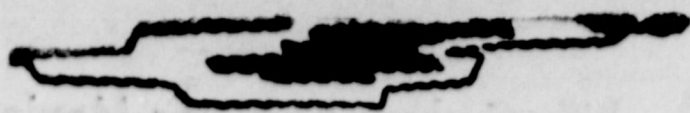

LISTEN TO LUKE

We are continually flooded by news releases from this group and that group, each of whom is seeking some publicity on their own particular cause, and both sides are yelling "foul", and on and on, and on...

The state Democrats are having trouble again trying to get into some semblance of unity and each of the factions thinks they are right.

There were no precinct conventions by either party locally and consequently no county delegates or participation in the state convention.

How one organization that embraces so many people with such varied opinions and philosophies can seek unity is amazing to us and it will be even more amazing if they get unity.

The only unity they know and have known is acquiescence to the powers that be after the minority has been whipped to the floor. The liberals are still liberal and the conservatives determined to be more so whichever side wins but both sides will still wear the "Democrat" label.

We don't know which — but if one bunch is Democrats, then the other cannot be. We don't know of any greater extreme than the difference in the philosophies of Governor John Connally and Senator Ralph Yarborough; both of whom claim affiliation to the same party philosophy.

Livestock Survey To Be Conducted Through Mail

Postmaster J. R. Hodgkins reminds rural patrons of the Sanderson Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week survey cards will be placed in a sample of boxes belonging to ranchmen.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Hodgkins explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the letter-drop. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Survey cards will be forwarded to the state agricultural statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the state's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

"Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. Hodgkins concludes.

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Billy Graham Becomes Moviemaker



The Billy Graham Pavilion at the 1964-65 New York World's Fair will be the screening theatre for the first religious movie filmed in the 70mm Todd-AO process. Entitled, "Man In The Fifth Dimension," the 28-minute evangelistic movie will be filmed at a score of spiritually significant points around the globe. The movie will be the only Todd-AO color film to be shown at the fair. Shown above are Billy Graham conferring with producer-director Dick Ross on the set in New York.

"Man In The Fifth Dimension" will be viewed free by an estimated 1,000,000 people during the first year of the fair alone. Shown twelve times daily, seven days a week, the movie clearly presents the Gospel in a scientific framework, closing with an appeal by Mr. Graham for the viewer to make a commitment to Christ. Specially trained counselors will be on duty at all times to assist people with their spiritual problems. A unique feature of the film will be the simultaneous translation of the Gospel into seven languages. Viewers can adjust special earphones to hear the film in Russian, French, Spanish, Japanese, German, Chinese or English.

"We decided to offer the sound track in several languages," Mr. Graham said, "because people from many lands will attend what I consider to be my next crusade—a worldwide one in Flushing Meadow." "With the theme of the fair being 'Peace Through Understanding,' it is our hope that The Billy Graham Pavilion will help visitors choose God and peace in these critical times," asserted Mr. Graham. The Billy Graham Pavilion is strategically located near the fair's entrance, bordered by New York Avenue, the Avenue of Americas and the Avenue of Eurasia. Admission will be free.

sion refused to direct that military servicemen who enlist out of state be permitted to vote in Texas.

The majority held servicemen have no "federally-protected right" to vote where they are stationed. El Paso based Sgt Herbert N. Carrington, who enlisted in Alabama, brought the suit, challenging a state constitutional provision which limits servicemen stationed in Texas to voting in the county where they resided when they entered the service.

In a dissenting opinion, Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert and Associate Justice Clyde E. Smith said the ruling denies some ser-

vicemen the right to vote in all elections. They further contended the state constitution violates the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment to the U. S. Constitution.

Same issue is soon to be tried in federal court at San Antonio where two other servicemen have filed suit.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld district court ruling against an AFL-CIO suit charging Texas Employment Commission with "pro-employer lobbying." Court's new opinion said TEC members have a duty to advocate needed changes in unemployment compensation laws. Court also held former Commissioner J. J. Pickle (now congressman) acted within his authority in recommending amendments.

State Capitol NEWS

Trial Coverage Discussion Set A State Bar subcommittee will meet in Austin on June 12 with the state's major press associations to discuss coverage of court trials.

Representatives of United Press International Managing Editors, Associated Press Managing Editors, Texas Daily Newspaper Association and Texas Press Association have been invited to the first of three conferences. Radio and television broadcasters and law enforcement officials will be invited to confer with the Bar's subcommittee on "Trial News Coverage" in subsequent meetings.

The subcommittee has instructions to "study and make recommendations concerning proposed standards of conduct or statements of principles governing parties involved in news stories related to prospective or pending litigation, civil and criminal."

Higher Education Boosted The Committee of Governing Boards of State College and Universities called for "a giant step" to upgrade higher education in Texas next year.

In a new brochure, the voluntary group of regents from different institutions terms 1965 a "year of destiny" for education.

Meanwhile, Gov. John Connally's Committee on Education Beyond the High School got together to edit its preliminary draft of a report on how to achieve that "giant step" necessary to make Texas colleges and universities the best in the U.S.

Scabies Order Eased California has eased a dipping

order for Texas cattle, reports Animal Health Commission Director Dr. R. G. Garrett.

Only those cattle shipped to California from the counties of Childress, Cottle, Garza, Kent, King, Lynn, Stonewall, Terry and Yoakum need to be dipped under the new regulation, Dr. Garrett said. All cattle still need a permit from California and an inspection certificate certifying freedom from scabies.

Constitutional Amendment Places Are Drawn Three constitutional amendments to be voted on at the general election on November 3 will appear in this order.

No. 1 Amendment to remove authority for transfer of one per cent annually of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

No. 2 Requiring advance publication of bills to create conservation and reclamation districts or amend finance powers and boundaries of existing districts.

No. 3. Authorizing the Legislature to provide for vendor payments for medical care for citizens 65 and over who are not on old age assistance and are unable to pay for medical services (and including glasses in medical services provided).

Place of the proposals on the ballot was determined by drawing numbers in the office of the Secretary of State Crawford Martin.

Missing Persons Search The State of Texas is looking for hundreds of "missing persons" who have left possessions ranging from a 50-cent piece to \$239.62 unclaimed payroll check in various depositories for seven years or more, and failed to provide forwarding addresses.

In a final effort to find these people, before their property is escheated by the state, Attorney General Waggoner Carr has filed a lawsuit in the 53rd District Court of Travis County, entitled The State of Texas vs. J. E. James Gravel Co. and others.

Names of the "missing persons" filled three and one-half columns in the May 1, 1964, Austin American, to fulfill the requirement for advertising for missing owners of property subject to escheat. Persons with any claim to property listed should file their answers to the suit in the 53rd District Court before June 8.

Opinions The "Calcutta Pool", a betting system used in some sporting events, such as horse races, golf tournaments, tennis matches, skeet and trap shooting, is illegal, according to Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr. He says the Calcutta Pool system constitutes a lottery.

Farm-to-Market Roads State Highway Commission announced a "sweeping program" to build more than 1,000 miles of new farm-to-market roads in 166 Texas counties.

With 37,143 miles of FM roads now in the state, the estimated \$23,000,000 project would bring the total to more than 38,075 miles.

The Commission's goal is 50,000 miles of FM roads.

Short Snorts A May 5 oil and gas lease of state-owned lands (124,795 acres) brought \$4,700,000 to the public school permanent fund, swelling it to \$557,000,000.

State Treasurer Jesse James reported April 30-May 5 income of \$40,300,000 wiped out a \$38,400,000 deficit in the state's general fund.

A new state plan for hospital construction under the federal Hill-Burton Act is now available for inspection in the State Health Department.

Another open enrollment period has been authorized for Tex-

ans 65 and over to obtain health insurance under the Texas 65 insurance plan at costs ranging from \$9 to \$19 a month.

J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department, said the fact that a Texan is president makes Texas more popular with visitors. Many of them want to know "how close such and such a park is to Johnson City," said Watson. He sees tourism and park use as having a "mighty impact" on the Texas economy.

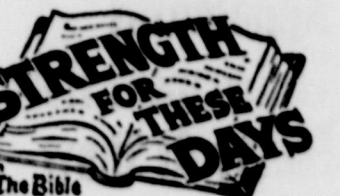

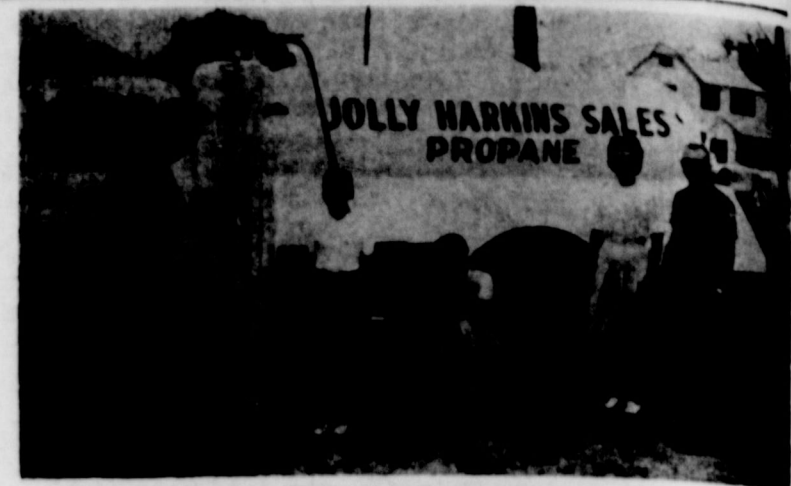
