submersible pump and averaged over 45 gallons per minute in the tests.

Engineers plan to put a tank at the wells site and run transmission lines in to town as soon as possible.

The two wells will furnish almost as much water as the other wells owned by the utility combined, it was stated, and with the acquisition of the three wells from the railroad company, Sanderson is assured an ample water supply for foreseeable needs and barring failure of one or more of the better wells.

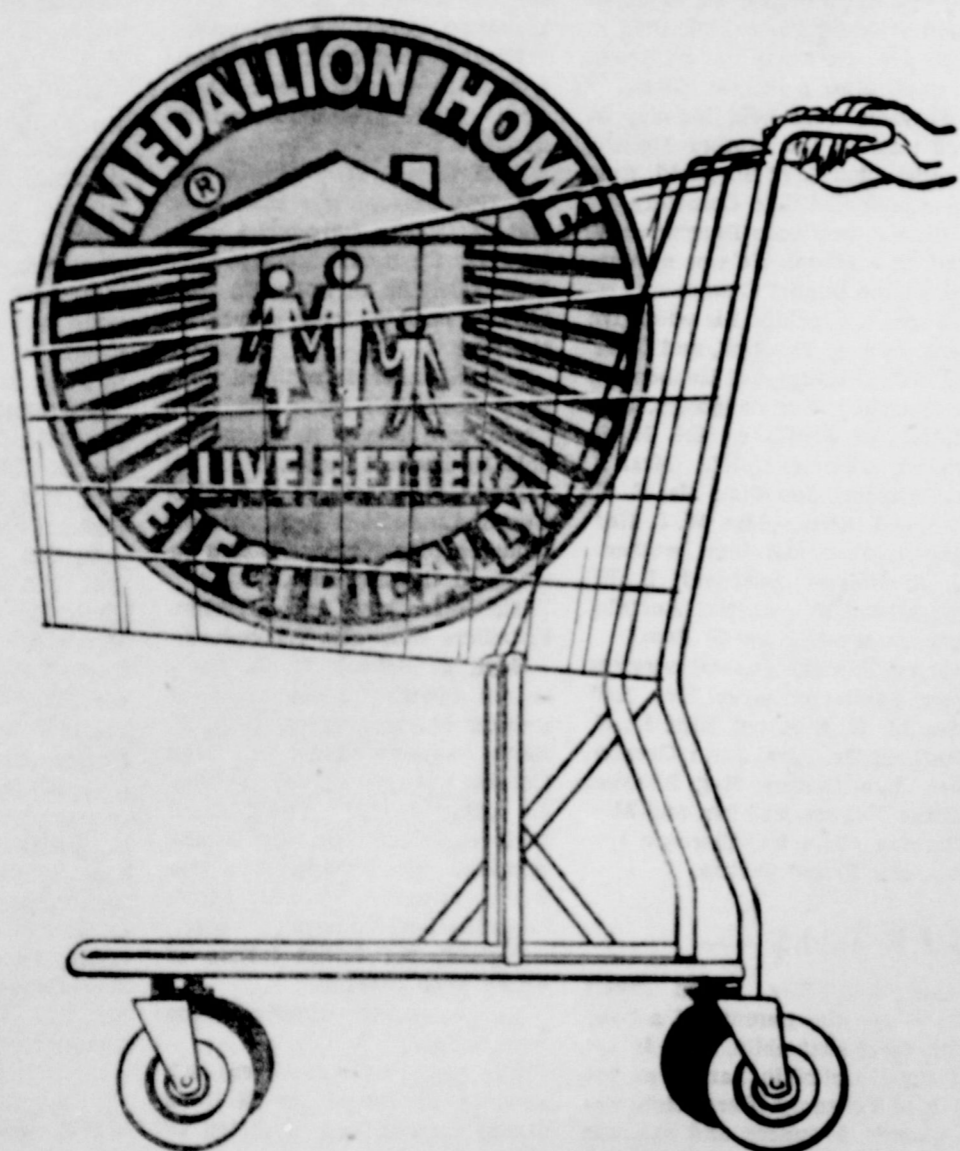



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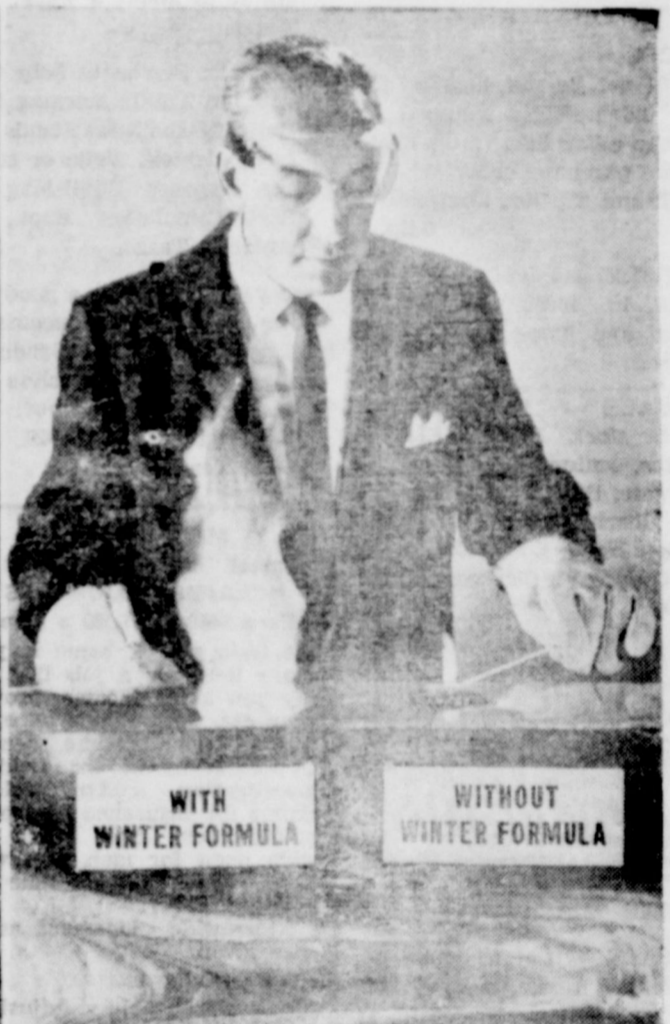

The President, as the House of Representatives, has deserted us.

The Senate, therefore, is our last hope. If its members cover before the winds of hysteria, we will have had it. For the President impatiently awaits the opportunity to put his signature to the warrant that will consign us our children and our grandchildren to generations-long political, social, and economic bondage.

If you want to continue governing your own life, write your senators, both of them, and tell them so. Tell them you oppose this bill; tell them why. Do it now!
