We are unable to find a lot of difference in the significance of the quotations. How about you?

We are going to have to get a new word to pick on in this campaign. "Extremism" has been used out by the action of the president, and his quotation.

We heartily approve of the action taken by the president in the ordering of retaliatory action against those aggressors. We do not believe that the prestige and honor of the United States should have suffered the damage it has already, and such outright bursts of defiance cannot be tolerated by a nation that expects to hold its head up to the world.

And the same thing is true of the nation intrinsically.

Extremists in the racial violence which have occurred and some of their quotations to the officials, both civil and military, have been in defiance of the law, and their actions have been in defiance of the law.

This situation cannot go on. We cannot, as a nation, go on codding law violators, regardless of their cause or color.

We had two incidents in one day in Sanderson that makes hold our heads high in pride that we are living in a town where there are some people that know and practice right from wrong.

Alert and honest citizens, mindful of their responsibilities as citizens caught a car thief and an escaped prisoner all in one evening. And that's going a long way.

We have heard of incidents where citizens either ignored or even maybe helped a little to prevent the cause of justice.

This should not be a state or nation where one citizen is turned against the other, nor should be a police state, but there are extremes there, too.

The application of the Golden Rule is not from the standpoint of the one who is violating the law, from the viewpoint of the one who is having his car stolen or who is endangered to some degree by an escaped prisoner, or one who has or stands to have his money taken from him by fraudulent means.

## Early Construction of Dam Expected At Amistad Site

Commissioners Joseph F. Friedman and David Herrera Jordan, representing the United States and Mexico respectively on the International Boundary and Water Commission, conducted a series of conferences of their engineering staff and technical advisors last week and at their headquarters in El Paso and Ciudad Juarez. Their purpose was to perfect final work schedules and specifications for the construction of Amistad Dam.

The proposed dam construction, which has been agreed to by the two governments on the Rio Grande 12 miles above Del Rio, will be built as a joint international enterprise by the two governments. The dam will be 253 feet high and will provide a storage capacity of 5,660,000 acre-feet. It is estimated to cost \$53-million, not including power facilities.

## Freedom Is Short-Lived For Jail Escapee

Freedom was short-lived for Lewis Jones, 25, who was being held in the Terrell County jail on forgery charges.

Jones, with the aid of an accomplice, enjoyed about four hours of freedom Tuesday night. Gerard O. Durkin, who had served a short jail sentence in lieu of a fine on a charge of vagrancy, was released Tuesday. He went to town and after buying a hacksaw blade, returned to the court house after everyone had left that afternoon and sawed the lock off the door to the cell downstairs, releasing Jones.

This occurred between 7:00 and 8:00 p.m., according to Durkin. The pair then left the courthouse and later Durkin was seen in what was apparently an effort to steal a car at Frank's Chevron Truck Stop on Oak St. at 2nd.

Employees at the station called officers and they arrested Durkin and when they went to put him in jail discovered that Jones was released. Durkin admitted helping in the escape, according to the sheriff's department officers.

Texas Ranger F. G. Hardin, Immigration Officers R. E. Shepard, Bill Burk, Perry Martin, Railroad Special Agent H. P. Boyd were called out to aid in a search for Jones.

About 11:30 Alejandro Marquez Jr., who is the night man at Frank's Chevron Truck Stop, notified the officers that Jones was walking north across Oak St. on 2nd, and he was apprehended immediately.

Officers from Arkansas flew Wednesday to return Jones for felony charges and Durkin is being held in the local jail on charges in relation to aiding in the escape of Jones, a felony.

Sheriff Cooksey stated that he was most appreciative of the attitude of citizens who were doing their moral and civil duty in reporting violators and aiding in the apprehension of the men. It is such attitudes that not only help law enforcement, but also help in setting examples for others and aid in preventing violations.

Work Progressing On Cottage For Homemaking

Work is progressing rapidly on work at the homemaking cottage in time for use when school begins.

What was the kitchen area in the band hall, also used for banquets and other school-related functions, will be converted into a three-kitchen area with storage room, rest room, and laundry room in that end of the building.

Vinyl flooring will be installed in the kitchen area.

The center portion of the building will be left as is as far as floor arrangement is concerned for future use as a dining hall or gathering hall for school-related happenings.

In the south end of the building there will be a storage room on the east side, and the larger portion will be used as a living room area, with a planter separating it from the main part of the hall. The planter and furniture may be moved easily if the additional room is needed for any occasion.

The cabinets in the kitchen area will have a natural wood finish and wood paneling will be installed on the walls in the big hall.

A light green trim is being put on the outside woodwork and the plaster will be painted white.

## Forger Caught After Report By Alert Merchant

A forger wanted in several cities in several states was apprehended near Dryden last week-end after a merchant there had reported to local officers that the man had tried to pass a check on a Sanderson man and aroused suspicion. The man admitted that he had forged the check, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, and was trying to pass the check.

After contacting the man's home, Delhi, La., it was learned that he was wanted several places for passing and forging and other similar crimes.

The man was traveling in a Volkswagen bus with his wife and infant daughter at the time he was apprehended. The wife and baby were taken to Monahan and placed on a bus for their home. The man is being held in the local jail on warrants from other states and will be returned to Louisiana this week.

The man stated that he had purchased the VW bus with a forged check and a trade-in jalopy and had left Arkansas and traveled to the Canadian border, westward and back down by Yellowstone National Park, and other places of scenic interest and was enroute back toward home when he was picked up near Dryden. He told officers that the entire trip had been financed by money received by fraudulent means.

The sheriff's department stated that they appreciated the cooperation of business men in reporting suspicious people who are trying to pass checks, trying to sell articles for gasoline, etc. They stated that while there are some people, of course, who are absolutely honest and are trying to make their way honestly across the country, there are those who use dishonest means in making their way and the public is protected by alert business men.

Mrs. Magdalena Barron died in Sanderson on Tuesday, August 4, the victim of old age infirmities, according to reports. She was a native of Mexico.

In 1885 Magdalena Reyes was married to Antonio Barron and he died in Sanderson in 1940. They had five sons: Jose, Candelario, and Francisco Barron of Sanderson, Florencio Barron of Ozona and Domingo Barron of Houston; also three daughters: Mrs. Emilia Olivares, San Antonio, Mrs. Andrea Martinez of Austin, and Mrs. Liandra Martinez of Houston. She is also survived by 36 grandchildren and 43 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the St. James Catholic Church at 9:00 a.m. Thursday with the mass being said by Fr. N. Fementa. Burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery.

The Lawrence James Funeral Home of Ozona was in charge of the arrangements.

## School Opening Details Are Given By Supt. Richardson

The 1964-65 term of the Sanderson schools will begin Monday, August 31, according to an announcement made this week by Supt. H. L. Richardson.

Prior to the opening of school there will be faculty meetings on August 27 through 29.

All bus students, old and new, in grades 6 through 12, will register on Monday, August 24, at their respective schools. All new

students in grades 2 through 5 will register on this date also. A bus will leave the gas plant at 7:30 a.m. on this date and will pick up the students who are residing at Dryden. The bus will leave Dryden at 8:15 a.m. and continue on to the school. Students will be returned after lunch.

All new students in grades 2 through 5 and all new and old students in grades 6 through 12 who live in those areas are urgently requested to come in and register on this date.

Students who register on the opening day of school place themselves under a handicap by missing classes, assemblies, and important briefings and place an extra burden on the teachers and administration, Supt. Richardson explained.

"The first day of school is an extremely busy one and students who register at the proper time do a great service to themselves and the school," Supt. Richardson stated.

Students other than bus students will register according to the following schedule:

Grades 2 through 5 (new students only) at the elementary school on Monday, August 24 at 9:00 a.m.

Grade 8, Monday, August 24, at 9:00 a.m.; Grade 7, Monday, August 24, at 1:00 p.m.; Grade 6, Tuesday, August 25, at 9:00 a.m. at the Junior High School.

Registration for the high school: Grade 12 and bus students, Monday, August 24, at 9:00 a.m. Grade 11, Monday, August 24, at 1:00 p.m.; Grade 10, Tuesday, August 25, at 9:00 a.m.; Grade 9, Tuesday, August 25, at 1:00 p.m.

New students in Grades 2-5 will have achievement tests at the elementary school on Tuesday, August 25, at 8:00 p.m.

All first grade students, as well as old students in grades 2 through 5 who went to school in Sanderson last year, will register at 8:30 a.m., August 31, the opening day of school.

All students entering the first grade must bring their birth certificates with them on the opening day and must have been vaccinated against smallpox before they will be permitted to enter school, according to Supt. Richardson.

## ASCS Committee To Be Named By Mail

The election of the Terrell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee-men will be conducted by mail ballot again this year, according to the present committeemen. Those to be elected are chairman, vice-chairman, regular member, and two alternates.

Ballots will be mailed to all known eligible voters on August 24, and ballots that are mailed must be postmarked not later than midnight, September 8. Ballots returned in person must be in the county office by 5:00 o'clock p.m., September 8. Location of the ASCS office is 112 Persimmon Street.

Six or more eligible voters may sign a petition nominating persons for membership on the committee. This petition must be filed with the Terrell County ASCS County Committee by August 19. Names of persons nominated by petition will be included in the slate of nominees if the persons are found willing to serve and are eligible.

Persons eligible to vote in the county election who do not receive ballots may obtain them at the county office.

## 5 Mi. of Topping Put On U.S. 90 East of Dryden

Five miles of topping was put on the 15 miles of U.S. 90 under construction. The topping was applied Monday.

The reconstruction of 15 miles of the stretch of US 90 just east of the Terrell County line has been under way now for several months and local and area people have been anxiously awaiting completion of the job.

Work has been progressing rapidly during recent weeks and it is thought that the balance of the project will be topped within the next few weeks.

## Supervisor For Zone 4, SCD To Be Named

Joe N. Brown, chairman of the Rio Grande - Pecos River Soil Conservation District, has announced that a special election will be held August 10 from 2:30 to 5:00 p.m. at the Peavy Insurance Building. A supervisor for Zone 4 of the district is to be elected at this time. The vacancy occurred following the death of Sid Smith of Pumpville who served as supervisor for that area.

All landowners in the southeast section of the county are eligible to vote. Zone 4 is bounded by the railroad track on the north and Sanderson Canyon on the west, the south boundary being the Rio Grande and the east boundary, the Terrell-Val Verde County line.

Brown points out that the job of the district supervisors is to develop a program of soil and water conservation for the district, keep it current, and to carry out the conservation program with the help of available resources.

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# Regular Exercise Can Provide Both Physical and Mental Tonic, says AMA



There's more to physical fitness than mere muscles, but you can't be truly healthy and a bundle of fat at the same time.

To be physically fit you must be both medically fit and dynamically fit. The two don't necessarily go hand in hand, points out Raymond L. White, M.D., director of Environmental Medicine and Medical Services for the American Medical Association.

"Medical fitness means body soundness. This can be determined only by a medical examination. Dynamic fitness or 'action capacity' is a measurement of strength, agility and endurance," he said.

"A person who shuns activity may get a 'clean bill of health' from his doctor but if he can't endure even slight exertion, he's hardly physically fit. On the other hand, neither is the athlete with a chronic or undetected health problem."

Evidence indicates that exercise also may help prevent heart and blood vessel diseases. Active people have fewer heart attacks and a better recovery rate when such attacks do occur.

The best exercise is enjoyable exercise. Activities such as hiking, swimming, skiing, tennis or gardening along with their physical benefits can provide relief from tension, thus serving as a safe, natural tranquilizer.

When there is no opportunity for taking exercise in such form, however, a daily walk and series of callisthenics can provide much the same tonic.

Above are a few examples of scientifically sound exercises, taken from the AMA pamphlet, "Physical Fitness." Used daily, they will help to increase muscular strength, body suppleness and motor reaction, and to improve circulation and other body functions.

Start out slowly, Dr. White warned, and gradually work up to the point where you can do all of these exercises quickly without stopping.

**ISOMETRIC EXERCISES** — The following exercises do not involve movement, but rather muscular contractions. One of their advantages is that many can be done at times and places where normal exercise would be impossible, such as in the office. Hold each contraction forcefully for six seconds. Repeating is not necessary.

- (1) Organ Grinder. Push hand against hand, then pull hand against hand.
- (2) Thinker. Push forehead against palm, then push back of head against palm(s).
- (3) Bird. Put back of hands against door jams, then push palms in the same manner.
- (4) Sampson. Push palms against door jams, then straighten arms high against door jams and push again.
- (5) Sista. Sitting with back against one door jamb, push foot against other side, then push other foot in same manner.

## HE SHOULD NOT GET AWAY WITH IT



Bills are now pending in Congress to impose federal controls over the waters that run through the states in spite of voluminous proof that the states have been extremely efficient in controlling them. Even so the federal government is obviously not satisfied to wait for Congress to decide the issue because it is trying an end-run tactic to gain control of New York state's waters, according to officials of that state.

The New York case involves three private power plants using water from the state's barge canal system, two similar state-owned plants and the flood-control dam on the Scandaga River. State officers charge that the Federal Power Commission is requiring the power plant operators to obtain federal licenses to continue generating current. Such licenses, of course, would subject the facilities to federal supervision and in the case of private facilities, to federal acquisition.

The fact that state barge canal waters have been the exclusive care and concern of New York State for many years makes no difference to the FPC. Its acts are another demonstration of the central government's predilection for taking over going concerns; those that have been built up through years of hard effort by state or private organizations.

The bills before Congress are based on the alleged, but unproven, superior ability of the federal government to control pollution—although it is clear that states, localities and industries situated on state waters have far greater knowledge of the actual water control problems and, most certainly, have far greater incentive to deal with such problems.

It is now evident that the many states that are opposing the anti-pollution bills must be on the alert for sneak attacks on their water systems in the style of FCP's thrust in New York.



**State Capitol News**

Austin — State Supreme Court took a recess last week after handing down a heavy volume of new rulings including one which upheld the 1959 open beaches law.

High court declined to hear arguments attacking the law guaranteeing free access to the beaches and oceans. It left standing a Houston Court of Civil Appeals decision stating the public beaches and from the water to the vegetation line.

In other cases, the court: Permitted Texas Liquor Control Board to continue regulation of liquor exporters along the Mexican border during court attack on a law authorizing such control; Set down arguments by State Board of Optometry Examiners to force Justice Dallas Blankenship of Dallas to rule on Dr. Ellis Carp's suit challenging its ethical practices order of 1959; Overturned a contempt judgment against the city manager and mayor of Hurst, Tarrant County, in connection with a condemnation case involving land for drainage easements;

Agreed to review an Austin district court decision denying a state savings and loan charter to Metropolitan Savings Association of Houston;

Refused review of a \$1,000,000 lawsuit in Hutchinson County brought by union members who claimed they were fired for following orders of their officials in a 1958 strike at Phillips Petroleum Co. plants in the Texas Panhandle.

Refused a state AFL-CIO request to enjoin alleged "pro-employer lobbying" by Texas Employment Commission, leaving in effect lower court opinions.

Third Court of Civil Appeals overturned a district court ruling blocking Upshur Rural Electric Co-op from building a \$9,000,000 power plant near Ore City. However, it held the co-op can not sell to non-members.

School Transfer Upheld  
 Hoekley County school board's approval of the transfer of 25 students from Witharal Independent School District to schools in Levelland, Littlefield and Anton was upheld by Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar.

Witharal authorities asked the commission to prohibit the transfer which had been requested by parents of the children.  
 Redistrict "Worst Yet"  
 Sen. George Moffett of Chilloche believes redrawing of state congressional district is the hardest job ever to face the Texas Legislature. Moffett is chairman of a special committee studying the problem.  
 Moffett, who holds the all-time record for continuous service in the Legislature (34 years), spoke

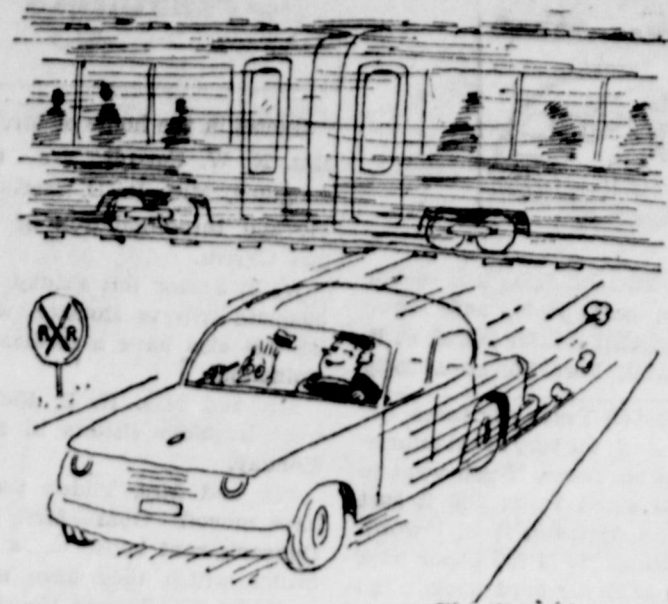

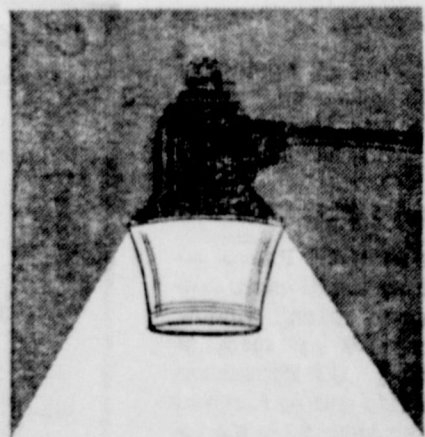
