LISTEN TO LUKE

One of our happiest moments in the field of newspaper publishing comes this with the story of the saving of a human life by another person — a stranger.

From all reports, Tommy Turner owes his life to the fact that Merechildo Ybarra was at the scene of the accident and felt the compulsion to go see if anyone was trapped inside the cab.

Had this not happened, then there surely would have been a tragedy, since Tommy was unconscious at the time he was pulled out of the wreckage of the overturned truck, and he was only out some 15 feet when the fuel tanks caught fire.

Miracles do happen! There was an element of risk involved in approaching the overturned truck, and we are going to help in seeing that Ybarra receives some sort of recognition for his actions.

We would not imply that personal gratitude and efforts to express them have not been attempted by the injured or his family. We think that if there is something beyond that, this person should be eligible.

We read almost weekly in the papers where people stand by and watch their fellow man murdered, raped, robbed, beaten, and otherwise mistreated, and spectators either turn aside or stand and watch for fear of being "involved" in something.

While bigoted extremists in other parts of our nation are breaking and entering, looting, pilfering, resisting arrest, committing arson, willfully destroying private property, fighting, attempting to murder and even committing murder sometimes under the guise of civil rights demonstrations, and sanctioned to some degree by some authorities, it is gratifying to know that somewhere in these United States that people still care about their fellow man.

We wonder when it is going to be illegal and punishable for persons to break into private businesses and rob and loot because a person of a certain color becomes tense and is emotional because he feels that he is being deprived of certain rights.

Such lawlessness we have never heard of before, and it is alarming to us to realize the extent to which law enforcement officials' hand may be tied by outside powers.

All people who come under the protection of a law, should also come under the penalty of those laws when they become violators.

And the power to withhold punishment under the law is the power to mete out punishment to those who are not violators.

One observation we made recently was that if you take a baby and put it in tepid water and lull it with some trinket or (Continued to page 4)

Motorists Warned Of Labor Day Traffic Hazards

"Labor Day and Operation Motorcade 1964 stands to be one of the deadliest weekends of 1964, if it runs true to form, as based on what has occurred in years past," said Major Leo E. Gossett, commander of the 49 county West Texas region of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Our department has estimated that 36 persons will die in traffic in Texas during the weekend that begins Saturday, September 5 and ends at midnight September 7," Gossett exclaimed.

The Labor Day holiday of last year claimed 44 lives in traffic deaths.

"Individual motorists must accept the fact that they are part of this problem and they must assume their responsibility for their share, if this carnage of death and destruction is to ever be brought under control," Gossett stated.

Tommy Turner Pulled From Truck Just Before Fire

Tommy Turner was pulled from the cab of a wrecked stock truck last Thursday afternoon just seconds before fire consumed the entire cab. He was unconscious at the time of the accident with the Big Bend National Park Service, is credited with saving the boy's life.

Turner was driving a tractor pulling a double-deck load of sheep coming east on US 90 when he veered off the road and the truck was wrecked, killing about one-fourth of the sheep.

The vehicle belonged to Jim Turner Trucking Co., owned by the brother of the youth injured in the accident, and the truck and trailer were a total loss.

Friends stated that at the time the sheep were being loaded, Turner seemed to be ill, but it was presumed to be the result of the heat. It is presumed the accident occurred as the result of the illness, since the truck seemed to gradually leave the highway and traveled some distance before the brakes were applied according to Malcom Bolinger, Texas Highway Patrolman who investigated the accident.

Ybarra, who was returning to the park, came by seconds after the accident and rescued Turner from the wreck. Both Ybarra and Turner received slight burns as a result of the blaze which happened as Ybarra had dragged Turner about 15 feet from the wreck.

A passing train radioed into Sanderson telling of the accident and the ambulance and fire truck left to the scene of the accident, about 9 miles west of Sanderson.

Turner was brought to Sanderson and given some first aid by a local physician who then sent him to an Alpine hospital.

Turner was brought home last week and is attending school this week. He is the 17-year-old son of Mrs. W. R. Turner.

Enrollment in the Terrell County Independent School District is 585, according to figures released this week by A. J. Riess, F. H. Goodyear, and J. D. McDaniel, principals of the high school, junior high, and elementary schools respectively.

In the elementary school 271 pupils are divided in grades as follows: first, 53; second, 58; third, 52; fourth, 55; fifth, 53.

In the junior high school there are 51 students in the 8th grade; 53 in the seventh, and 54 in the sixth, making 158 in all.

High school students number 48 in the ninth; 47 in the tenth, 34 in the eleventh; and 25 in the twelfth, totaling 154 in that building.

Travelers Told Of Historic Sites By Local Signs

The Texas State Historical Survey Committee has announced that two "Historical Markers In City" signs will soon be erected in Sanderson.

Sanderson is one of 125 cities in which these new reflectorized signs will be placed. They are authorized by the State Building Commission, which recently signed the contract for their manufacture.

These markers, designed to inform the tourists of historical sites in Sanderson, will be placed on the city limit signposts on US 90 east-west by the Texas Highway Department. They measure 24 by 24 inches and are made of steel with white reflective letters on a black background.

Hail, Wind, Rain Hits This Area

Hail, tornadic-like winds, and heavy rains did some extensive damage in Terrell County and in the Longfellow area last week.

Last Wednesday heavy winds and hail did considerable damage at the Lewis Hill house at Longfellow and at the ranch of Mrs. Bertha Mansfield and her mother, Mrs. Lena Stavley.

The Chinaberry trees at Longfellow were ruined by winds that tore them apart. The wind also did some damage to outbuildings at the ranch and actually picked one of the chickens there. Deer traps stored there were demolished.

The garden at the Mansfield ranch was ruined by hail and winds, with some damage also reported to trees there.

Almost four inches of rainfall at the W. G. Downie ranch did considerable damage to the land and to fences there and below to water gaps in canyons.

High winds tore off limbs of trees here in town and did some damage to roofs where shingles or tin were loosened by the wind.

About three inches of rain fell just east of town the same day that nearly four inches fell north of town and only 30-inch was reported locally.

High water did some damage at the Roy Deaton ranch west of Sanderson to dikes that had been built to carry water away from the highway and railroad track. Water is said to have covered the highway bridge at Longfellow and washed slag off the railroad tracks east of there.

Pablo Ochoa Sr. Dies Wednesday

Funeral services will be held Friday morning at 9:00 o'clock in St. James Catholic Church for Pablo Ochoa Sr., who died at his home Wednesday morning following a long illness.

Born in Duval County July 8, 1890, he came to Terrell County with his parents, Andres and Rafaela Adame Ochoa in 1900. His father died here in 1936 and his mother in 1949.

He was married to Josefa M. Ochoa in Sanderson November 1, 1924.

For 20 years he owned and operated Ochoa's Grocery and Market, closing the business eight years ago because of failing health.

Besides his widow, he is survived by two sons, Manuel Ochoa of San Antonio and Pablo Ochoa Jr., of Sanderson; three daughters, Mrs. Alicia Garza of San Antonio and Aurora and Ophelia Ochoa of Sanderson; also 10 grandsons and seven great-grandsons; three brothers, Guillermo and Eddie of Sanderson, Longino Ochoa, Houston; a sister, Mrs. Luisa Ball, Houston.

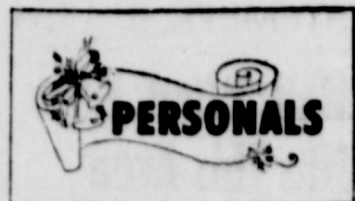

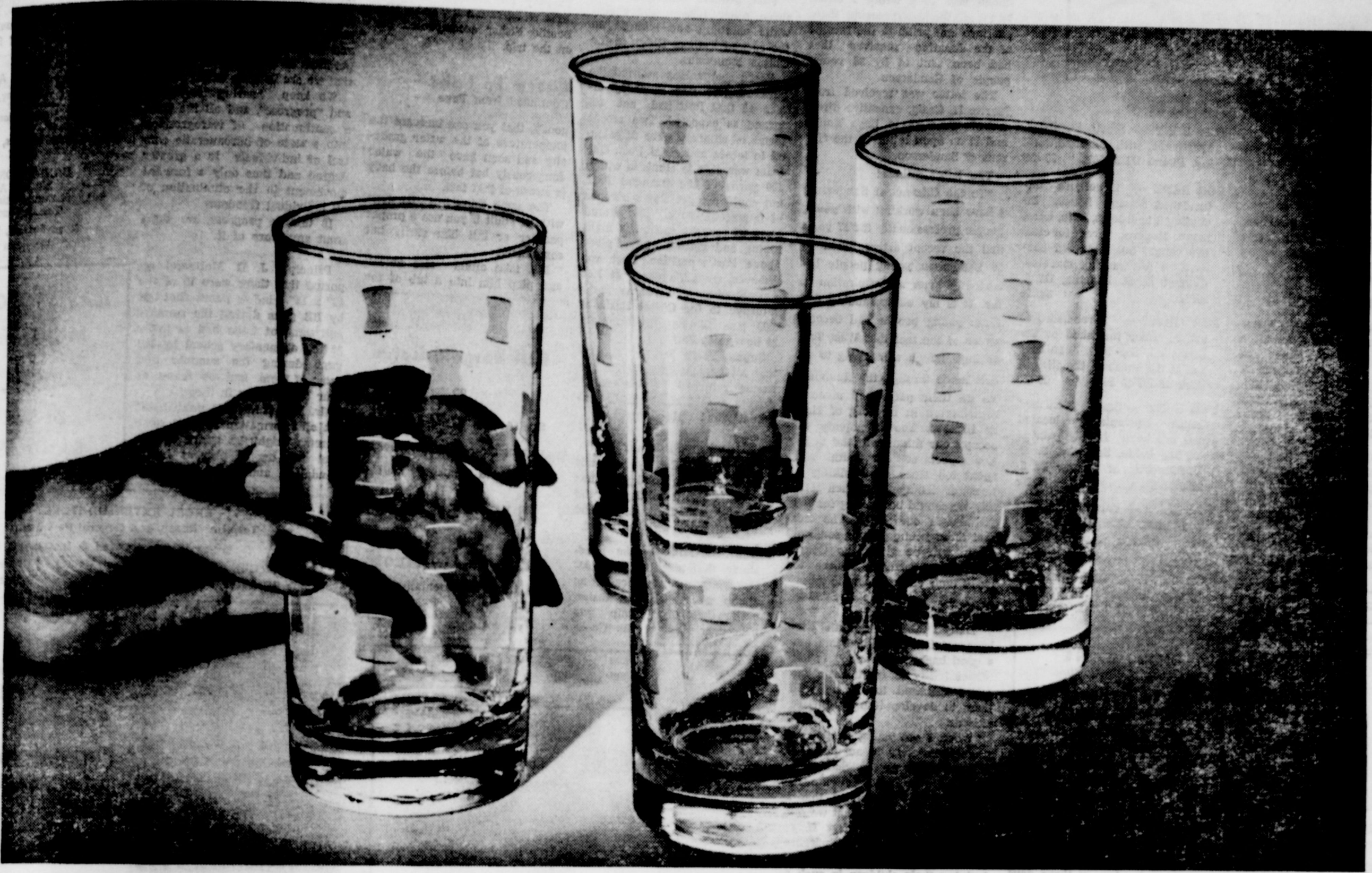
